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

Concept plan for roundabout

Gosford Council has resolved to prepare a concept plan for a roundabout at the corner of Brisbane Water Dr and the **Boulevarde in Woy Woy.**

"At present, people dropping off at the station have to turn into the Boulevarde and travel either up Brickwharf Rd, or turn into Oval Ave, before coming on to Blackwall Rd heading for Woy Woy and Umina," said Cr Lynne Bockholt.

"This mixes through traffic with those cars wanting to use the waterfront facilities and the whole thing adds up to one big traffic mess

"Council has been very successful with its upgrade of the Woy Woy waterfront and we just need to take this one extra step to keep through traffic out of the area.

"At present there are some cars performing an illegal U-turn at this spot risking a fine, when we could solve the problems with a small roundabout at the intersection,"

With the installation of a roundabout, traffic going to Woy Woy South or to Umina, via Ocean Beach Rd, would be able to turn at the roundabout and head out of town along Railway Street.

Cr Bockholt said that the council had "once again" sent the request for the provision of the roundabout back to the Traffic Committee.

"It's hard to get some council officers to take this matter seriously," said Cr Bockholt.

"The Woy Woy CBD Committee, which I chair, has for the past two years been trying to get a roundabout constructed at this intersection so that we can get a much better traffic flow in Woy

"Council has now decided to take matters into its own hands by resolving that a concept plan for a roundabout be prepared," she

"These can then be presented to the RTA who would fund the

"Councillors believe this is a step forward in a long and frustrating fight to get better traffic flow through Woy Woy CBD," said Cr Bockholt.

Peninsula future Canvassed

Council planners' thoughts opportunities. about the future of the been Peninsula have canvassed in a report on a rezoning application for a property in South St, Umina.

Council rejected the application. In their report to the council, planning staff referred to the development of an "integrated plan" for the Peninsula by the Department of Urban Affairs and Planning (DUAP) team, based in Gosford.

Such a plan would "set a new strategic direction for a range of issues across the Peninsula", according to the report.

"Council will be aware that a 'Living Centres' team of DUAP has now been established on the Central Coast in Gosford CBD," the report said.

"The team is to adopt a place management approach to planning, with the aim of planning for a better environment, jobs and livable cities through a partnership approach.

"One of the initial priority projects for the team shall be the development of an Integrated Plan for the Peninsula addressing infrastructure, improved urban design, appropriate residential redevelopment for medium density housing, renewal of Woy Woy-Umina-Ettalong town centres and optimising local employment

"As such, this integrated approach shall set a new strategic direction for a range of issues across the Peninsula, resulting in an improved urban outcome and an improved living standard under the framework of a 'whole of government' approach.

"In addition to the strategy, Council is pursuing state government funding under the Urban Improvement Program for funding for a project that would dove-tail into the Integrated Planning Strategy.

"Concerns have also been raised in relation to the extensive areas already zoned for medium density, and that redirection of medium density housing to town centres where services and facilities are concentrated may be more appropriate.

"This would also allow a more focused approach to the provision of services and facilities to be provided by way of Section 94 contributions.

"Poor urban design outcomes, environmental and flooding constraints, together with the deficit in service infrastructure and facilities have also been of concern in relation to continuing medium density development on the Peninsula."

Five year special rate

Gosford Council general manager Peter Wilson has denied that a disproportionate amount of the proposed special rate levy will be spent outside the Peninsula.

He was addressing a public meeting at Umina Christian life Centre on May 9 called by the council to discuss the proposal.

This was despite a Council brochure listing works on only 17 Peninsula streets among the 90 streets to be funded under the proposal.

A separate Council hand-out would be only \$0.5 million of \$2.3 million in 2002/03 and just over \$0.5 million of \$2.3 million in 2003/04 would be spent on Peninsula roads.

Mr Wilson said there was a reasonable distribution of funds across the City according to population.

He said it appeared otherwise because recent developments had included kerb and guttering and were paid for by developers.

Mr Wilson also revealed that the special rate would apply for five years, raising an extra \$11.7 million, and that a recent property revaluation saw an increase in value of an average of 49 per cent.

The proposed additional 7.2% increase being sought by Council would need community support and would then be put to the Minister who would not necessarily agree to the rise.

"Without community support, the requested rise will not be put to the Minister," said Mr Wilson.

He said resident surveys had shown that the number one priority was addressing the backlog of roadworks, kerb and guttering and footpaths.

He said that the rate levy over a five-year period would enable the backlog to be addressed.

Mr Wilson said a recent revaluation of Gosford properties, showing a 49 per cent average increase in values, would not affect the average rate.

The revaluation would be "revenue neutral" in terms of the amount of rate revenue raised ov the council, although individual ratepayers may find themselves paying more or less than previously. Cec Bucello, May 9

Council Policy on legal advice

A draft policy on the release of Gosford Council's legal advice could mean the basis for claims that the Correa Bay water quality report contained defamatory material may never be known.

The draft is currently on exhibition for public comment, before being adopted by Gosford Council The draft was prepared after consideration of principles suggested by the Ombudsman.

General manager Mr Peter Wilson reported to the council that "in substance" the principle was that "where it is in the public interest, legal advice should be publicly available".

Mr Wilson said: "It is not in the public interest that the legal advice relating to current litigation be

"However, when a matter is finalised there may be no reason to keep that information private."

The general manager had delegation to release details of legal advice.

The draft policy gave the general manager discretion in releasing legal advice, whether or not the matter is subject to litigation or potential litigation.

The policy requires him to "have regard to" the Ombudsman's Principles on Obtaining and Distributing Legal Advice before releasing legal advice.

The Ombudsman's guidelines give a number of circumstances considered "unlikely to be contrary to the public interest" to release legal advice.

These include where "it contains information likely to contribute to positive and informed debate about issues of serious interest", "it will significantly contribute to the public accountability of the council" or where "it will assist or allow inquiry into possible deficiencies in council's conduct".


Kerb and guttering low priority

Committee to improve CBD

Gosford mayor Cr Chris Holstein has welcomed the formation of a Security, Council Rangers and Police (SCRAP) Committee to deal with anti-social behaviour and criminal activity across the Peninsula and Gosford CBDs.

The co-ordinated interagency committee includes Council staff and rangers, ACS Security and Pound Security employees, and Gosford Local Area Command Police.

It will meet regularly to exchange information and intelligence, discuss crime trends, community perceptions and new approaches, said Cr Holstein.

"A major focus of the SCRAP committee is to provide a managed presence and an increase in feelings of safety in these areas.

"It was recognised by members of the committee that our key

shopping, business and meeting places require more than the traditional law and order approach to deal with anti-social behaviour.

"By working together, the agencies can provide a better service in the CBD," he said.

Cr Holstein said that working together not only benefited Council but the community too.

"Council rangers can better perform their job and that has good outcomes for us all," Mr Holstein said.

Chief Inspector Greg Ashurst, a duty officer from Brisbane Water Local Area Command was the police representative on the committee.

He said that the committee had implemented some "very useful" strategies.

"Some recent strategies have included regular taskings and patrols by police, off-duty police working as council rangers, special operations and use of the police

dogs trained in illicit drug detection, regular patrols of council rangers and a high visible presence of security personnel," said Chief Inspector Ashurst.

"The mutual support and liaison between the agencies has been very useful in the initiatives that have been implemented in the identified problem areas," he says.

Cr Holstein said the strong partnership between the agencies was a good first step to other activities that would increase people's sense of safety.

"We also want our CBDs to feel safe and while better co-ordination with the police and security companies helps this, we have to also look at ways to attract lots of different people into Gosford.

"Diverse and positive use of the area helps to increase its safety," Cr Holstein said.

Cool response to State proposal

Gosford Council has decided to respond coolly to a State Government proposal to introduce a new planning framework for the State.

The council will use the Peninsula and its designation of "compact city" by the State Government as an example of the difficulties in adopting the new framework.

The council decided to forward a report prepared by its town planners and raise a number of concerns.

lack of detail about the new system was among the issues to be raised.

Under the proposal "Plan First", a three-level hierarchy of plans would be put in place: State, regional and local.

Regional plans would have to be consistent with State plans and local plans consistent with regional plans.

'In proposing the framework, the Department of Urban Affairs and Planning (DUAP) aimed to simplify the planning system.

The council report stated it was unclear whether the "Shaping the Central Coast" (SCC) document, in which the Peninsula was described as a "compact city", would satisfy the requirements of the proposed Regional Plan.

According to the council re-, port, "there was much community input, including considerable disagreement with some of SCC's directions, for example the compact city designation on the Woy Woy Peninsula.

"The two Councils have not signed off on the SCC document, yet the State Government considers that this document is now in place.

"The Government has commenced preparation of an Implementation Plan for SCC, which it says will address matters of concern raised in consultations." The report said

that the Implementation Plan had been delayed while Minister Della Bosca's "Central Coast Moving Forward" initiative established priorities.

"If during the preparation of a Local Plan under the Plan First proposals, much of the community expresses, as they did in submissions to SCC, that they want minimal population growth and less medium density housing (eg Peninsula), it will be a challenge for Council to introduce this desire into the local Plan

"It is required to be consistent with the Regional Plan and requires the Minister's approval" Issues the council will raise with OUAP are:

lack of detail to comment on how Council will move to the new system and how the new plan will operate

is the Shaping the Central Coast our Regional Plan, as the two local councils have not signed off on the documents due to concerns

one Local Plan will result in a great deal of detail when combined, together with the strategic direction

it will be a challenging exercise for government to produce one State Plan, due to conflicts in direction between some agencies I departments, and the Regional Plan must follow this to be consistent, then the local Plan would be prepared last, to be consistent with the Regional Plan!

how are strong community views not aligned with State & Regional Plans to be dealt with as far as conSistency is concerned?

it is vital that the results of the review of the Land & Environment Court feed into the Part 3 review.

concerns about the politics of the Regional Forum set up, which sets the Plan that the local Plan must be consistent with.



Soon, only the rich will be able to live in Gosford and the Central Coast


Indeed, Point Clare could be renamed Point Piper, Gosford as Vaucluse, Woy Woy as Bondi and Gosford Council as Greedy Council.

Council Committee refuses roundabout

Council's Committee has again refused to consider the request from the Woy Woy CBD Committee to install a roundabout at the intersection of Brisbane Water Dr and The Boulevarde, Woy Woy.

The roundabout would enable cars from the south setting down passengers at the railway station, to return to the south without having to travel through a major part of the shopping centre.

A roundabout would also facilitate traffic movement at this intersection.

Crs Bockholt, Penton Clnd Wales argued forcefully for Council to be proactive and prepare concept plans for a roundabout and refer them back to the Traffic Committee.

Council agreed.

Correa Bay

Council adopted a report from its CLP Committee that recommended inter alia, that "Council request the Minister for the Department of Land and Water Conservation to fully fund the investigation and possible dredging of (part of) Correa Bay.

"The CLP also recommended that the Correa Bay Report "once modified in line with advice from DLWC (Department of Land and Water Conservation) and Council's legal departments be released for public reference".

PlanFirst

PlanFirst is a State Government proposal, claimed by Department of Urban Affairs and Planning (DUAP) to be a simplification of the planning system.

It would thus achieve greater certainty for developers, better coordination, better community involvement, protection of the environment, provide for suitable and affordable housing, healthy and vibrant communities and neighbourhoods that are attractive and safe, Councillors expressed a great deal of scepticism at the prospect of achieving these goals.

Cr Bell described the Plan First document as "a classic example of dictating from above.

I have grave doubts about the whole process".

Bockholt gave interpretation of DUAP's approach as "We'll do the writing and you'll put up with it!" while Cr Brooks described the DUAP presentation to a public meeting at Terrigal as "just a marketing exercise".

Rezoning

A rezoning application to 2(b) Medium Density Residential was considered for a property in South St, Umina Beach, Cr Wales declared her interest in this matter and left the Chamber while the matter was discussed and voted

Planning consultant Matthew Wales spoke for the applicant, making the point that rezoning would normalise the use of the property to be consistent with that of nearby properties and that the present buildings were inconsistent with nearby buildings.

Cr Bockholt responded that "Council must rezone as part of a strategic review, not a spot

She went on to reiterate that the people on the Peninsula wanted no more Residential 2(b) rezoning.

Cr Preece pointed out that redevelopment of the site could occur under existing use rights.

The rezoning proposal was rejected.

Changes to Correa Bay recommendations

Gosford Council's coastal planning (CLP) lagoon committee made has only minor changes to its recommendations on the Correa Bay water quality study after having been asked by the council to reconsider its position.

After having a further joint meeting with the Correa Bay Water Quality Management Committee as directed by the council, none of the original CLP recommendations were changed, A second part was added to one recommendation and one paragraph of the committee's original response was deleted.

The addition was that the CLP Committee chairman determine the status of the original investigations into assertions that unauthorised material from Homebush Bay was dumped at Woy Woy Tip_ In particular, he was asked to look at the possibility of using a witness in legal proceedings and the possibility of locating and testing material from the Homebush site.

The study had recommended that Gosford Council continue the investigations.

The deletion concerned the timing of sedimentation of the bay.

The paragraph removed from the response was: "However there is no clear evidence that large scale sedimentation has occurred in recent years.

It is believed that reworking of the sediment fan existing in Correa Bay is more than likely responsible for the reduction of water depth experienced by some properties.

"The Correa Bay Water Quality Management Committee (CBWQMC) who compiled the report had objected to the claim.

Minutes from the joint meeting stated that the CLP chairman, Cr Malcolm Brooks, explained that the aim of the study and recommendations was to address immediate problems and then identify ways to possibly rectify the current position in relation to Correa Bay.

According to the minutes, it was agreed that the sand had been

"The DLWC representative stated that the manei should be addressed by the preparation of an Estuary Management Plan which involved the collection of data, sediment modelling (commenced) and addressed many other issues including mangroves and seagrasses," the minutes stated.

Fisheries to get Correa Bay study

The NSW Department of Fisheries will become the third government agency to vet the Correa Bay water quality study before it is released to the public.

The report is currently being vetted by legal teams at Gosford Council and the Department of Land and Water Conservation to remove any "spurious and defamatory" material.

Gosford Council has agreed with recommendations from its coastal lagoon planning (CLP) committee only to release the report once modified in line with the legal advice.

The committee had formed the view that "parts of the report" contained "both spurious and defamatory information".

The basis for the view has not been disclosed.

CLP committee chairman Cr Malcolm Brooks told the joint meeting with the Correa Bay Water Quality Management Committee (CBWQMC) that no discussion on legalities would take place and Council regarded all legal opinions it acquired from its own legal advisers as confidential.

He said the meeting would be held "without prejudice" to the committee's legal rights and

CBWQMC Chairman Mr Derek Britton stated that his legal advice was that the document would not invoke legal action against its committee members, the CLP or Gosford City Council.

The CLP Chairman explained that Council's legal advice varied from that point of view but did not disclose the detail.

Solicitor Alistair Knibb told the

meeting that the CBWQMC had expressed concern that the integrity of the prepared study should be retained and the CBWQMC be given the opportunity to redraft the

Cr Brooks acknowledged that large parts of the study, particularly the historical data, were excellent, but some sections must be reviewed to delete any spurious and defamatory information.





Amalgamated fire station officially opens at Umina

The new \$1.2 million "Umina" Fire Station in Trafalgar Avenue was officially opened on Tuesday, May 1.

"The new station is an amalgamation of the existing Ettalong and Woy Woy Brigades," according to NSW Emergency Services Minister, Mr Bob Debus.

"It will be staffed on a 24-hour basis by a mix of nine permanent and 25 part-time firefighters," he said.

Mr Debus said there was no reduction in resources with the transfer of staff from Ettalong and Woy Woy to the new station.

The new station would provide fire and emergency coverage to Umina, Woy Woy, Ettalong, Blackwall, Orange Grove, Empire Bay, Koolewong, Booker Bay, Daleys Point, St Huberts Island, Horsfield Bay and Tascott.

He said the facility included the latest in firefighting resources, with three truck bays.

Other features of the station include a new lecture room, station commander's office, watchroom, gymnasium and locker rooms.

A wash bay had also been installed at the station to treat dirty water from fire trucks before it

entered the sewage system.


Member for Peats Ms Marie Andrews said: "The new station will enable the brigades to provide the fastest possible response to reports of fires, hazardous material incidents and other emergencies.

"The Carr Government has made a substantial investment in the Woy Woy Peninsula, which will ensure superior fire protection for the local community," she said.

Jayars Appliance Service started at 115 Blackwall Rd with the support of Electrolux and Hoover.


In 1992, Jeffs youngest son, Mark, joined his father and, in 1993, his eldest son, Kevin, also joined the family team.

Women important in conflicts

Member for Peats, Ms Marie Andrews, has spoken in State Parliament of the important roles played by the women of Australia in all conflicts in which Australia has been involved.

In a speech made in the leadup to Anzac Day, she paid homage to those who had given their lives in the First and Second World Wars and in all other conflicts in which Australia has been involved.

Ms Andrews then "placed on record" the important role played by the spouses and mothers of the members of Australia's Armed Forces.

"Many of these brave women raised entire families on their own.

"In addition, a number nursed husbands shattered by their war experiences long after the guns had become silent.

"Very often those women are treated as the unsung heroines of our society

"Their loyalty and dedication to their families deserves to be recognised, and they are entitled to be well cared for as they grow older," Marie Andrews said.

"Let us not forget the hundreds and thousands of Australians, many of them females, who were employed in essential industries. "In the Second World War, it is interesting to note that the total number of persons employed in Australian factories increased from 565,106 in 1938-39 to 766,506 in 1943-1944.

"During that same period, 1943-44, approximately one million Australians were in uniform." Ms _Andrews said that Prime Minister John Curtain was on record as stating: "Behind the fighting men in the front line is our second line of men and women engaged in the production of supplies and equipment for the forces.

"Behind these again are those engaged in producing, processing, transporting and commercially organising the innumerable items of supplies and essential services without which the nation's resistance would collapse." Ms Andrews told parliament that the role which women played in Australia's war efforts has been understated.

She said it was very often overlooked that women entered numerous factories and workshops throughout the country where females had never before been employed.

Women also drove trams, buses and taxis, and worked as bread and milk carters, railway

porters, telephonists at police headquarters, and in other positions previously carried out only by men.

In early March 1944, more than 52,000 women were engaged in the Armed Forces, she said.

"This included more than 18.000 in the Women's Auxiliary Australia,, Air Force; 1800 in the Women's Royal Australian Naval Service; 19,700 in the Australian Women's Army Service; 9,200 in the nursing services, which included the Australian Army Medical Women's Service, an auxiliary of the Australian Army Medical Corps; and 2500 members and 630 auxiliary members of the official Australian Women's Land Army having been established under the Director-General of Manpower in July 1942." acknowledged Andrews thousands of women who joined volunteer organisations, such as the Red Cross and Country Women's Association, and made an invaluable contribution to Australia's war efforts.

It was important to note that Australian nurses served in the Boer War and in every conflict in which Australia has participated since then, she said.



He joined the ALP in July 1949, the same year the Banks electorate was established.

Mr Martin also had a long association with local registered

clubs. He served for many years as a director and bowls secretary of

the Everglades Country Club. A number of directors and

members from the club attended his Thanksgiving Mass.

Prior to entering Parliament, Mr Martin worked as an officer in the Taxation Department, becoming a Commonwealth servant when the public Commonwealth Government over the Taxation took Department during the Second World War.

He ended this part of his career as a senior investigation officer.

Mr Martin was also responsible

taxation department employees.

"He remained a strong advocate for the credit union movement throughout his life," said Ms Andrews.

Mr Martin become a union member and took out membership in the Australian Labor Party (ALP) in July 1949.

"Vince came from a strong party background, therefore it only seemed natural to him after joining the workforce to takeout membership with the Australian Labor Party," said Ms Andrews.

"He was secretary of the Panania branch from 1949 and he remained in that position for over 20 years," she said.

During his years at Woy Woy, Mr Martin was an active member of the Woy Woy branch of the Labor Party, holding a number of positions within the branch.

"He always worked tirelessly during every campaign," said Ms Andrews.

Throughout his adult life and right up to his last days, Mr Martin held a number of honorary positions within the ALP.

Ms Andrews said Mr Martin won pre-selection for the Federal seat and in 1969 was elected to the House of Representatives.

"The highlight of his career was being a member of the government when Gough Whitlam was Prime Minister,' she said.

"During his term for Banks, Vince faced many pre-selection

"They ended in 1980 when he lost a very close pre-selection," said Ms Andrews.

During his term in the House of Representatives, Mr Martin held the prestigious offices of chairman of committees and deputy speaker.

"Having had the opportunity to get to know Vince well over latter years, I firmly believe that he would have represented the constituents in his electorate very well," said Ms Andrews.

"I am sure that Vince would have left no stone unturned to assist anyone who came to him

"He never lost his concern for those in our community who were not so well off, or who relied on people like him to take up issues on their behalf.

"When I was elected the Member for Peats in 1995, Vince was a tower of strength to me and he remained a tower of strength right up to the very end," she said.

As an indication of the high respect in which Vince's colleagues held him, Paul Keating, former Prime Minister of Australia, paid his last respects at Vince's Thanksgiving Mass. which was held at St John the Baptist Catholic Church, Woy Woy, on March 15.

Among the many mourners on the day were a number of retired and present Federal and State parliamentarians.

They included former Federal Labor Minister Les Johnson, former Speaker and the current Member for Watson Leo Macleay, and the current member for Banks Daryl Melham.

parliamentarians State included former Minister for Health Kevin Stewart, Special Minister of State John Della Bosca, former member for East Hills Pat Rogan and the Member for Georges River Kevin Greene.

Ms Andrews said a large number of rank and file members of local branches of the Australian Labor Party also attended the funeral.

She extended her deepest sympathy to Mr Martin's wife of 60 years, Jean, and their children, Anne, Denise, Tim, Greg and twins Micheal and Steve, their spouses and 14 grandchildren.

At the Thanksgiving Mass, Mr Martin's eldest son, Tim, delivered a eulogy to his father.

He concluded by saying: "My friends, to quote the words my father often used many years ago from the speakers chair:

"Order. The Honourable Member's time has expired."

Request for conveniences at Woy Woy baths

May 24, 1901

The Gosford Times

Mr Andrew Murphy of Woy Woy launched a permanent pile cure cream, which was well received on the Peninsula.

Not long after its launch, it was commanding extensive sales.

Mr Murphy said the sales alone spoke for the cream's curative properties.

"Three or four boxes will effect a cure of even the severest case of piles," said Mr Murphy.

"Some people after suffering for over 40 years have been cured in six weeks."

May 4, 1921

Tenders were invited by Messrs Suppliers and Co to bid for about 180 chains of gravelled motor track at Ocean Beach City, Woy Woy.

There were 550 dwellings, including businesses in the area around Woy Woy.

The development of a proposed South Woy Woy train station was being considered to adequately serve the areas further south of the already established Woy Woy train station.


May 7, 1931

The Divisional Engineer, Mr Nicholas, met a large representative deputation of Woy Woy district residents at the Woy Woy Railway Station.

The residents expressed strong feelings in regard to the need for a new ouilding to be created between the two ramps at the station, which formed its approach.

Mr Nicholas briefly the residents of the Railway Commissioners' intention to build a twostorey shop between the

He said that the upper storey of the shop would be on the top level of the ramps and at the foot of the steps leading up to the ramp there would be an overhead foot-traffic

The previous shop building, which had adjoined the two ramps, had burnt down some months before 'iand.

The concern was over the traffic congestion at the foot of the steps where the two ramps met.

It was decided that something had to be done as the station handled more traffic at the time than both Hornsby and Newcastle.

May 11, 1951 **The Gosford Times**

One pound was offered by the Gosford Times to somebody who could track down where copies of the paper went after they left the newsagency.

The paper was trying to track down how far and wide it circulated.

The proprietors of Gosford Times said that, on the paper being returned and when given the information on where the paper had been, the person would be given the cover cost of returning the copy, which was one pound.

A public holiday was held to commemorate the Jubilee of the Commonwealth, celebrations were held over the Peninsula.

The body of Philip Sparks, a 36-year-old man from Point Frederick was found at Ocean Beach, a week after his boat capsized off Box Head.

Earlier in the week, the Woy Woy Police had recovered the man's clothing and fishing gear at Ocean Beach.

Mr Sparks was a member of the Gosford Legacy Group.

A friend who was with him was able to swim ashore at Pretty

He had tried to help his friend.

May 11, 1961 The Gosford Times Brisbane Water Historical Society hoped to start building a monument for the "Maitland Bell".

The bell had been salvaged many years prior from the wreck of the Maitland in Maitland Bay, near Killcare.


The society wished to mount the bell on a concrete foundation under a stone arch.

The monument was to be located near the scene of the disaster.

A request was made to the Beach Amenities Committee for "conveniences" and a shed to be located at South Woy Woy baths.





Entire district blacked out by storm

May 5,1971 **Woy Woy Herald**

Gosford Shire Council vetoed proposals for a pre-school kindergarten centre for 48 children to be built in Mascot St, Woy Woy.


The site was considered inadequate and it was determined that the pre-school itself would cause "a disturbance to the future amenity of the neighbourhood.

The town planner said, although there were no health or building objections, in view of the zoning restrictions it was considered that the application should be refused.

Woy Woy High School captains Graham Ellis and Patricia Steele visited Parliament House on behalf of their school.

The entire Woy Woy district was blacked out by a storm and was left without electricity for half an hour.

The blackout was the result of gale force winds, which ripped down power lines and uprooted trees and the roofs of many houses



Woy Woy Bay. Fresh water was available there during dry spells. People would go in boats with drums and tins to get fresh water from the creek and water fall.

The Woy Woy Roosters have started the 2001 season in fine form, recently winning the final of the inaugural NSW Country Rugby League Challenge Cup.

On the back of a strong defensive effort, the Roosters prevailed by 48 points to nil, with Andrew Jackson once again leading the way and gaining great support from second rower Jade Mason and prop Duncan Smith.

The Roosters got out to a 14-point lead early and despite Wests making something of a comeback, the final scoreline of 31 points to 14 illustrated Woy Woy's superiority, and moved them through to the semi final against Port Macquarie.

Due to the unavailabilty of Woy Woy Oval, the match was played at Erina Oval in front of a good crowd who gathered to support the Roosters.

Port Macquarie certainly displayed the form which carried them to the semi finals in a game which again was played with grand final intensity right throughout.

In the end, some skilfull play from winger Brent Byrne and skipper Jason Carpenter sealed the 20 points to 12 victory and a place in the Challenge Cup Final.

Golf lagoon restoration

Members of Everglades Golf Club have been told that Gosford Council and the NSW Department of Land and Water Conservation will address problems of pollution in the golf course lagoon system.

"It was acknowledged that the stormwater drainage system installed by Counci; in 1989 was not performing to the desired standard," said club president Mr Bill Balneaves.

"It is apparent that the present system of water detention certainly alleviated course flooding, however no consideration was given to the problem of nutrient control and the ingress of pollution from the adjacent subdivisional drainage." Mr Balneaves said that Council agreed to undertake a new design study and install much needed litter traps to the existing pipelines to update the system to present day standards.

"It should be realised that such works may take up to 12 months to complete even with the assured priority listing," he said.

"Permission was also granted for us to carry out surface skimming of the ponds and the possible installation of aerating systems to provide oxygenation and surface flow to further eliminate the constant growth of algae." He said that while many golfers cursed the lagoons when they hit a wayward shot, most would value the lagoons as a natural asset on our course.

"It is rather ironic that golf course constructors worldwide are willing to spend massive sums of money trying to create the wonderful environment that we sometimes take for granted.

"I would therefore ask all golfers to respect the wetlands that we have been blessed with, so that we can all enjoy a future pristine haven for our wildlife."

Students learn the history of Killcare
