## Council is aware of urban consolidation concerns: Bockholt

Gosford Council is very much aware of the feeling of dismay in the community increasing the development being foisted upon our local area by the State Government's urban consolidation policy, says **Councillor Lynne Bockholt.** 

The Peninsula is changing because of the amount of development, much of which takes place in unkerbed and unguttered streets which are totally unsuitable for an increased population, she

"We simply do not have the infrastructure to cope with all the extra people.

"Our roads cannot cope with the extra traffic and it is becoming increasingly difficult to find anywhere to park, particularly for packed and the F3 is at bursting he will approve it quickly so that

Cr Bockholt said Gosford Council had petitioned the State Government on several occasions to allow changes to the draft Local Environment Plan (LEP).

She said the current LEP encouraged rampant development throughout the Central Coast but particularly on the Peninsula.

"Council has formulated a draft LEP which would allow two large residential flat buildings to be constructed on land zoned 2B with an area of 550 to 750sqm and three or more units could only be 'constructed on land over 750sqm," she said.

"Currently a developer can get three units on a 550sqm block where the building takes up most of the block leading to the cramped and badly designed development which is blighting the Peninsula.

"This plan is currently with the commuters, where the trains are Minister and Council is hoping that we can at least stop some of the current rush to cover everything in 2B zones with concrete and bricks to the detriment of our local environment.

"This does not mean we are going back to the old dual occupancy policy where anyone could build a second dwelling anywhere.

"These will be proper flat buildings and will have to be designed and constructed as flat buildings, not just the tacky-add ons such as we saw in the dual occupancy debacle.

"I believe we should get better development with two larger flats on a block instead of cramped development of three or more.

"I also believe that if this policy is approved more developers may be encouraged to consolidate smaller blocks to ensure better development.

## Wales concerned about charity bin 'proliferation'

Concerns have been raised by Councillor Debra Wales at the proliferation of charity clothing bins in the Peninsula area which are being used as dumping grounds for house hold rubbish.

Calls have been made on the General Manager of Gosford City Council to review the Council's policy on charity clothing bins so as to halt the dumping of rubbish on footpaths.

"This is becoming a serious problem which is degrading our footpaths and public reserves", said Cr Wales.

"At present, charities apply to have the clothing bins placed on Council property.

"As a result, we have groupings of up to six bins placed in our public parks, road shoulders and car parks without any consideration being made to the visual amenity of these public spaces.

"Unfortunately, the clothing bins have become an open invitation for certain elements in our community to dump household waste, refuse and broken furniture in an effort to avoid taking rubbish to the local tip.

Cr Wales said it was an unacceptable situation to have prominent public spaces such as the Patonga Beach foreshore, the waterfront at Woy Woy Bay and main entry points to the central business districts such as Picnic Parade at Ettalong Beach used for charity clothing bins and dumping grounds for rubbish.

"Over the Christmas break, visitors to Ettalong Beach were greeted by piles of broken house hold furniture, mattresses and rotting garbage which were



dumped Rubbish awaiting collection at the clothing bins at Picnic Parade," she said.

"These people obviously have no civic pride and care little for our community.

Cr Wales has called for the policy to be amended so that all clothing bins are to be relocated to church yards, school car parks and service stations so they can be properly monitored and controlled.

"The clothing bins are not owned by the charities but by a private company and leased to the charity organisations," she said.

"I fully support the charity bin concept but not when the system allows our parks and public spaces to be used as dumping grounds.

"The policy should be tightened to ensure that the use of bins is strictly monitored and controlled." Councillor Wales will also be requesting that Council review the policy on the annual rubbish pic~ ups on footpath areas as, in recent months, large quantities of house hold rubbish have been left on Peninsula streets for weeks at a time waiting for removal by Council contractors.

Cr Lynne Bockholt advocated similar changes.

#### Beware the well dressed man

A well dressed man recently went into two different Woy Woy retail outlets and asked to borrow their telephone to make a quick call because his car had broken down.

The shopkeepers in both cases obliged, only to learn later, when they received their telephone bills, that the call was to an East Coast Tipping Service on a 1902 number and that the call cost \$30 for less than one minute.

In one shop, the man pressed re-dial and made two calls, one was for 47 seconds and the other .

was for 48 seconds with the total bill coming to \$60.

T elstra were not prepared to waive the cost and suggested that shop telephones have 1900 bars placed on them so that no one can make calls to numbers in that range as they are usually charged at premium rates.

The shopkeepers' said threats to refuse to pay the \$60 would only have resulted in the phone being cut off and a reconnection fee being added to the bill after the outstanding amount was paid.

## Patonga DCP plans not rejected

I was concerned to read in your article inappropriately "Patonga titled plans shelved" in relation to a draft Development Control Plan (DCP) for our village, a number of inaccurate statements attributed to one member of our community, Mr Vic Jefferies.

Setting the record straight, there was no public meeting held at any time that has rejected the plan, let alone "overwhelmingly".

Contrary to what Mr Jefferies suggests, Patonga held public meetings in 1994 and 1995, which accepted a draft DCP which was formulated by Andrews Neil consultants upon instruction by Gosford City Council with a tremendous degree of community input and consultation.

In the introduction of the consultant's report on Patonga, they noted: "A settlement of this size and integrity in such a unique location would not be possible under today's planning legislation **Community Forum**

and with contemporary community attitudes towards development of sensitive areas".

"It is precisely for this reason that the village will increasingly come under pressure with rising real estate values ...

" In 1998, at a third public meeting attended by over 100 residents, the residents voted that the greatest concern for the village was the threat of inappropriate developments.

The meeting agreed to establish a steering committee, which went about the process of reviewing the consultants' recommendations further with a view to implementing development controls for the

At this point in time, the steering committee has resubmitted one section of the draft to the Patonga Progress Association for its members' reconsideration having previously reached agreement on all other sections of a very lengthy document.

I, and the other members of the steering committee, which included the president of the Progress Association, remain hopeful that some form of agreement will be reached to progress the draft DCP with council and preserve the character of our village.

### Conservation group comments on study

There are claims that the a reasonable cost yet Fast Ships study prepared by the American **Environment** Group, Bluewater Network (http://earthisland.org/bw/ ferryreport.shtml) on Fast Ferries is unsubstantiated.

This is incorrect.

The ACF Central Coast do not work that way.

It has been reviewed by the Bay Area Air Quality Management District in San FranCisco, and the results were generally regarded as accurate.

A second agency was the California Air Resources Board that agreed that it appeared to be in the range of what they had found in the past.

The bottom line is that ferries powered by diesel fuel, even meeting the IMO standards, are far dirtier than cars per person.

It should be possible for a consultant to do an analysis of emissions of cars versus ferries in a reasonable amount of time at in my correspondence with them claim that it would be too time consuming and expensive.

An interesting thing about this is that the Supershuttle fast ferry proponents for the Gosford run have supplied this sort of comparison in their EIS claiming that their engine is far less polluting than the gas engine cited by the American report.

The Bluewater Network study was never asserted to be totally comprehensive, however general findings were alarming and deserved some serious consideration.

The debate in council on the issue was non-existent when I raised it: no questions, no statements in regard to this serious air pollution study.

I acknowledge that the stated benefits for the community were reasonable to argue in support of the project.

It was a matter of weighing up the benefits versus the costs.

In my opinion, the costs are too high.

I hope I'm wrong.

I hope that all the benefits claimed by Fast Ships for the community come to fruition.

I believe that the problems with fast ferries in the air pollution stakes are not shared by the slow ferries which are more favourably compared to the car.

However, I cannot substantiate this with an independent study.

In the end, if the ferry is eventually running, it is better to use it than not, because it is making its run anyway.

This applies to all mass transit systems.

Buses and trains happen to be far less polluting and should be the first choice, after the bicycle.

My message is that everyone should, whenever possible, leave the car at home, or not buy one in the first place.

## Concern over 'vandalism' of the Everglades wetland

Regeneration Group
is concerned that the
Everglades Lagoon is being
vandalised by motorcyclists.

The group has spent close to 2000 hours repairing the previously neglected site.

Spokesperson Ms Nora Clarke said she did not know how many riders went into the park but their destruction had undone much of the group's work since 1996.

Council's manager for natural resources, Mr Craig Arms, said the problem was a perennial one.

"Council has the power to prevent people entering the area with a bike," he said.

However, he said policing that

power was much harder.

"Typically, council officers are in four wheel drives and restricted to the fire trails within the reserve," he said.

"Bikes, by their nature, are nimble and mobile and can go anywhere." Mr Arms said one of the best restrictions were to put bollards and barriers to restrict the bike riders' 'fun'.

However, it was difficult to put in the restrictions and barriers because pedestrian access had to be maintained he said.

"A bike can go anywhere a pedestrian can go.

"I'm concerned about the problem and my colleague is working on it at the moment."

# Library forecourt work to start soon

Work will begin in early next month to upgrade the Library forecourt as a "town centre".

The project is the result of public consultation held two years ago, according to Councillor Debra Wales.

"In early 1998, a number of community-based meetings were held including a Strategic Planning Workshop," said Cr Wales.

"These meetings were important for the current Woy Woy CBD Committee meetings and established the basis on which the upgrading of the town centre should take place.

"One of the most important issues to come out of the workshops was the formalisation of the Woy Woy town square or village green as the focal point for the business centre.

"As a result, the CBD Committee developed plans for the Woy Woy Library forecourt area consisting of landscape upgrading with indigenous species, open areas and a mosaic map of the Peninsula to be incorporated in the re-paving of the area. Council's art adviser is working with the CBD committee and local community artists to design the mosaic which will be placed in the library forecourt.

"The town square will also provide an area for entertainment such as outdoor art exhibitions, musical recitals and professional buskers,• said Councillor Wales.

Woy Woy CBD Committee Chairperson, Cr Lynne Bockholt said: "There has been some concern in the community that the flower beds which presently add so much colour around the library are to be removed and to be replaced with palm trees.

"This is not the case, the beds

are to be enhanced and the lovely displays of flowers will continue.

The upgrading of the retail precinct in Blackwall Road would also begin in earty February and would incorporate the continuation of paving, tree planting, installation of underground power and street furniture, she said.

Cr Wales said that further plans to upgrade The Boulevarde in the tourist precinct are under way with traffic calming and widened footpaths as a priority.

 "Cafes and restaurants are becoming more and more popular and the need to encourage tourist visitation to Woy Woy is a priority for the Woy Woy CBD Committee," she said.

"The final outcome will be the creation of upgraded areas for leisure and outdoor eating with expanded business and employment opportunities.

Cr Bockholt said: "As the CBD works get underway, the committee is working with the Rotary Club of Woy Woy on the replacement of the Rotary fountain in Anderson Park.

"The committee has asked an artist in terrazzo to submit a design reflecting the flora and fauna of the Peninsula area.

"We also want a fountain where young children can play safely and we have been investigating fountain options.

"The Committee understands that the Rotary connection is important and we intend to consult fully before any formal decision is made."

Cr Bockholt said Anderson Park is not as well used as it should be and over the next few months the Committee would be considering options to ensure this wonderful public space gets better use and is fully integrated into the waterfront area.

"The upgrade of Pelican Park has been an enormous success and it is wonderful\_ to see families enjoying the area, but there is still work to be done," she said.

Recently a meeting was held with the Fisheries Department to arrange for the cleaning of the Woy Woy Tidal Pool.

Cr Bockholt said Council is currently seeking tenders to investigate how this might happen.

"Generations of Peninsula kids have been swimming in this pool and I believe very soon they will do so again" said committee member Heather McKenzie Cr Bockholt said: "We have commissioned Ms Christine Burge, a Committee member, to work with local school children to design and install a mural for the toilets at Pelican Park, and this -should be getting underway very soon.

"This will add more colour to the area and should help stop graffiti on the outside of the toilet block.

"The interior of the toilets are also to be worked on as, unfortunately, it would cost too much to knock them down and start again."

As Chair of the Woy Woy CBD Committee, Cr Bockholt thanked all committee members for their effort and achievements over the last two years.

The Committee has members from the Chamber of Commerce, local progress associations, the arts and heritage communities and local shop keepers, and has worked hard together for the benefit of the local community, Cr Bockholt said.

## Call for council action on Umina CBD plan

Councillor Debra Wales has asked for the Umina CBD upgrade plans to be brought before council before any work commences with the view of council mediating ongoing disagreement between interested parties.

Cr Wales said the Umina CBD committee has been divided on the best way to spend the \$1.5 million allocated for the upgrade.

"The result has been a business centre opposed to the plans and meetings which are both unpleasant and unproductive," she said.

"Ultimately, the losers are the Umina shopkeepers and the community." Council has decided to postpone the works and hold a public meeting on the matter.

President of the Peninsula Chamber of Commerce, Mr Matthew Wales welcomed Council's decision.

"The Chamber applauds the decision to review the plan," he said.

"We will not stand by and watch financial strategy funds wasted on works that clearly do not have the backing of the business and wider community.

"At an on site meeting with Councillors in December, business operators made it clear that the proposed raised pedestrian crossings and kerb blisters were not acceptable and that significant traffic and parking problems would occur.u The public meeting will be chaired by Mayor Chris Holstein and representatives of each Umina Beach business together with representatives of the major community organisations.

Mr Wales said that the Chamber was not opposed to the bulk of the proposed Umina Beach CBD

Fast Ships Limited hope to have the berthing facility for the fast ferry operations ready by the middle of this year after gaining final approval from Gosford Council to run the ferry service.

Fast Ships Chairman, Mr Peter Hale, said the facility will include a wharf with a fixed walkway to a floating pontoon structure.

"The walkway and wharf will be fully covered and lead to a covered ticketing and waiting area on The Esplanade opposite Bangalow Street.

"The company will also be constructing a transport interchange including the reconstruction of the existing car park near the pine trees, provision of disabled parking facilities, commuter "kiss and ride" and the construction of a bus layby area.

"A taxi rank and bus stop will be provided in Bangalow Street near the intersection with The Esplanade with appropriate pedestrian crossing facilities."

Gosford City Council has now formally approved the Ettalong Beach Fast Ferry after an exhaustive review of environmental and engineering issues.

The Council approved the issue of formal development consent at its meeting on December 7 by an eight votes to one margin.

"Fast Ships Limited are delighted with the decision", said Mr Hale.

"The company has been working extremely hard for the last two years preparing the environmental and engineering reports in response to Council's requirements.

"We believe that we have now fully met the concerns of both the Council and the local residents at considerable cost to the company." Mr Hale said although it had taken an extraordinary amount of time, the company is nonetheless appreciative of community's and Council's support for this project.

"The issues and ramifications of the fast ferry project are significant and needed to be fully tested in the public arena," he said.

There are a number of conditions attached to the approval, which Fast Ships will now have to address as part of the construction process for the transport interchange and berthing facility.

Mr Hale said the company's consultants would be working without delay to satisfy the

conditions of consent so that the new wharf and pontoon can be constructed as soon as possible.

"Fast Ships have also been highly conscious of the need for commuter and visitor parking in the vicinity of the .

ferry terminal." he said.

"A Parking Management Plan has been prepared and adopted by Council which provides for the upgrading of side streets such as Lagoon Street, Palm Street, Ridge Street and Beach Street including kerb and guttering, road shoulder work and concrete footpaths.

"This will be coupled with timed parking restrictions.

"These works will be carried out by the fast ferry company at no cost to Council." Mr Hale said that plans were underway for the construction of the fast ferry, which will be able to seat 450 passengers and travel at speeds of over 40 knots

"We are also considering introducing an interim lease vessel while the purpose built vessel is under construction.

"The lease vessel will be a high speed catamaran with similar seating capacity to the purpose built vessel.

#### Picnic Parade work started

Work is well underway on the establishment of Picnic Parade as the main thoroughfare to Ettalong, and the beach.

The work includes kerb and guttering on both sides of the street and the ' construction of large planter boxes on the centre median strip.

The planter boxes consist of two sets of brick "boxes", each set being 50 metres long with a lower level on the outside. The boxes will contain small shrubs and each set will be separated by a 45 metre stretch of grass and mulch with the retention of the existing trees making them a feature.

Work is expected to be completed by the end of January according to Gosford Council's Peninsula based engineer, Steve Mitchell-Hill and is expected to create a sense of grand entry to one of the Peninsula's major attractions.

### **Umina wants foot crossing**


Thirty-seven petitioners have sent a request to council to provide a pedestrian crossing on a section of busy Ocean Beach Rd.

The item discussed by Council in December 1999 of most interest to the Peninsula community was the decision to approve a fast ferry service between **Ettalong and Circular Quay.** 

approval included construction of a wharf, car parking and covered area on the reserve on Ettalong Foreshore.

The proposal had previously been given "deferred approval" on 16 February 1999.

Moved: Sansom and Doyle that Council is satisfied with the information supplied to address the conditions of defend commencement.

Cr Doyle asked that an addendum be added to prohibit commencement of the ferry service until all infrastructure and roadworks are completed.

Cr Bell requested that refueling be prohibited at Ettalong, or within Brisbane Water or Broken Bay.

He also asked for the inclusion of a specific water quality monitoring program.

Bockholt asked for confirmation that the motion would exclude any ferry passenger parking at the Lemongrove Netball Courts.

#### **Resident Comments:**

Rob Molin alleged that council did not follow its own guidelines regarding the environment, in making comments as a resident of the area.

He asserted that part of the foreshore was being given to a private firm and expressed concern about the potential effects of such a large vessel navigating shallow waters.

Mr Bryan Ellis commented that Jhe most recent Environmental Impact Study (EIS) was essentially the same as the original EIS.

He also asked why the final EIS was not publicly exhibited.

The potential damage that might be caused by a 700 metre sea bed "scouring mattress" was a cause for concern he said.

Mr Peter Hale stated that Fast Ships had met all Council and other requirements and that the company had made its best endeavours to limit the effects of the fast ferry on residents.

The ferry would provide an alternative mode of transport and will bring business, he said.

#### **Arguments for:**

Cr Bockholt commented that Cr Rell is satisfied with the environmental conditions then we all ought to be".

The netball courts problem had been addressed as had the refueling issue.

This was an opportunity for the Peninsula to move forward, she said.

Cr Cook said that he had concerns relating to the coastal processes but the additional conditions of approval would address the environmental issues.

There would be huge economic benefits, he said.

#### **Arguments against:**

Gr Preece stated that there was a conflict with other evidence



between the statements made relating to the relative benefits and disadvantages attributed to diesel and gas powered engines.

#### **Umina Plan**

Moved: Wales, Seconded Bell (only to allow the motion to be discussed) that the plans for the upgrade of Umina Beach by the Umina Beach CBD Committee be brought before Council as soon as possible before any of the planned works commence.

Cr Bell later withdrew his seconding of the motion which subsequently lapsed.

#### **Argument for:**

Cr Wales stated that she had been on the CBD Committee for two years.

It was "a dreadful committee" and being on it was a "dreadful experience", she said.

Her "ideas were ridiculed". The planned upgrade had no feasibility

She would like an independent consultant to take over the study.

Treatments to improve traffic flow were needed as was a landscape plan.

Arguments against: Cr Penton contradicted Cr Wales' assertion that there was no comprehensive

The plan was started in 1995 and involved an experienced and highly qualified consultant who carried out a study which was placed on public exhibition, she

The plan would make the main street of Umina into a one level street with three raised crossings.

She also pointed out that the CBD grant of \$1.

5 million had guidelines specifying what the grant could be spent on, namely: paving, gardening, street furniture, parking.

She said some members of the CBD Committee had not attended for two years but turned up to vote and that they had been replaced on the Committee.

Cr Sansom emphasised the need to ensure consensus and to bring together business people and the wider community.

Cr Holstein stated his belief that a decision by Council would not fix the angst in the community.

He said there was a need to find out what the business community

Cr Bell suggested that there be a meeting called by Council to identify the problems and investigate the plans and options and to talk these through.

#### **Community Comments:**

Mr Matthew Wales, president Chamber of the Peninsula of Commerce, stated that he represented the businesses of Umina Beach.

He said the committee had gone nowhere for the past two years and that the committee was split down the middle.

If the plan was so good why was there not consensus, he asked.

The plan would cause traffic congestion, pedestrian flow problems and an independent arbitrator was needed to sort this out, he said.

He said a holistic plan was needed and the vote at the CBD meeting was six for, five against while two votes were disallowed who were entitled to vote.

Mr Ken Hoste, Chairman of the CBD Committee, emphasised the restrictions placed on how the CBD grant could be spent and stated that the plan for the CBD was in accordance with those restrictions. **New Motion:** 

A motion was moved (Bell / Holstein) and passed, which called for a meeting in February with representatives from all businesses in the CBD, senior citizens, Progress Association, Surf Club, Chamber of Commerce, Gosford City Youth Council and the Umina Beach Action Committee.

If there was no resolution of the dispute the matter was to be brought back to Council.

There were to be no proxy


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

## **Council looks to** improve lifesaving

Gosford Council is looking at ways to improve the coverage of the Lifeguard Service.

Council's director of works said: "In comparison to other councils and given our area's increasing population growth and high tourist influx throughout the year, Gosford Council's lifeguard staffing levels are below an optimal standard".

Ocean Beach is currently staffed by one council lifeguard five days a week from 9am to 5.30pm and by two lifeguards in the Christmas school holiday period from 9am to 6pm.

Umina Beach has similar staffing levels.

These times are flexible and can be changed due to surf conditions and so forth.

Volunteer lifeguards patrol the beaches on the weekends.

Ettalong Beach, Pearl Beach and Patonga Beach are not patrolled.

The director said that although the staffing levels were below optimum, the training equipment levels of the local service were well above the minimum standards required by state legislation.

He said council's options to increase the lifeguard coverage include the use of closed circuit monitoring of non patrolled areas and the freeing of funds from other areas of council's budget to increase staff levels.

### Painless vasectomy technique at Woy Woy

Dr Fabian Baez at the Clocktower medical centre in Woy Woy is one of the few general practitioners performing Australia vasectomies using the painless, noscalpel technique.

Vasectomy is traditionally a minor procedure for male sterilisation usually performed in the doctor's surgery through two scalpel cuts either side of the



scrotum.

simpler, no-scalpel technique is performed through one pin hole using local anaesthetic and takes about 10-15 minutes.

Through this small hole the vas deferens (the tube through which sperm travel to join the seminal fluid) are bought to the surface using a specially designed instrument that looks like a very small crotchet hook.

The tube is cut and the ends are sealed using heat.

One end is tied and the other end is buried in the scrotal sheath. This prevents the vas from

rejoining together. The pin hole rarely requires

stitches and once healed the scar is almost invisible

Most men can return to work on the third day after the procedure.

Usually no pain relief is required with some men commenting the next day that they don't believe the procedure had been done.

Vasectomy does not change sexual ability or pleasure, however extra contraceptive precaution must be taken for approximately nine weeks while a sperm count is performed confirming sterility.

Dr Baez said the procedure is very safe and has only 0.3 per cent complications as opposed to 4% for the traditional method.

The no-scalpel technique was developed in China where a cheap, painless and quick form of birth control was needed that could be performed safely almost anvwhere.

Every year in Thailand on the King's birthday, a vasectomy festival is held where thousands of vasectomies are performed using this method in tents in the palace grounds as a form of population

No-scalpel vasectomy technique is gaining popularity in the United States and Australia is following guickly.

Dr Baez performs this procedure on Fridays and patients are usually back at work the following Monday.

The cost is \$290 with \$240 covered by Medicare.

The waiting list is approximately three weeks at present although this will be reduced soon with the procedure being performed twice a week due to enormous public response, said practice manager Sister Angela Mason.

## **Peninsula Women's Centre** continues providing service

The Peninsula Women's Centre has completed a successful year, offering women information about any issue or organisation concerning women.

It opened its doors in September 1998 with a grant from Gosford Council and continues running mainly from donations and the hire out of the premises to groups for 10 per cent of the takings.

A clinic is held once a by the Women's Health unit from Gosford Hospital where such things as pap smears are performed.

There are regular health talks ranging in topics such as breast cancer awareness, nutrition, loss and grief, menopause, osteoporosis, stress management and podiatry.

A wide range of free courses are also available, covering topics such as better relationships, drumming, women's personal safety, ideas for parents, belly dancing, iridology, past lives, feldenkrais techniques and meditatioo.

The centre is run by a project worker and 20 volunteers.

Most of the volunteers work a set shift and attend to such activities as answering the phone, mail, maintenance and repairs, quotes, research opportunities and running of the various courses.

A "What's On" booklet is available from the centre in McMasters Road as well as information on many subjects concerning women.

This year, a Young Woman's Expansion Program is proposed where young women and girls from the age of 12 can learn ways to improve their self esteem, how to dress for an interview, write an application letter and curriculum vitae and other interview skills.

The centre is open on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday.

Peninsula residents could Waste Board, said: "Residents will earn as much as \$500 for reporting incidents of illegal dumping.

Gosford City Council has announced plans to adopt a "Dob in a Dumper" campaign, similar to that run by Wyong Council.

Councillor Robert Bell, acting chairperson of the Central Coast



be rewarded if their information leads to Council successfully fining the dumper".

"Our two councils have found common ground in our battle against illegal dumpers," he said.

"With close to 276,000 pairs of eyes in the community out there, dumpers will get caught".

The general manager of the Central Coast Waste Board, Mr Bruce Watters, said: "The Central Coast Waste Board, councils and State Government want to make things very difficult for illegal dumpers to get away with dumping.

"We will be assessing the use of video surveillance cameras currently being tria led in the Hunter Region, with a view to installing them at some of our dumping hot spots.

State Environment Minister Ms Pam Allan has announced that the Government is closing in on illegal waste dumpers with the introduction of new waste laws.

She said amendments to the Waste Minimisation and Management Act meant both transporters and owners of waste could be liable for prosecution if waste was illegally dumped.

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## PATONGA at ETTALONG: Where is Wahgunyah Street?

James Warwick Browne settled at Woy Woy in about 1894

He occupied 150 acres of land extending from Blackwall Mountain to the junction of present- day Picnic Parade and The Esplanade, Ettalong Beach.

Browne built a commodious residence at the foot of Blackwall Mountain, and named it 'Patonga'.

Two statues stood on either side of the front steps to the house, which had verandahs to the front and sides, and a matching pair of bay windows overlooked the family property.

James Browne was a businessman, and one of his main enterprises was as an exporter of the giant maiden hair ferns that grew prolifically around the district.

'Patonga House' was destroyed by the terrible bush fire that devastated the area in 1928.

However, during World War I, Browne joined the rush to subdivide land on the peninsula.

His subdivision was called 'Patonga Park

Estate', and consisted of over 700 blocks.

Examination of the estate plan reveals that

Road was originally named Wahgunyah
Street - an example of just one of the items of

our heritage that has been lost.

Lurline Street was named after Browne's daughter.

The site of 'Patonga House' eventually became the site of the Ettalong-Caravan Park.

To advertise the 'Patonga Park' subdivision, a glamorous brochure was produced, extolling the virtues of the area.

Here are some extracts: Woy Woy is undoubtedly the Playground of Sydney, and a very picturesque playground it is, and also the password to prosperity and good health.

It appears to have been specially created by Nature in one of her most kindly moods as a





## **Professor introduced** mosaic art to Norah

Norah Clark has been involved in art all her life and now teaches the art of mosaic design, which she was introduced to by a professor.

As a teenager she attended St Mary's Concord school.

Her parents asked the nuns to give Norah extra periods of art, which they did to the exclusion of other studies.

Norah said she found the period quite blissful.

She used to send sketches to the Sydney Sun's comics page and later her children did the same.

In her early 20s, she studied at the A.D.R.

Art School run by Datillo Rubbo and then by Professor Bissietta.

, The professor taught in the classic tradition and introduced Norah to mosaics.

At the same time she worked for professional photographers before opening her own photographic studio.

This was in the early 1950s when female photographers were

After getting married, Norah ravelled to Europe and discovered ancient mosaics.

Norah said the travel had led to an artistic obsession where she lived and breathed mosaics for eight years.

She has since experimented with other art forms and taught at several schools.

Now she is teaching mosaics from her home

Norah also started "Melaleuca Wetlands Regeneration Group" (Everglade Lagoon).

Volunteers meet twice a month and form working bees to help regenerate and clean the wetlands which are under the jurisdiction of the Gosford Council as crown land.

Norah said the council is not always helpful.

Residents regularly rubbish and introduce more weeds to the area which makes the work more difficult for the volunteers.

Norah said trail bikes also do a lot of damage.

She said dedicated lovers of the environment will enjoy working on the sale remnant of Melaleuca Wetlands on the Woy Way Peninsula.

More volunteers are needed.

It is also a great place for artists and photographers.

The Peninsula Swans Australian Rules Club will field sides in the new Hunter Australian Rules competition starting in March.


The new competition is an amalgamation of last year's local competition and one from the Newcastle region.


Lilian is also the group's treasurer.


