Greens call for Minister to save Freewater

NSW Greens Local Government spokesman Mr David Shoebridge MLC has called on the Local Government Minister to intervene to ensure Cr Peter Freewater is not suspended as a Gosford councillor.

Gosford Council called in September for the Director-General of Local Government to suspend Cr Freewater after his comments that a weekend workshop was a "junket" were found to be contrary to the council's code of conduct.

A council-appointed conduct reviewer found that Cr Freewater was in breach of the code when he told the media that an \$8000 weekend workshop for councillors and senior management at Rafferty's Resort Lake Macquarie "junket, completely was a unnecessary and a waste of ratepayers' money".

Another comment, that the "Council are arrogant. They're unbelievable", was also found to be in breach of the code.

Last week Mr Shoebridge said that "Cr Freewater was raising legitimate matters for public debate and he should not have been prosecuted for raising them publicly".

"Cr Freewater has been found to have breached the code of conduct because he was a strident critic of some decisions of his council that he voted against.

"In effect, he has been found guilty of being a councillor."

Mr Shoebridge said that the case highlighted some of the problems with the Code of Conduct.

"Each of these complaints

should have been seen for what they were, political attacks on an inconvenient political voice.

"There needs to be a fundamental change in the way complaints under the Code are initially assessed, with an early, independent and objective review being undertaken by a person well removed from the council's political machinations.

"General managers, who only remain in office if they keep the political support of a majority of councillors, should have no role whatsoever in assessing Code of Conduct complaints.

"In many councils, code of conduct complaints have become political weapons and are used to fight essentially partisan battles using council resources."

"It is fairly clear that the Code of Conduct is not being used to raise the standard of councillor behaviour, rather it has become a petty political tool for those who are willing to use it," Mr Shoebridge said.

Mr Shoebridge said the NSW government was currently reviewing the Model Code of Conduct ahead of the September 2012 local government elections.

As well as calling on the Minister to ensure Cr Freewater is not suspended, Mr Shoebridge said: "We have put in a direct submission to the state government review of the model code of conduct to prohibit this kind of petty use of the code of conduct in future."

Storm causes flash flooding

A thunderstorm on the night of Thursday, January 5, caused flash flooding across the Peninsula and an interruption to electricity supply, dumping 44mm of rain in less than 30 minutes.

Flooding was reported in Ocean Beach Rd and Veron Rd as the rainfall rate reached nearly 125mm

The storm, which started at 11.15pm, was over by midnight, with lightning interrupting electricity supply at about 11.35pm.

A number of phone calls were made to the State Emergency Service from Peninsula residents requiring assistance.

Spokesman Mr Werner Klumpp said the storm "seemed like it was

going to be full on when it hit but moved on fairly quickly".

"We had about 12 calls in about 15-20 minutes so it looked like it was going to be fairly busy but the storm moved across and out to sea, so a lot of the jobs were cancelled," he said.

Mr Klumpp said the majority of the phone calls were from the Peninsula area including Umina,

Ettalong, Empire Bay and Daleys

"Calls came in just after midnight between 12am and 12:30am.

"We called crews immediately and crews responded and were dispatched by 1am, but by then the storm had abated and we started to get calls from residents that assistance was no longer required and that was mainly on the jobs

that people had requested sand bags," he said.

Mr Klumpp said the Service only did about four jobs all night which consisted of protecting leaking roofs, one of which was in Woy Woy.



Rain falls in the first week

The year has started with 45mm rainfall in the first

week of the year, according to figures supplied by Mr Jim Morrison of Woy Woy.

Average rainfall for January is 132.4mm.

Last year finished with a total 1597mm, 29.7 per cent above the annual average of 1231.1mm.

The December rainfall was 103.4mm, 20.8 per cent above the December average of 85.6mm.

Temperatures in December ranged from an overnight minimum of 12.7 degrees on December 4 to

a maximum of 28.0 on December 26, according to figures from www. peninsulaweather.info.

Average minimum for the month was 16.8. The average maximum was 22.5 degrees.

Highest minimum was 20.1 on Christmas Day. Lowest maximum was 18.8 on December 5.

Highest wind gust for the month was 30.2 km/h on December 4.

Christmas trading was 'strong'

Christmas sales at Deepwater Plaza this year have equalled the "strong 2009 figures", according to the Peninsula **Chamber of Commerce.**

Chamber president Mr Matthew Wales said the shopping centre seemed to have recovered from the disruptive effects of the construction of commuter car park and the Charlton St roundabout.

"These are good signs for 2012 and the Chamber intends to ramp up its relationship with Gosford Council in order to improve business conditions especially in the old retail section of Woy Woy," said Mr Wales.

"Umina has been pretty well packed to the rafters over the Christmas break which has translated into brisk business for many retailers.

"Chamber members commented that the entry of anchor retailers like Woolworths, Coles and Aldi have meant an increase in foot traffic and have attracted people from out of town who don't normally shop in Umina's main street.

"It is our view that retail conditions are slowly improving and businesses should look to review their business models and find ways to revamp and refocus their offer to shoppers," he said.

Ferry access 'good', says council

Gosford Council has defended the state of signage and access to the Ferry Rd wharf in Ettalong.

Council's maintenance manager Mr Phil Mitchell said pedestrian access between the public wharf and Ettalong CBD was facilitated via a 1.2 metre wide concrete footpath which "upon inspection was in good condition".

He said pedestrian and vehicular access was also supported by parking restrictions in Ferry Rd and tourist signs provided at the wharf and the intersection with Ocean View Rd

"Council has endeavoured to provide as much signage as

possible to assist residents and visitors in utilising the wharf and ferry service.

"Signs have been placed on the corner of Ferry Rd and Ocean View Rd and two signs on Ocean View Rd indicate directions from both the shopping centre and the Ettalong Town Centre," said Mr Mitchell.

"The southern end of Ferry Rd also has signage directing passengers to the wharf along with a new amenities block and undercover facilities used for waiting for the ferry," he said.

Mr Mitchell also said that as part of Council's ongoing Area Maintenance Program, routine maintenance activities

carried out three times a year in the Ettalong area with reactive works also carried out in response to issues identified by Council staff and local residents.

"This ensures all Council assets are regularly inspected and allows maintenance action to be prioritised on a network wide risk basis.

"The most recent routine maintenance action in this area was undertaken in November of last year and included pavement repairs, footpath maintenance, drain clearing and graffiti removal works," he said.

Brisbane Water detectives are investigating the incident and are urging anyone with information to contact Gosford Police or Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000.



Rezoning for employment where are the details?

Who do councillors represent when they don't support the community?

Are they more interested in major players than the local community?

What was Cr Craig Doyle's response to the pro rezoning irrational staff report to all councillors on August 2, 2011?

It seemed to me that the report was stacked with irrelevant information to enhance rezoning.

Was this another example of "some fairly passionate points of view put forward"?

The report presented to councillors by staff reported that there would be 130 full time and part time jobs created.

McDonalds media relations manager reported to the Central Coast Express Advocate that there was a discrepancy and that the job figure was between 80-100 casual and full time jobs.

Has any staff member or councillor contacted McDonalds to obtain an updated estimate on employment creation?

The site is being rezoned primarily to generate employment, yet neither staff nor councillors know any of the significant details.

It is therefore no surprise that the community opposes the rezoning when Council cannot supply accurate information.

Public transport was highlighted as a plus for the changed use by staff who said "the centre was a focal point for bus services in the local area and the land was located on a major bus route".

This statement was contradicted under a later section with "traffic impact that would need to be assessed when a development application is considered by the

How much of the original report was relevant?



Chamber proposes committee for **Woy Woy**

The Peninsula Chamber of Commerce is pushing to form a working committee for the Woy Woy town centre which would consist of retailers, commercial property owners and Council staff.

The Chamber's decision to support a working committee followed "a successful meeting with mayor Laurie Maher", said Chamber president Mr Matthew Wales.

"The Peninsula Chamber has for some time been highly concerned at the drop in retail business in the old section of the Woy Woy town centre," said Mr Wales.

"This led to an eight-person delegation of Woy Woy retailers and commercial land owners meeting with the mayor and senior Council staff just before Christmas with the view to exploring ways to stimulate long term sustainable business activity in Woy Woy.

"It was a highly pro-active discussion and the Council has agreed to support the creation of a working group that will liaise with Council over the next 12 months," said Mr Wales.

The aim of the committee would be to identify strategies and civic improvement works that would help to stimulate the old retail sector of

Woy Woy and empower retailers and commercial land owners to push for those initiatives.

"The Chamber understands that funds are very tight," said Mr Wales.

"However, if you don't identify the things that need to be done, then we will never be in a position to lobby for funding in the future.

"Mayor Cr Laurie Maher was particularly supportive of the involvement of the business community and this will lead to the formation of the working committee early in 2012.

"It is important that both retailers and land owners are involved in the process so that you have broad business support.

"We are also very grateful for the strong support of Deepwater Plaza general manager Julie Marr who instigated this process.

"The Chamber has acknowledged that it is vitally important to link the old retail section of Woy Woy with Deepwater Plaza in order to strengthen the local economic base.

"It is our view that you need to link all segments of the Woy Woy town centre not only physically but through co-operative marketing," said Mr

Busy time for Marine Rescue

Marine Rescue Central Coast made a number of rescues in the Peninsula area over the New Year period.

The service's rescue boat Centaco 011, formerly known Brisbane Water Lifeboat, responded to a call from a local resident at Ettalong around 2:30pm on Tuesday, January 3, about a yacht firmly stuck on a sandbank near Half Tide Rocks.

The 45-foot yacht with four people on board was reported as just to the south of the port channel marker on the northern side of Half Tide Rocks.

Duty skipper Hunter Leeder and

his crewman Andrew Mackellar were able to move the yacht to navigable water and allow its crew to enjoy the rest of their holiday.

At 3:20pm, Centaco 011 was sent to Lobster Beach to assist a 24-foot half cabin launch with six people on board.

The boat had reported an electrical failure.

The rescue boat towed the vessel to its berth at Blackwall.

Another call was received at 5pm from the owner aboard a 4.3m runabout at Orange Grove that had a mechanical failure.

The four people on board asked for assistance to get the vessel back to Lions Park at Woy Woy.

As this task was being completed, the volunteer crew and Centaco 011 were assigned another task.

Another 4.3m runabout with two people on board had a mechanical problem and was aground near an oyster lease in Paddy's Channel.

This tow was picked up at about 5:35pm and taken to Lintern Channel at Davistown.

The Hardys Bay Residents Group has developed a proposal to improve Hardys Bay in line with the Brisbane Water Estuary Management Plan.

The group has formulated a "Residents Environmental Action Plan" with goals that are consistent with the council's management plan for the bay, according to group president Mr Adrian Williams.

"It seems appropriate that our Group should employ its resources to work with Council in more readily achieving its objectives, namely those designated for Hardys Bay within the Brisbane Water Estuary Management Plan," he said.

He claimed the benefits of the proposal would include enhanced recreational usage in the foreshore precinct which would be carried out through the improvement of public access to those relevant foreshores which are zoned as recreational.

The proposal would also provide greater access to water sports including kayaking, windsurfing, canoeing and fishing in the foreshore precinct and the improved aesthetic enjoyment for tourists and locals through the enhancement of the natural and visual character of both the foreshores and waterways, he said.

The minimisation of rubbish accumulation in the foreshore precinct would also be a focus which would enhance water quality and reduce sedimentation through better water flow.

"We are currently reviewing our options to obtain government funding to implement phase one of our strategy," said Mr Williams.





A Festival Film Night will be held at Cinema Paradiso from 7pm on Saturday, March 17.


The night will explore the theme of Then and Now through stories from local seniors to the youth and a mix of interviews spliced with historical film footage and photos of Ettalong.

Anchor tenants generate business opportunities

Over the years I have always sought to respect the opinions of others in the business community.

However, I felt it necessary to respond to the inaccuracies in the letter from Ms Leisa Smith (Peninsula News, December 23) regarding the proposed McDonalds at Umina Beach and the position of the Peninsula Chamber of Commerce.

Ms Smith claimed that I stated McDonalds would create over 300 jobs as opposed to the franchisee's claim that 100 jobs would be

Ms Smith is incorrect.

The 300 jobs created are as a result of Woolworths, Coles, Aldi and the proposed McDonalds combined.

McDonalds on its own would create over 100 jobs.

Ms Smith also questioned my statement that businesses were beginning to reap the benefits from the recent opening of major retailers in Umina Beach.

While I have not canvassed every business in the town, I have certainly spoken to enough of the business operators to establish that they have seen substantial improvements in trade and turnover which was clearly evidenced by the increase in foot traffic along the main street and the fact that people are clearly excited about doing business and shopping in town.

Woolworths, Coles and Aldi may not have made an impact on Ms Smith's business but I would rather these anchor tenants in town than not.

It is the anchor businesses that generate the customer traffic and the business opportunities that arise.

It's then up to individual businesses as to how they respond to those opportunities including Ms Smith.

Ms Smith also made the statement that I speak for those who pay to be part of the Peninsula Chamber.

Correct! That is what I am elected to do.

My job, which is voluntary, is to firstly look after the interests of our growing Chamber members while being mindful of the interests of the broader business community.

And as to Ms Smith's statement that I have a vested interest in the issue. I absolutely do!

I have an interest in ensuring that Umina Beach is commercially successful and that the best possible business conditions are created to maximise opportunities for both large and small operators.

As to Ms Smith's claim that

somehow McDonalds would take away business from Woy Woy by splitting the available business, it is worthwhile noting that this has not been the case with either Woolworths or Coles.

Our advice is that trade in both Woy Woy operations has held steady and that the new Woolworths at Umina and the Coles upgrade has drawn additional customers from areas outside the Peninsula.

I would rather live and do business in busy West St than struggle to keep my business afloat in a dead city heart like Gosford.

We should all remember that Umina's success is not by accident.

It has come about through the hard work of Peninsula Chamber members who have actively canvassed major retailers and Gosford Council to take the town centre seriously.

Anchor tenants and national retailers provide jobs and spendable income and form part of the successful mix needed for strip shopping centres.

This is something we hope to replicate in the Woy Woy town centre.

I look forward to Ms Smith seizing these new opportunities and being successful in business.


