Council proposes \$12.3M in capital spending

Central Coast Council is cost of \$800,000 also funded from proposing to spend \$12.3 million of its \$309.9 capital works program for 2024-2025 on the Peninsula.

This is just 4.0 per cent of the capital budget for the 11.6 per cent of the Central Coast's population resident on the Peninsula.

Leading the capital works program on the Peninsula is an allocation of \$2 million to start the construction of the "south cell" at Woy Woy tip.

Over three years, this work is expected to cost \$16.2 million.

Construction of an "eastern platform" at the tip will cost another \$1.75 million this year, with a total cost of \$2.8 million over three

Work on seven sewer pumping stations at Woy Woy, Umina and Horsfield Bay and a rising main at Ettalong will cost \$1.90 million this year and a total of \$8.09 million over three years.

A car park upgrade at James Brown Oval will cost \$920,000, funded from grants and developer contributions.

The Woy Woy Waterfront project is budgeted for the coming financial year, with the cost of \$816,000 funded by developer contributions.

A shared path on The Esplanade and Barrenjoey Rd, Ettalong, will be constructed at a

developer contributions.

Changing room "renewal" at the Peninsula Leisure Centre will cost \$1.5 million over two years, coming from general rates revenue.

A car park upgrade of Rogers Park carpark will cost \$750,000, funded by a combination of general rates revenue and developer contributions.

An upgrade of roads and drains at Patonga camping ground will cost \$500,000 this year and a total of \$3.57 million over three years.

Work on the Wov Wov Baths will cost \$494,360 this year and \$653,000, with the money coming from a combination of a grant and

Other projects in the program are a footpath in Pozieres Ave, Umina, work on the Pearl Beach lagoon and on the playground at Lions Park, Woy Woy.

The Rip Rd Reserve seawall will have \$700,000 spent on it over two years.

Peninsula Theatre will have seating, foyer and lighting "renewal" over two years totalling

Work is also expected to take place on the Mingaletta hall, the Umina childcare centre and to fence off endangered Umina Coastal Sandplain Woodland in Umina.

The capital budget includes \$89

million of "region-wide" spending which has no obligation to be spent on the Peninsula.

Disregarding this amount, the budget for the Peninsula represents just 5.5 per cent of the

A further \$5.55 million is listed this year under "pending grants" for the upgrade of the Ocean Beach Rd-Rawson Rd intersection, which if approved would increase the figure to 5.7 per cent of the capital

The capital budget is expected to open for public submisions as part to the Council's draft Operational Plan for the year.

The Operational Plan shows the capital expenditure of \$309.9 million is less than one third of the total budget, with operating expenses of \$712.8 million budgeted for the council operation for the coming year

However, scant detail is given of the operating expense.

Materials and services have been budgeted at \$236.7 million and employee costs at \$213.1 million, while depreciation and amortisation at \$202.9 million.

Borrowing costs and "other expenses" amount to \$59.9 million.

There is no indication of how much of the operating budget can be attributed to the Peninsula.

Editorial policy and guidelines

At its heart, Peninsula News is a community effort.

It welcomes and relies on the contributions provided voluntarily and at no cost by local organisations, groups and residents.

The newspaper aims to be accessible to the community - both through making its columns accessible to community groups and by having copies available in accessible locations, including through its website.

The following policies and guidelines are designed to support the aims and standards of the newspaper.

Locality

The newspaper's editorial policy reflects a desire to reinforce the Peninsula's sense of community.

To qualify for publication, articles must have specific relevance to the Peninsula. For example, they must be about activities or events happening on the Peninsula or be organised by or involving Peninsula people.

The newspaper is not regional or national in nature, so regional or national issues will not be canvassed except as they affect the Peninsula.

Regional sports will only be covered from the perspective of Peninsula clubs. Regional plans will only be aired in the context of their ramifications for the Peninsula.

Peninsula News aims to be inclusive of as much of the Peninsula community as possible.

Readability

To ensure that the newspaper serves its purpose, it must be readable and represent the interests and activities of the community in its content.

Contributions to the paper are edited to consistent standards of readability. Guidelines are available for intending contributors.

All items will be dated. They must contain the name of the author to whom the contribution may be attributed, with their first name spelt out, along with their suburb or organisation. Anonymous contributions will not be accepted.

Forum letters

The Forum section provides the opportunity for readers to express their views on any aspect of Peninsula community life, with the aim of reflecting the community's diversity of oninion.

Nevertheless, letters may be edited for readability, including for length, spelling and grammar, and to avoid legal liability on the part of the newspaper, or they may be declined altogether.

Contributors are asked to keep their contributions to the matter at hand, and to

focus on the issues and not abuse or insult others.

Other than in the case of holding public figures to account, criticism of others (as opposed to criticism of particular opinions) is unlikely to be published in the interests of facilitating the expression of a diversity of views.

All letter writers need to supply name, address and contact details. Only name and suburb will be published.

Contributors who do not wish the wording of their letter to be changed at all should make a note to this effect when submitting their letter. In some cases, this may result in the letter not being published.

Corrections

We try to be as accurate as possible. However, mistakes can still slip through.

If you believe we have got something wrong, whether an error of fact or interpretation, we ask that you write to us by email with details for publication. These corrections may appear as Forum letters or as news items and should conform to our requirements for news and Forum contributions.

Source lines

Peninsula News includes "source lines" at the end of each article which aim to provide readers with information about where and how we came across the information, so that they might judge for themselves the veracity of what they are reading.

It should not be assumed that the article is a verbatim reproduction of the source. Similarly, it should not be assumed that any reporter listed is necessarily responsible for writing the whole news item. Source lines are not by-lines.

Often articles come from a number of sources. They are edited for readability and reader interest and given different headings, and consequently can be expressed quite differently from the source material.

Peninsula News usually receives its information in three ways: It is sent to us by someone wanting to promote their activities; it is sent to us in response to our inquiries; or it comes from a newsletter or other document to which we have access.

Sometimes we may interview a person or report what they said at a meeting.

The following descriptions are used:

Media Release - unsolicited contributions.

Media Statement - sent in response to our questions. Website or Social Media - information published online. Newsletter or Report - published in print or online. Interview or Meeting - statements recorded by a reporter.

Forum contributions may be: **Email** if sent electronically and **Letter** if written on paper.

Twice the average April rainfall

The Peninsula has had more than twice the average rainfall for April by last Friday, April 26.


A total of 312mm has been recorded, compared to the month's average of 148mm, according to Mr Jim Morrison of Umina.

The total is the third highest April rainfall in 20 years, behind a fall of 349mm in 2022 and 432mm in 2015.

The cumulative total to date this year is 558mm, just 7.6 per cent below the average of 604mm at the end of April.

In the past fortnight, 50.6mm of rain fell over six days, following falls totalling 261.7mm in the first half of the month.

Grant announced for Pearl Beach lagoon

The NSW Government has announced a grant of \$107,750 for coastal works at Pearl Beach Lagoon.

The project will focus on key management actions from the Pearl Beach Lagoon Coastal Management Program, said Member for Gosford Ms Liesl Tesch.

It will include retrofitting stormwater quality improvement measures, including two sediment traps, which will be constructed on the main drain inlets into the lagoon, reducing sediment loads entering the lagoon, she said.

"In doing so, this project will also investigate options for removing material from the bed of the lagoon.

"It will also result in the removal of sediment plumes from drain outlets, with this material treated and repurposed on-site to rehabilitate eroded shorelines and enable planting of wetland vegetation.

"This will result in reduced sediment inputs, while removing sediment plumes and rehabilitating and revegetating eroded banks, improving water quality over time and restoring our Pearl Beach coastal system."

Ms Tesch said the money came

from the implementation stream of the 2023-24 Coastal and Estuary Grants Management Program.

"The funding received will be welcomed by the Pearl Beach and wider community.

"The Pearl Beach community has been fighting for investment to protect the lagoon for years.

"Our coastal systems are home to countless flora and fauna, which thrive in the unique location of Pearl Beach and funding to address issues such as sediment plumes and eroding shorelines is desperately needed."

Pearl Beach resident Mr Malcolm Davison said: "It's been some 14-15 years since we first started agitating to rehabilitate the lagoon.

"This is the first step – the silt traps – to stop it getting worse and then gradually giving us the opportunity to improve the water quality with some strategic planting of water-based trees.

"It's a natural lagoon. It's not man-made. It has been here for generations.

"It's a magical place, just listen to the bird life here."

Petition for upgrade of Ettalong Beach

"I would encourage the community to help this project become a reality by supporting this petition and sharing with family and friends", Dr Reid said.

Mr Wales said: "Based on the huge success of the previous foreshore upgrade, the Chamber fully supports the continued upgrade to the south towards Ettalong Point so that this area can be made more accessible to the community."

"The Ettalong Beach foreshore is one of our best assets and attracts thousands of visitors each vear.

"The continued upgrade works will enhance the foreshore, improve community access, and boost the local Ettalong Beach economy.

"As a first step, the Chamber fully supports the preparation of a Strategic Plan that encompasses improvement works that are sympathetic to the local environment and sets out a staged upgrade that can be costed for future funding."

Application argues precedent justifies non-compliance

The applicant for a new twostorey garage and studio at 210 The Esplanade, Umina Beach, has claimed the precedent of a neighbouring house to justify exceeding height limits by more than 1.5 metres.

The application prepared by Clarke Dowdle and Associates states: "The proposal includes the erection of attached outbuilding includes a double garage, and storage to cater for the residents is located on the ground floor with the first floor would including a living room with a wet bar, bedroom and bathroom."

It acknowledges the proposed height of 6.38 metres exceeds the 4.8 metre height requirement for outbuildings and ancilliary development.

The floor area of the ground floor garage store is 90.05 square metres, while the upstairs studio floor area is 68.3 square metres.

The application notes that the maximum floor area permitted for outbuildings is 85 square metres.

The maximum floor areas for a detached studio is 50 square

The site is 739.8 square metres



in area and is rhombus-shaped, at the rear it adjoins the foreshore.

The application claims: "The proposal is commensurate with the scale and height of the outbuilding at No 212 on the adjoining lot and as such would not be setting a precedent in the area."

It notes a previous application was "withdrawn due to concerns raised in relation to height, bulk and aesthetics".

"Subsequently, a new design has been undertaken to mitigate these concerns."

It argues: "The proposed outbuilding will assist in providing visual and acoustic privacy from

the units located on the northern side of the road reserve."

It concludes: "The ancillary dwelling-house proposal is consistent with the height and scale of development within the residential zone and is commensurate with the character of development within the immediate and surrounding area."

The proposal is currently on public exhibition and available for written submissions.

Central Coast Council has not specified a closing date.

Droneport application receives 10 submissions

The application for a droneport to be located on the roof of the Peninsula Plaza at 48–64 Blackwall Rd, Woy Woy, has received 10 submissions, according to Central Coast Council's planning portal.

Eight of the 10 complained about the lack of adequate community consultation and transparency.

Seven complained about the potential for noise pollution.

Four complained about the lack of detail in the application, and three had concerns about the dangers of drone operations to infrastructure and public.

Other issues raised were harmful effects on wildlife, privacy concerns, lack of council planning, incompatibility with an E1 zone and the Peninsula being an unsuitable area for this kind of operation.

Lack of transparency about the meeting between Council Administrator Mr Rik Hart and Woolworths about the proposal to purchase adjacent land in Austin Butler Reserve appears to have resulted in a lack of trust in the council.

One submission states: "One cannot but think back to how this 'putting the cart before the horse' proposal might have looked had Woolworths persuaded the Administrator to sell off Austen Butler Reserve without adequate community consultation."

It says the consultation "was actually forced on Council's Administrator and not initiated by him in his personal strong support for the proposal".

"Those now-saved Austen Butler Reserve trees might still later be the subject of a Woolworths Woy Woy application to Council for severe trimming or even removal to facilitate drone movement on the relevant rooftop boundary side."

Another submission quotes the applicant's intention to seek approval of the Civil Aviation Safety Authority between March and April and asks that the outcome of this be placed in the public domain for comment.

One submission is heavily redacted.

The submission refers to the proposed droneport being in "close proximity" to a "high security facility", where "the activities conducted" are of a "sensitive nature" and "recording devices are commonly used".

It claims the droneport "could potentially compromise the integrity of the premises and the safety of staff and stakeholders" and "undermine the integrity" of the facility's operation.

"Consideration should be given to flight path restrictions and hours of operation."

The Council has not explained its redactions, which do not appear to be requested in the submission or its covering letter.

Normally, redactions are limited to personal privacy and protecting the identity of individuals.

However, they go beyond that in this case.

Another submission simply asks the down-to-earth question not answered in the application: "How does the parachute get returned?"

The submissions are publicly-available on the Council's planning portal as part of the documentation for the application DA/204/2024.

Double garage proposed in front setback

Central Coast Council has received a development application for the construction of a detached double garage at 23 Hobart Ave, Umina Beach.

It is proposed that the garage be built on the front setback of an existing house.

The application acknowledges the proposal does not comply with planning provisions, which require a 9.355 metre setback.

A setback of 2.281 metres is requested.

The application prepared by Designsmart Living states: "The existing dwelling on the subject lot is of a sufficient size to warrant a double garage and given the existing dwelling house footprint there is no alternative but to utilise the front setback area.

The application claims: "The garage height is minimal in design and a sufficient space remains for deep soil plantings.

"The existing front hedge is to be retained which will screen the frontage entirely. "The side of the streetscape

can absorb this variation and the design is compatible with the character of the area."

The site has an area of 557.2 square metres and is zoned Residential R2.

The site contains a single storey clad dwelling on the northern side of Hobart Ave.

It has frontages to lanes to the east (side) and the north (rear) boundaries.

There is an existing single garage accessed from the rear lane.

"The existing storage shed at the rear of the property is narrow and not suitable for a garage given the constraints of the rear pool and landscaped rear yards," the application states

The proposed double garage measures 6.2 metres by 6.3 metres and is to be located 0.516m from the side boundary.

"The adjoining neighbour to the east nearest building is eight metres away and separated by a lane."

The application is currently on public exhibition and available for written submissions.

The council website does not state a closing date for submissions.

'Not on your TOD' - council

Public submissions made by Central Coast Council do not support the claim made by Premier Mr Chris Minns, later confirmed by the Department of Planning, that Central Coast Council asked for Woy Woy station to be included in the Government's high density planning scheme.

The Premier said on Friday, April 12: "The six new stations are Cardiff, Cockle Creek, Belmore, Lakemba, Punchbowl and Woy Woy.

"These stations were a suggested by councils fo inclusion."

The Department told Peninsula News on Saturday, April 13: "Central Coast Council put forward Woy Woy as a location for the SEPP to be introduced."

None of the council's public submissions about the Transport-Oriented Development (TOD) program made any reference to Woy Woy.

They referred to Tuggerah, Wyong and Gosford stations, and

ask that they "be excluded from the future TOD SEPP application due to the low opportunity for housing

The submissions were made to the Department's consultation on its proposed Transport-Oriented Development Program and to its consultation about its Low- and Mid-Rise Housing Reform.

A submission made at the end of January states: "Council staff have been involved in the 'targeted consultation' and attended a briefing with Department staff on 22 January 2024 to understand the proposed changes to planning controls within 400m of Tuggerah, Wyong and Gosford train stations.

It has also been reported that Council general manager Mr David Farmer has stated that the Council did not ask for Woy Woy station to be included.

No public details of the Department's "targeted consultation" with Central Coast Council staff appear to be available.

Woy Woy residents make less use of toll roads

Residents of Woy Woy significantly make less use of Sydney toll roads Gosford residents, according to figures released by Member for Gosford Ms Liesl Tesch.

Both groups make less use of them than the average Central

Announcing the opportunity for motorists to claim their "toll cap cash back", Ms Tesch said the Central Coast average would be

\$134 for toll account holders who have spent more than \$60 a week.

She said the average entitlement was \$121 for Gosford residents in the 2250 postcode area, but only \$95 for Woy Woy residents in the 2256 postcode area.

"The \$60 toll cap cashback is helping to bring relief to where it is needed, particularly for our significant commuter population,"

Passenger train collides with car at level crossing



It's time for the Rawson Rd level crossing to be removed

The dangerous railway level crossing at Rawson Rd, Woy Woy, has over the years been the scene of far too many tragic deaths through fatal vehicle accidents and suicides.

The latest incident on Friday, April 19, of a car mistakenly turning onto the rail lines at the level crossing, could have been fatal.

It created a long rail stoppage to north and south rail lines for so many Friday evening peakhour commuters and was another incredibly expensive, unplanned incident, involving rail replacement by buses (Hornsby-Gosford), with additional emergency workers, ambulance, police and fire personnel attending.

At what cost?

What a huge Friday peak-hour upheaval for train travellers trying

This latest event would not have happened if the Rawson Rd Level crossing had been removed when planned, years ago.

This is a busy rail crossing on the main northern rail line and vehicle traffic is stopped every few minutes for passenger trains and freight trains to pass, all day and night 24/7.

When a train activates the level crossing boom gates and stops all road traffic, it also stops ambulances and fire trucks. desperate to save someone's life or a house on fire.

The level crossing is the only way for tall critical vehicles like ambulances and fire trucks to get across the rail line in an emergency.

There is no other way to cross the rail tracks.

Traffic can be stopped for many minutes when a 1.8km long, slow freight train enters the level crossing and that occurs many times each hour, night and day 24/7.

Is that good enough in 2024? The answer is obviously No.

In addition, Woy Woy Rd users deserve better than a rickety, old and dangerous one-way traffic bypass under the rail line adjacent to the boat ramp on Woy Woy Rd.

You and I use this by-pass and so do thousands of other drivers, particularly those getting to and from work each day.

It is dangerous, confusion on both sides, with resultant congestion and delays.

The Central Coast Council provided the design and completed all of the site preparation (outside of the rail corridor) and the critical road tunnel-rail bridge project under the rail line was unfortunately shut down by poor decision making at the time.

Stage one was successfully completed before stage two (the critical bit) was abruptly shut down.

To quote Gough Whitlam: "It's

It's time for action to complete the most important section of the project, the road tunnel-rail bridge, to create a smooth unrestricted two-way traffic flow under the main northern rail line.

It's time for our community to be vocal and demand that the Rawson Rd level crossing be removed and replaced with a road tunnel by the Minns Government, now.

Will the government invest in a new transport paradigm?

While Central Coast Council is currently running a Wellbeing Survey, does anyone ever stop to think what the impacts of their planning decisions have on the health and wellbeing of communities with increased density, transport plans and reduced open space?

Transport-Oriented The Development plan proposed for Woy Woy to increase housing stock needs to secure Infrastructure funding beyond spending on roads and carparks.

Will the Government commit to a full-time public hospital at Wov Woy, increased open space and improved public transport as part of the proposal?

Or are all levels of Government just looking to cram more houses into the Woy Woy Peninsula?

Cities and urban areas are not just houses, units and roads for cars, but require varying open spaces, connected tree lined pathways, physical infrastructure of public transit, hospitals, arts and education, all of which increase the liveability of neighbourhoods and the well-being of the residents.

Increased density means increased mobility challenges which the CBDs cannot address without mass transit systems.

Transport-Oriented

Development doesn't mean we just build up the population around a single transport node, such as a train station.

It needs to implement a high quality, reliable transit service around the clock (day and evening frequencies of at least every 15 minutes) to connect the heavy gauge train network to light rail or bus network to move people around communities.

A mass transit system aids in reducing traffic congestion, freeing up car parking space and reduces transport disadvantage.

There are also significant health and environmental benefits in increasing the amenity of an area, including cleaner air and less noise pollution, increased community health with greater involvement in active transport.



Aged care staffing changes



How much scrutiny did Minister give Woy Woy decision?

The situation with the Central Coast's Transport-Oriented Development rezonings is getting very murky.

The Minister says that he added Woy Woy to Gosford, Tuggerah and Wyong as rezoning sites, at Council's request.

Council says that not only did it not ask for Woy Woy to be added to the list but that the Minister was specifically asked to delete Gosford, Tuggerah and Wyong from the list, a request that the Minister has ignored.

Regardless of the rights of the matter (which we'll probably never find out), the Minister will, presumably, proceed with the new State Environment Planning Policy to include Woy Woy.

The new provisions are to come into effect almost immediately, and, since Woy Woy was not intended to be in the original tranche, it is probable that Peninsula residents have given no thought to what the effect might be, so there is

something serious for them to consider.

This is particularly the case because there is to be a second round of rezonings at a later date, and it is quite possible that other areas on the Peninsula will be brought under the provisions of the Policy, perhaps with as little warning to residents as the current one.

Of course, it is pertinent to wonder how carefully the decision was scrutinised by the Minister.

The area affected lies within a 400-metre radius of Woy Woy Station, and even a cursory glance at a map will show that more than half of this area is water or railway line where, one assumes, the possibilities for residential development are limited.

In fact, there are only two small fragments of residential zoning within the circle, one of which is already occupied by flats, and the other of which has very small potential for assembly and redevelopment as high-density

What do fall within the radius are Woy Woy Oval and the Woy Woy business district, but it is difficult to suppose that even our Council is contemplating selling off the oval and tennis courts (although, who knows?), so the rezoning must be aimed at the commercial sites along Blackwall Rd and Railway St.

If that is the case, what is the impact likely to be?

The floor space ratio will increase from 2.3 to 3.0, which means that about one-third more floor space will be allowed.

However, permissible height will only increase from 19.75 metres to 21.00 metres, which is insufficient for even one extra floor.

This means we shall get bigger, squat buildings, more crowded together and offering less light, ventilation, privacy and outlook than provided for under the present controls.

Furthermore, the requirements for parking are to be reduced in a location where parking is already inadequate, so the Woy Woy business centre will become even more difficult to access than it is now.

Liesl Tesch's comment ("Tesch welcomes high-density housing", PN 592) that the change will "provide more affordable housing within our community" is completely fatuous.

The costs of these kinds of buildings on these high-price sites will put them far out of the "affordable" price range, so they will be mainly targeted for yuppie commuters (not that I have anything against yuppie commuters - the more the better - but let us not pretend that the purpose of the rezoning is what it's not).

In this context, it is pertinent to ask what happened to the Woy Woy Centre Plan that was announced with much fanfare in 2019?

If the Council showed any degree of competence, we'd already have a workable project for the area and not be faced with this fait accompli from the Minister.


The Council is arguing that changes should not be made without a proper detailed plan for the zone, but the Council has already had five years to prepare such a plan, so who gives any credence to the idea that it will succeed in the next five years, when it has failed in the past five years?

It is probably too late to make representations to the Minister now about Woy Woy, but let us be alert for the next tranche of zoning changes that are likely to be directed at the Umina and Ettalong shopping centres.

Clearly, we can't rely on the Council to protect our interests.
