Service station for Empire Bay?

A planned service station for Empire Bay has been deferred at a council meeting in order for council officers to address concerns raised by community members and groups.

Residents raised concerns about the scale of the building and were worried about contaminated run-off and the associated environmental impact on a nearby conservation site, as well as nearby oyster farms.

The deferral will allow for traffic

checking, and investigation into possible flooding and the effect of salt water on fuel tanks.

One person from the public gallery said that salt water would have no effect on the fuel tanks, as they would be made of fibreglass.

Mayor Cr Robert Bell was in favour of rejecting the application outright, saying that the bulk and style of the project was not compatible with the area, that there were traffic safety issues, and that there are already enough service stations in the

Cr Chris Holstein said: "The issues the residents raised are valid and I believe the all can be addressed via the conditions.

"There are justifiable reasons for the development, but conditions need to be addressed."

All councillors present except Mayor Bell were in favour of the deferral.

They were Crs Chris Holstein, Craig Doyle, Judith Penton, Daniel Cook, Lynne Bockholt, and Malcolm Brooks.

Most of our bush 'endangered'

Just about all remnant retained native vegetation native vegetation on the Peninsula's sand plain belonged to an officially **Endangered Ecological** Community, a consulting ecologist has said.

Peninsula ecologist Mr Robert Payne said that there were only small pockets of Sydney redgum forest that were not endangered.

Mr Payne was speaking at a tour of Peninsula endangered ecological communities attended by 30 people on Sunday, April 13.

The tour was organised by the Association for Environmental Education, Central Coast.

Robert Payne led the walking tour in an area inland from Umina Beach.

The area toured included remnants of the three Peninsula endangered ecological communities, with examples given of remnants also occurring in other locations.

The first endangered ecological community was Umina Coastal Sandplain Woodland, comprising the large trees of Eucalyptus botyroides and Angophora floribunda, as well as many smaller species.

The two other endangered plant communities were known as Sydney Freshwater Wetlands and Sydney Coastal Estuary Swamp

The example was given of Umina Campus of Brisbane Water Secondary College which had plant communities of both Umina Coastal Sandplain Woodland and of Svdnev Freshwater Wetlands.

Melaleuca quinquinerva, commonly known as paperbark, was one of the main species of this second endangered plant community.

These paperbark trees formed much of the treed area in front of the school on Veron Rd, and form a link with Everglades Wetlands.

Often the areas that had

were along creeks and railway lines where the land had not been cleared.

Many of these areas were reserves and so were available to be enjoyed by the general public.

Robert explained that the plant communities had been identified both by the vegetation, and by the soil type.

For example the soil in Umina Coastal Sandplain Woodland areas was sand, and its content reflects its location within 300 metres of the water.

Robert also said that the NSW Scientific Committee had classified these plant communities as endangered in response to community concern about the whittling away of small pockets of rare native vegetation.

For example at Umina Oval sand mining, caravan park expansion and new plans for the oval had prompted an application to assess this plant community and to apply for an endangered classification.

This process took several years, with the Umina Coastal Sandplain Woodland classification being announced late last year.

Vegetation in about half of the Burrawang Reserve as well as three areas at the secondary college were also part of this plant community.

Robert also talked of a plant in Iluka Lagoon called Lepironia articulata that was the only example between Sydney and Newcastle.

The Association for Environmental Education, Central Coast, is holding its next excursion in June at Pearl Beach.

The topic will be bushfire education.

Park to include inter-tidal zone

Dozens of marine invertebrate species, and the threatened birds that feed on them, have been protected by extensions to the coastal boundary of Bouddi National Park, according to the National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS).

The extension adds 14 hectares of inter-tidal zone, said NPWS Gosford area manager Mr Alan Henderson.

"Bouddi National Park is one of six NSW coastal parks and reserves being extended to protect inter-tidal zones, as part of the NSW Coastal Policy," Mr Henderson said.

"Seashore animals are being collected for food and bait in such large numbers that many are now very scarce in the greater Sydney area, including crabs, snails, cunjevoi, octopus, sea urchins,

anemones, pipis, cockles, mussels, oysters and saltwater yabbies," he said.

"It is also having a flow-on effect on at least two vulnerable species which feed on them, the pied oystercatcher and sooty oystercatcher, which are regularly seen on Bouddi's coastal rock platforms.

"The extension of the park over the inter-tidal zone means that collecting seashore animals is now strictly prohibited within Bouddi National Park.

"People can continue to fish in the area, except within the longstanding marine protection area from Bullimah Beach to Bombi Point, but they now have to get their bait elsewhere."

Mr Henderson said dogs were also banned from the area because of the severe impact they can have on threatened all relevant government species, seashore animals and agencies. rocky shore habitats.

"Other than trained assistance animals such as seeing eye and hearing dogs, domestic animals are now prohibited from all areas and beaches within Bouddi National Park including the eastern end of Putty Beach," he

"For information on dog exercise areas, people should contact their local council."

Otherwise, there has been no change to the activities permitted in the park.

People can continue to fish, bushwalk, scuba dive and enjoy the park just as they have in the

Mr Henderson said the extension had taken place following discussions with local recreational users commercial fishers.



Pool architects are formally appointed

The firm Michael Davies Associates has formally been appointed project architect for the Woy Woy Regional Aquatic Centre, after a council decision not conduct a tender process.

The firm has been the project architect since August 2000.

A report to Gosford Council stated that a change in scope of the project meant that fees to the firm would now exceed \$100,000 and required tendering or a formal appointment.

A staff report to the council stated: "In light of the anticipated delays to the project by conducting a tender process and the percentage completed, it is recommended council acknowledge the extenuating circumstances and that a satisfactory result would not be achieved by inviting tenders.

"Council can demonstrate that it went through a competitive process in the first instance and has been well informed of progress."

The council was told that, in July 2000, four architectural firms responded to the design brief and provided detailed fee proposals.

In assessing the four submissions, the Building Committee requested that a

presentation be made by two of the firms.

Council appointed Michael Davies Associates following the presentation and accepted the fee proposal of \$99,925.

Being under \$100,000, engagement by quotation was consistent with council's purchasing policy.

The council was told that each time the project scope changed, contract documentation with Michael Davies Associates was amended to reflect the changing circumstances.

However, the professional fees payable to Michael Davies Associates now exceeded the level at which council's policy and the Local Government Act require tendering, unless extenuating circumstances were present.

Gosford Council has decided to defer consideration of an application to build a nineunit complex at 81 Ocean Beach Rd, Woy Woy.

The application was made under State Environmental Planning Policy 5 which allows "low cost" multiple units for the medium density areas.

The reason given for the deferral was to investigate whether several trees on the site could be retained, including some Norfolk Island pines.

Bitou bush to be removed

The National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) has announced "a massive operation" to remove bitou bush from the Maitland Bay area of Bouddi National

Service staff, bush regenerators and volunteers will be involved.

NPWS regional manager Mr Tom Bagnat said that the work would take place at Maitland Bay Beach and nearby Bouddi Point, home of the wreck of PS

The "war on weeds" will include hand removal of seedlings along the beach, spraying of weeds from the water and abseiling down cliff faces to spray inaccessible areas of bitou bush.

"There will be extensive hand weeding of seedlings along the entire beach front and the hind dune at Maitland Bay beach, while weeds at the eastern end of the beach, near Bouddi Point will be sprayed.

"This will require access from the NPWS boat because of the remote location of the area and lack of vehicular access.

"Finally, we will try and remove bitou bush from cliff faces in the area, where specially trained staff will use ropes and abseiling techniques to access these

Mr Bagnat said that the control of weeds in bushland along the Central Coast was extremely important to improve the habitat for local native species of plants and animals.

Bitou bush, which originates from the coastal areas of South Africa, is recognised as the worst coastal weed in NSW where it infests 80 per cent of the coastline.

Initially planted between 1946 and 1968 along the coastline for dune stabilisation, the plant has spread to become a weed.

A mature bitou bush plant can produce up to 50,000 seeds per plant per year, is a real concern for coastal bushland.

Mr Bagnat said that bitou bush flowered between April to June, with seed production quickly following so this was the time to remove it before it had the chance to seed and spread even further.

The work to be carried out at Maitland Bay is part a comprehensive pest management program implemented across the region by NPWS.

Cutbacks jeopardise HSC students

We write to you in regard to the recently-established Brisbane Water Secondary College.

As Year 12 students of this school, it has been brought to our attention that our classes will be reduced by two hours a fortnight from seven hours to five for any class that has less then 10 students enrolled.

Again we have been misled by the powers that be and the students at our school will again be disadvantaged.

We were informed that when this college was established the need to reduce face-to-face teaching would be eliminated by creating larger classes.

For example, Year 12 two-unit

mathematics has three classes of approximately seven students each.

With cutbacks from seven hours a fortnight to five, the HSC of these students is in jeopardy as there may not be sufficient hours to complete the course.

Without the completion of this mathematics course, the more advanced students who continue onto mathematics extension 1 and mathematics extension 2, in their own time during Year 12, will not have the sufficient base knowledge of mathematics to complete the extension courses.

For other courses such as physics and biology, subjects that are generally considered more advanced, reducing hours would more than likely affect these

students' HSC results.

Not only are these subjects affected, but rather a large proportion of Year 12 subjects.

This change will only affect the Year 12 students of a college that promised to prevent this issue from occurring.

We just ask for the support of the community, as whilst we are in the middle of our most important year we don't want to waste our time fighting for what should be rightfully ours.

Maybe the department should stop trying to make schools profitable and start making them educational.

Non-complying house allowed to be completed

Gosford Council has voted to allow a house to be completed in Umina which does not comply with height and bulk guidelines.

The house which is currently under construction at 36 The Citadel, Umina, has a roof eave, gutter, and facia, as well as 300mm of a wall for the entire length of one side of the house outside the building envelope specified in the council's own Development Control Plan (DCP) for the area.

The issue came before council as a result of complaints from a neighbour on the non-compliant side of the house.

The house is outside the building envelope as a result of the inaccurate designation of ground level in the house plans.

Instead of removing some rocks at the rear of the block to allow the house to be built at the intended height of 300mm above ground level, the house was raised to 1200mm above, so that the structure is now 900mm higher than originally planned.

The council decided, against mayor Cr Robert Bell's advice, to allow the building to be completed on the grounds that: "The impact on adjoining

premises is not unreasonable."

Cr Bell said: "This is devastating for the adjoining neighbour.

"The impact on them is severe.'

He said that not removing the rocks at the rear of the block had saved on building costs and increased views from the new house at the expense of the neighbour.

Cr Chris Holstein disagreed about the severity of overshadowing

"If you were to change the aspect of this building, there would be bugger-all difference.

"Nothing would change in regard to the neighbour," Cr Holstein said.

Cr Craig Doyle said: "This is only a few percent outside the envelope and we've had items that were 300 per cent outside the DCP and they have still been approved."

The votes were recorded with Crs Brooks, Bockholt and Bell against allowing the house to go ahead, and Crs Holstein, Doyle, Penton and Cook voting to allow the construction to be completed.







Anzac Day

RSL sub-branch started in 1927

There were 28 returned soldiers enrolled at the inaugural Woy Woy RSL sub-branch meeting in 1927 at the Woy Woy Masonic Hall.

Jack Haines, the convenor, had invited Mr. Hadfield from State Branch to give his blessing to the formation of the new Woy Woy Sub-branch of the then Returned Soldiers and Sailors Imperial League of Australia.

The following were elected to office: president BE Vokes, secretary JA Haines, treasurer EJ Foote and committee members JD Askin, Max Thompson, E McCall, GA Brown, AE Winter, JW Hallett and LF English.

To quote from the final item written in the minutes:

"Afterwards a very pleasant hour was spent in song and story."

A quaint and honest closing note for whenever old soldiers meet they cannot refrain from "winning the war again".

At the next meeting it was proudly announced that the subbranch financial balance stood at £3/6/6.

Fired, no doubt, by their newfound togetherness, the executive and members enthusiastically moved and resolved to do many things.

For instance, a request was mailed to the shire council for paint, so that the members could get busy renovating the fence around the Cenotaph.

Auditors and Trustees were appointed and a "guinea a day" expenses was approved for delegates to state conference.

Euchre parties and dances were arranged - those boys really got cracking.

Even at that second meeting, the Anzac tradition was tested, for a member had sustained a serious accident.

So, without hesitation, the proceeds of the next social evening, plus subscriptions, were handed over to the distressed family, amounting to £65/7/6, a princely sum in those days.

At that same meeting, it was voted to send a congratulatory telegram to Bert Hinkler in praise of his splendid flying achievement.

At the April meeting, prior to Anzac Day of 1928, the members evidently desired to conduct a more formal service for they sent a request to the Gosford Light Horse for a loan of a bucket and pole, one can only assume, to introduce the flag raising and lowering ceremony.

Here is an extract from *Reveille* of April 1928, under the heading "What are the sub-branches doing":

Perhaps the most successful Anzac Day Service ever held in Woy Woy was that of Wednesday, 13th Anniversary of Anzac Day.

Many complimentary remarks were passed by those present at the proceedings concerning the arrangements.

They certainly were a credit to those responsible, and there was not a hitch through the day.

At 10am, there was a very large number of people eager to pay respect to Australia's Fallen Heroes, congregated at Woy Woy Public School.

This item is an extract from Woy Woy - Ettalong RSL Sub Branch 1927 to 1977 50th year anniversary souvenir publication.

Captain JW Morriss, marshall, formed the procession into line, and the parade marched to the Woy Woy Cinema Hall, headed by the Standard Bearers, Messrs W Cooke and C Tonkin, the procession included Kincumber Orphanage Boys' Band, Returned

Soldiers (in mufti with decorations), members of the Dads' Association, school children, and general public.

At the service in the hall, Mr BE Vokes, president of Woy Woy RS&I League, acted as chairman.

The Rev AS Creville, rector of Woy Woy, padre for the day, conducted the service.


The Kincumber Boys' Band, under the leadership of Mr T Mellor, and Miss Hilda Davis at the organ, played accompaniments to the various hymns. Sergeant LW Mason

sounded "The Last Post".

Alderman W Fyfe Henderson, of Mosman, a member of the State Executive RSSILA, addressed the congregation and made some highly interesting remarks.

After the Service the procession re-formed and marched to the Memorial Park, where the "Reveille" was sounded, and many beautiful wreaths placed on the monument.



They have assisted Child Flight; hospitals; ambulance services; handicapped children, community centre, a renal unit at Gosford Hospital.




