Patonga application prompts planning review

Gosford Council has ordered a review of planning provisions for small villages, after considering an application for a two-storey house in Patonga.

The review would "ensure the characteristics of smaller villages are maintained".

"Building bigger houses on smaller blocks is at heart of the issue," said Cr Daniel Cook.

The council approved the development of the house in Bay St, Patonga, at its meeting on September 9.

The development application was presented for council consideration after objections from the public.

The council delayed discussion to inspect the property.

According to the council

agenda, neighbours objected to the erection of a two-storey dwelling on the basis of impact on privacy, overshadowing, size and dual occupancy.

The applicant showed council, during the meeting, changes to the design to address some of the objections.

"There has been an endeavour by the applicant to stay with the character there," Cr Chris Holstein said.

Cr Lynne Bockholt said that she thought the development had put council in a bad position.

"Patonga is really a nice little village," she said.

"There are already two storey houses at Patonga.

"It's a lovely atmosphere but it's not consistent.

"We are only picking on this applicant because there is an

objection."

Cr Cook said that the development was typical of a number of development applications, particularly in smaller villages.

"We need to review the building envelope.

"Building bigger houses on smaller blocks is at heart of the issue," he said.

Cr Tony Sansom and Cr Holstein moved that the application be approved with two additional clauses:

"Council review the operation of Clause 10(4) of the Gosford Planning Scheme Ordinance and identify the need for training of staff in relation to the use of character statements.

"A review of floor space ratios contained in DCP 155 be undertaken as soon as possible

to ensure the characteristics of smaller villages are maintained."

Council carried the motion, approving the development.

A staff report in the agenda addressed privacy issues.

"Impact on privacy is not considered excessive or to warrant refusal of the application," the report stated.

Submissions were also made to Council on the basis that overshadowing would impact the premises to the south of the proposal.

"The applicant has submitted shadow impact diagrams for both the equinox and winter solstice which demonstrate that the degree of overshadowing is not unreasonable," according to the

Objections that the development was too big for the

site were dismissed with the statement that the development met regulations with regard to two-storey houses.

"Patonga can be considered as an area which is currently in 'development transition' with older dwellings either being demolished and replaced or extensively refurbished and extended as properties in the area increase in popularity and therefore value," the report claimed.

The council report also dismissed suggestion that the development could be used for dual occupancy development as it was prohibited in Patonga.

"The floor plan of the ground floor does not indicate the installation of any kitchen or cooking facilities," it stated.

Workshop for local oyster processors

SafeFood NSW and the NSW Fishing Industry Council held a workshop with local oyster processors at the **Everglades Country Club** on Tuesday, September 16.

The aim of the workshop was to ensure local processors meet requirements of the state's Seafood Safety Scheme.

Brisbane Water Shellfish Program treasurer Mr Bob Downie and secretary Mr Shane Hill attended the workshop.

The program, which costs approximately \$25,000 per year and is funded by local oyster growers, monitors the quality of water and oyster meat to ensure the meat is safe for human consumption.

The NSW Seafood Safety Scheme is the first of its type in Australia and provides oyster processors with guidelines for proper hygiene, sanitation, and temperature controls.

SafeFood NSW has a developed a safety plan for oyster processors encompassing

safety needs from point-of-catch to wholesale.

Mr Downie said that the workshop was very informative.

"The food safety management plan involves very stringent processing controls," he said.

"It is based on common sense, personal hygiene, and cleanliness of premises and aims to guarantee the safety of the oyster to the consumer."

"It reduces the remote possibility of virus or bacteria transfer to the actual oyster."

"We're moving now to implement the plan."

Mr Hill said that although previous food safety plans more than adequately met food safety standards, SafeFood's plan was another step toward providing the best quality oysters to the

"The plan relates to growing, purifying, and processing and incorporates critical control," he

"The workshop is compulsory for processors.

Rail fares rise from Woy Woy station

Train fares from Woy Woy station increased by five percent from Sunday, August 31, as part of an overall increase by NSW State Rail.

Gosford tickets rose to \$5.60 for an adult return and \$22 weekly, while pensioner return fares rose to \$2.20.

Tickets to Central rose to \$16 for an adult return and \$47 for a weekly ticket, and tickets to Hornsby rose to \$10.40 and \$37 respectively.

Meanwhile, the Minister for the Central Coast, Mr John Della Bosca, has encouraged local public transport users to make

submissions to the government's public transport inquiry.

"We need to ensure that the report's authors are aware of the Central Coast's transport needs and the range of local views on trains and buses, in particular," he said.

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

Spike stopped Woy Woy

The day Woy Woy stopped was in the 1970s and the occasion was the filming of a TV special of Spike Milligan by Bobby Limb.

A huge crowd was gathered in front of the old Woy Woy court house (council chambers) and lying on the front steps of the building was Spike Milligan.

Spike kept on rolling down the steps and Bobby Limb was in danger of falling off his camera perch, laughing at his antics.

The special was shown on prime time TV, a big day for Woy

Again in the 1970s, I was carrying a bag of mail for the 10:20am train for Gosford, when I spied a familiar, rotund, little man, surveying the scenery of Woy Woy Bay.

"You must be Harry Secombe," I said to him.

"That's right," he said.

"Give us a song then." Harry then sang a few bars of

Waltzing Matilda. I nearly said, as Peter Sellars used to say, "you silly twisted man".

Instead I said: "I'll ring Mrs Milligan for you."

Later in the day, I delivered

some telegrams to Mrs Milligan at Orange Grove.

She said: "Listen to them (Spike and Harry). They haven't stopped laughing all day.

"Go and have a peek.

I did, and the laughter waves from Spike and Harry fanned my evebrows

Spike attended a Save Rileys Island meeting at the old Ettalong picture show, and he was in serious mode and he spoke about his love of nature and appreciation of the natural environment.

Later in the early '80s, we were all in the same boat in Pittwater.

Spike, armed with a blunderbuss, was to start the Lord Howe Yacht Race.

In the boat was the Commodore, his adjutant, resplendent in their uniforms, me in a bag of fruit with the deputy mayor's medal, and Spike wearing a cloth cap and grasping the blunderbuss.

The Commodore teed Spike to fire the blunderbuss, but, anticlimax, nothing happened.

Pearl Beach house approved

Gosford Council has houses. approved the development of a house in Diamond Ave, created not by the individual Pearl Beach, following its meeting on September 9.

Following an inspection by Cr Geoff Preece, it passed the application for development.

Cr Preece said that he had some concerns about the removal of cabbage tree palms.

The applicant had submitted to council landscape plans showing a two to one ratio of new plants to those removed, in line with Council's vegetation management

A staff report highlighted the character of the development site and the surrounding area.

"The subject site is located within the 'Wooded Footslope' character place in Pearl Beach," the report stated.

"Architectural styles in this 'character place' and in Diamond Rd where the subject site is located vary from traditional fibro cottages to brick and tile housing constructed in the 70s and early 80s (some of a project home nature) to individually designed

"The character of the area is houses themselves or the materials from which they are constructed but by the way they sit within the landscape, below the tree canopy which is near continuous."

The Council report also noted that in Diamond Ave, Pearl Beach, wide garages should not dominate street frontages

'The garage for the proposed development occupies over half the building frontage.

"Its dominance is further accentuated as it projects forward," the report stated.

"The applicant proposes to reduce the dominance through the use of landscaping, heavily planting the street frontage, planting to partially screen the garage when viewed from the street and use of an informal crushed granite drive.

The Council report set out conditions in line with these concerns and recommended approval.

"It's like going on holidays."


Between customers, Erroll is attempting to build a website for Ettalong businesses and other specialist businesses not represented in Ettalong, promoting their weekly specials.



Business to benefit from school project

Peninsula construction businesses are expected to receive a major boost from the Brisbane Water Secondary College upgrade project, according to Minister for the Central Coast, Mr John Della Bosca.

He said ACH Clifford of Hurstville had won the \$5.2 million construction contract, after the Department of Commerce invited three of its best practice firms to tender for the project.

"The successful contractor has indicated it will use Central Coast firms for subcontracting work and supplies as much as possible," Mr Della Bosca said.

"There is a wealth of skills available in our region and local firms are consistently winning work through competitive pricing and quality workmanship.

"More than 160 tradespeople

and suppliers arc expected to be involved in the Peninsula construction project," he said.

Mr Della Bosca said the successful contractor had worked on many government projects and had an excellent track record.

'The firm's current works program includes the \$983,000 Wetherill Park TAFE College refurbishment, the \$1.6 million Fairfield Heights Public School upgrade and the \$6.3 million Kurri Kurri TAFE College additions," he

Member for Peats Ms Marie Andrews welcomed the news that work was about to start and that local businesses and suppliers would have an opportunity to work on the project.

"Students and staff will greatly benefit from the upgraded and additional facilities," she said.

"The Government has responded to the call from the local community by providing expanded educational facilities at the college.

The upgrade project comprises a new administration building, conversion of the existing administration building to a special education unit and two new car parks at the Woy Woy Campus.

It also includes a new movement studio, upgraded cricket grounds, covered outdoor learning area, bicycle compound and outdoor learning spaces at the Umina campus.

Both sites will also be extensively landscaped once all building activity is completed scheduled for term four in 2004.

The project is being managed by the Department of Commerce on behalf of the Department of Education and Training.

The vaccination program aims to ensure that all school children in Australia with signed consent forms are vaccinated against this

Specially trained registered nurses visited Woy Woy campus on August 28 for the vaccination of years 11 and 12 students and some year 10 students.

The process involved move-

ment to the staff common room, the checking of consent forms, injections, and recovery periods.

The principal of Empire Bay Public School, Mr Gordon Fraser, said that the vaccinations were a response to the high incidence of meningococcal on the Central Coast.

"The message is clear that about three-quarters of all deaths could have been prevented with earlier recognition and treatment," he said.

"School staff are always alert for any of the symptoms and we will immediately contact parents if we have any concerns at all and if necessary call an ambulance and send the student to hospital.

"We take the view that it is better to be overcautious than to take any risk at all."


