Droneport details needed, says residents' association

More details about a droneport proposed for the roof of the Woolworths' supermarket in Woy Woy should be included in a development application before Central Coast Council considers its merits, the Peninsula Residents' Association has claimed.

The development application lodged by SLR Consulting Australia Pty Ltd for drone operator Zipline does not provide adequate information to warrant approval, the association said.

The association has asked that the droneport be treated as "prohibited" under the planning provisions.

"The commercial flying of drones" is a new use of the land that requires assessment by Central Coast Council, the association has written in a submission to the council

"The admitted involvement of the Civil Aviation Safety Authority means that the 'physical infrastructure' is ostensibly an 'air transport facility' which is prohibited in the E1 zone.

"The 15km delivery area

consent.

"In any case, the development application should provide full details of the proposed operation.

"The Statement of Environmental Effects for the application does not mention operating times, numbers of drones, flight frequency, flight paths and heights or payload standards.

"It does not state its package landing area requirements or whether or how it would serve the medium density areas of the Peninsula which have minimal open space and less soft areas for landing deliveries.

"Without this information, neither the council nor the community has the necessary basis to support the application.

"Unconditional blanket approval is inappropriate, and neither is conditional approval without an application first publicly disclosing the basis for them and giving the opportunity for submissions to be made about them.

"While the association has not taken a position on the novel use of drones, it would want the community to be fully informed about the proposal and the substantial safety concerns drone delivery services seemed to rely on "maxing out" the operation with high numbers of deliveries, high charges and low numbers of operators.

"The universal view among drone delivery companies seems to be that by far the biggest obstacle they face in setting up a viable operation is government regulation.

"Specific regulations of major importance are the ability to fly a drone beyond line of sight and the ability for a single operator to be responsible for multiple drones.

"The industry says the optimum number is 15.

"This brings costs down to a level where they can compete with other delivery methods."

Mr Wiffen said it was also likely that its viability would rely on its use by other local businesses, such as chemists and fast food operators.

"This is not mentioned in the development application.

"Otherwise, it would be more appropriately located at Woolworths' Warnervale warehouse.

"In Australia, trials of drone delivery has so far been confined to low density areas in Canberra Woy Woy South Public School held its cross country carnival last Tuesday.

"Even if it does not fall under these definitions, the operation would fall under 'any other development not specified' and would be subject to Council addressed before approval of any facility is contemplated."

Residents Association planning specialist Mr Frank Wiffen said: "The idea is that grocery orders will be dropped by parachute to recipients in a matter of minutes." He said a Canberra trial by a

"Many residents were strongly opposed to the drones and started a community-wide protest group," he said.

The following policies and guidelines are designed to support the aims and standards of the newspaper.

Locality

The newspaper's editorial policy reflects a desire to reinforce the Peninsula's sense of community.

To qualify for publication, articles must have specific relevance to the Peninsula. For example, they must be about activities or events happening on the Peninsula or be organised by or involving Peninsula people.

The newspaper is not regional or national in nature, so regional or national issues will not be canvassed except as they affect the Peninsula

Regional sports will only be covered from the perspective of Peninsula clubs. Regional plans will only be aired in the context of their ramifications for the Peninsula.

Peninsula News aims to be inclusive of as much of the Peninsula community as possible

Readability

To ensure that the newspaper serves its purpose, it must be readable and represent the interests and activities of the community in its content.

Contributions to the paper are edited to consistent standards of readability. Guidelines are available for intending contributors.

All items will be dated. They must contain the name of the author to whom the ntribution may be attributed, with their first name spelt out, along with their suburb or organisation. Anonymous contributions will not be accepted.

Other than in the case of holding public figures to account, criticism of others (as opposed to criticism of particular opinions) is unlikely to be published in the interests of facilitating the expression of a diversity of views.

All letter writers need to supply name, address and contact details. Only name and suburb will be published.

Contributors who do not wish the wording of their letter to be changed at all should make a note to this effect when submitting their letter. In some cases, this may result in the letter not being published.

We try to be as accurate as possible. However, mistakes can still slip through.

If you believe we have got something wrong, whether an error of fact or interpretation, we ask that you write to us by email with details for publication. These corrections may appear as Forum letters or as news items and should conform to our requirements for news and Forum contributions

Source lines

Peninsula News includes "source lines" at the end of each article which aim to provide readers with information about where and how we came across the information, so that they might judge for themselves the veracity of what they are reading.

It should not be assumed that the article is a verbatim reproduction of the source. Similarly, it should not be assumed that any reporter listed is necessarily responsible for writing the whole news item. Source lines are not by-lines.

Often articles come from a number of sources. They are edited for readability and reader interest and given different headings, and consequently can be expressed quite differently from the source material. March rainfall was lowest in 20 years

The March rainfall total was the lowest in 20 years, according to figures supplied by Mr Jim Morrison of Umina.

With 31mm recorded for the month, it was less than the previous lowest in the same period, which was 55mm recorded in March last year.

The average rainfall for March is 181mm.

The previous lowest March total was 21.6mm, according to figures recorded at the Everglades Country Club in March 1998.

The highest fall for the month recorded this year was 10.5mm on March 15, with 9.1 recorded on March 17

Falls of more than one millimetre were recorded on seven other days of the month.

Total rainfall so far this year is 245.6mm, which is just over half

"Cyclone Yasa and Cyclone Winston wreaked havoc and destroyed school infrastructure.

"We will support the replacement of guttering and pipes, re-establishment of tanks, taps and wash basins.

"Similarly, we will replace guttering at Naduri primary school and get a water tank functioning again."

Ms O'Neill said that the Rotary clubs in Savusavu and Labasa would oversee the clean water projects and provide updates and





progress reports.

"We worked with Sauvsavu club to distribute re-usable sanitary kits to girls," she said.

"We provided funding for the sanitary kits.

"The girls were thrilled to receive the kits and it helps to cut down on absenteeism."

She said 11 schools had been visited so far with another 20 to follow.

Three-storey dwelling proposal would remove 17 trees

A proposal for a three-storey, three-bedroom second dwelling at 31 The Rampart, Umina, would remove 17 trees and involve extensive earthworks, Central Coast Council has been told.

The new dwelling's frontage would be on a private road connected to The Bartizan.

The development application also involves a Torrens Title subdivision, thereby creating a dual occupancy.

The application states: "The proposed subdivision meets all requirements except for the overall lot size.'

Proposed Lot A is 853.34 square metres and proposed Lot B is 841.66 square metres."

The maximum height of the dwelling proposed for Lot B exceeds planning provision limits.

Portion of the upper storey eave protrudes (beyond) the maximum height.

The "Clause 4.6 variation request" which accompanies the application asks for a variation to allow a 450mm in excess of the maximum height of 8.5m.

The request claims that many properties in the area exceed the maximum height limit and that due to the setback from the street the



impact will be negligible.

The proposed dwelling includes off-street garaging for two vehicles. The application states: "The proposed development has been designed to nestle within the existing contours to minimise impact to the surrounding neighbours."

It claims that the proposed development "does not impact the views of adjacent neighbours" and that the proposed development overshadowing to no "has surrounding neighbours".

It says that the remaining vegetation would be managed


with bushfire in accordance requirements and "complimented with preference for indigenous and drought tolerant plant selections". A licensed arborist or tree

climber would inspect all trees designated for removal for possible fauna. A licensed wildlife handler from ARC Wildlife would be on-call

during the clearing to relocate fauna.

New plans exhibited for dual occupancy

plans have New exhibited for a side-by-side dual occupancy proposed at 49 Ridge St, Ettalong.

The application was lodged in September, and put on exhibition in October as reported in the October 23 issue of Peninsula News.

The development application was most recently listed as "under assessment" but has been listed once more over the Easter weekend as being on public exhibition.

The wording of the application has not changed, only the plans.

No explanation is given for the change.

The plans now show built-in garages located at the front of the property with access from Ridge St.

The original proposal was for vehicle access via the rear lane with open carports instead of garages.

original application The prepared by Sandra Tradd of Red Apple Design stated that she had "made several calls and had several discussions with planners, engineers and tree officers as to the best way to retain the large eucalyptus tree and provide

been carports via the rear laneway".

"The reason the carports and alfrescos couldn't be approved under a complying development certificate along with the remainder of the proposal (main dwellings) is because these structures are proposed within a flood storage area and it is understood that council is inundated with applications now and approving only a minor portion of the proposal may result in a quicker approval."

In the new plans, the large eucalyptus tree at the back is still shown as being retained. However virtually all landscaping initially proposed for the front setback has been replaced by concrete driveways.

Large alfresco areas are proposed for the rear.

The original application claims compliance with all planning controls.

The application and new plans are currently on public exhibition on the Central Coast Council website

No closing date for submissions has been supplied.

Dual occupancy proposed for Karingi St

An application has been lodged for a new two-storey attached dual occupancy, with four bedrooms each, and two-lot Torrens title subdivision at 109 Karingi St, Umina Beach.

The site is zoned general residential (R1).

The application prepared by Tullipan Homes Pty Ltd states: "The proposed dual occupancy is to provide a minimum front setback to the street of 6.59m measured to the main building line and 7.59m to the garage wall.

"The front setback is consistent with the average distance of the setbacks of the nearest two dwellings having the same primary road boundary.

However no shadow diagrams have been exhibited.

Application made to extend 'boat berthing pen'

An application has been made "to extend an existing boat berthing pen adjoining 2/54 Booker Bay Rd, Booker Bay".

The application, prepared by Clarke Dowdle and Associates, states: "The proposed development involves the creation of a boat berthing pen adjacent to the northern side of an existing timber and mesh jetty.

The proposal claims to be consistent with the aims of the

"The proposal is consistent with the design and extent of development that has been undertaken within the immediate vicinity and throughout the foreshore.

"The development is considered minor in scale and would not require filling or excavation to the natural surface levels.

"The proposal would not increase the potential for flooding to the site or neighbouring properties."

In conclusion, the application states: "The proposed waterfront development adjoining 2/54 Booker Bay Rd, Booker Bay, is consistent with the objectives, planning strategies and controls applicable to the site." The proposal is currently on exhibition on the Central Coast Council.

"Setbacks of 1.2m are provided to the eastern and western side boundaries, respectively."

A variation to the side setback requirement of 1.457m to allow 1.2m is requested.

"A setback of 13.94m is provided from the alfresco to the rear boundary.'

The proposal has a single garage per unit with provision for "stacked" parking of another vehicle on the driveway, to comply with the requirements for two off-

According to the Basix certificate, both units have "4+" bedrooms.

No trees are proposed to be removed

A landscape plan shows two native watergums proposed as street trees.

Two weeping lily pillys and two lemon-scented myrtles are proposed to be planted on site. It is claimed that the design is such that no loss of amenity such as solar access or privacy will

The application states that "The proposed dual occupancy fits within the existing and future character of the area having similar setbacks, bulk, and scale, is well articulated and presents well to street."

The proposal is currently on public exhibition on the Council website and available for written submissions until April 16.

"Last year, we were able to host a successful anti-scams forum at Davistown RSL, alongside Minister Stephen Jones, that attracted over 200 people," said Dr Reid.

"The forum was highly

informative, and attendees left with a range of strategies to reduce their likelihood of being targeted by a scam.

"Attendees were also provided with resources that they could use to identify, avoid, and report scams.

"I encourage those interested in learning about strategies to identify and avoid scams to attend", Dr Reid said.

Dr Reid said that the National Anti-Scams Centre's second quarterly report has shown scam losses in October to December last year had almost halved compared to the same period in 2022.

"The Federal Labor Government is focused on reducing the number of people that are targeted and affected by scams, whether it is online, over the phone, or in a letter."

Drone delivery questions go unanswered

The announcement that Woolworths is going to start drone delivery of aroceries on the Peninsula from its Woy Woy shop provides some food for thought.

I am all for the use of new technologies, if they are going to improve our lives, but I see some unanswered questions arising from the very limited and highly slanted information that has been released so far.

The first thing that strikes me is that the drones have a maximum carrying capacity of three kilograms.

This means, for example, that you can't order a packet of flour and a packet of sugar to be delivered by the same drone.

A week's shopping that would fill a trolley would take one car trip to the supermarket but might need 10 drones to transport it by air.

Is this really a practical option for more than the most limited kind of shopping?

Secondly, much is made of the fact that each drone flight is less polluting than a single car trip, but, if multiple drone flights are required, the advantage disappears.

For myself, I very rarely make a car trip that is only to the supermarket.

If I still have to make my other trips anyway (to the library, the hardware store, the pharmacy,

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the petrol station), a drone is just adding to the overall pollution, to no advantage at all.

Thirdly, my understanding is that the goods will be dropped by parachute from the drones.

What sort of pinpoint accuracy does this technology achieve?

In a wind, is my delivery going to end up in the next backyard?

My open area is very small: it would take a degree of skill I am doubtful about to place a package on my patio, particularly if more than one drone is required to make the delivery.

What happens when it falls onto the roof of my house instead of into the patio: will a Woolworths representative come and remove it for me?

Fourthly, is the delivery capsule waterproof?

If it lies in my patio and is rained on before I collect it, who is responsible for replacing anything that is water-damaged?

Fifthly, what about the delivery capsule and the parachute that are required for each sortie?

Does this just become more garbage to go into our landfill, just at the time when people have become accustomed to bringing reusable bags with them to the supermarket?

This does not seem, in any way, eco-friendly.

Sixthly, drones are noisy. One might be nothing more than an intermittent nuisance (bad enough), but a fleet of them could be an unbearable annoyance.

We already have enough noise pollution on the Peninsula, without adding to it, unless there is a demonstrable necessity - clearly, not the case at this point.

Seventhly, who will be responsible when there is an accident?

Will the operators be tested and licensed in some way?

Is Woolworths guaranteeing the safety of this system or setting up a compensation procedure for when something goes wrong?

What recourse will there be when the first injury or damage occurs?

Eighthly, who will regulate the operation?

It seems unlikely that Central Coast Council has control of the sky over the Peninsula (and who would trust the Council to do the job properly, anyway).

Does the Department of Civil Aviation have jurisdiction: can anybody see the Department allocating resources for monitoring this kind of picayune exercise? This is a worry.

Ninthly, what about all the other questions that I haven't thought of? When will the community get a



Memorial service reveals a life-long love story

A memorial to a member of the Troubadour Folk Club, the Labor Party and the Central Coast Conservatorium who died on November 29 has revealed a life-long love story.

The lovers were separated as young adults and reunited 22 years later to live happily together in Sydney and Brisbane before spending the last decade in retirement on the Peninsula.

Mr Valentin Hadjiev died suddenly and unexpectedly of a heart attack at the age of 71.

The memorial was held at the Hardy's Bay Club on March 14.

The son of the Bulgarian consulgeneral to NSW, Mr Hadjiev grew up in Slovakia, USA, Tanzania and Bulgaria before coming to Australia, where he graduated in law in Sydney in 1976.

He met future wife, Ms Stephanie Short, in a shared house in Newtown in November 1975, when they both students at the University of Sydney.

"We were attracted to each



For 21 years, Dr Short did not know whether he was alive or dead.

Despite her letters to him, she heard nothing.

Her friend, Dr Elizabeth Kuzmanovska, told the memorial service that, in Bulgaria, Mr Hadjiev had had a traditional Bulgarian wedding, a family and a successful career in international law.

But then, "Valentin had a deep epiphany and embarked on a soul-searching journey to locate Stephanie, some 20 years later."

Using the power of the internet, he found Dr Short by email, where she was working as an academic at the University of NSW.




