Council to confirm alcohol-free zones

Central Coast Council plans to confirm alcohol-free zones in Woy Woy, Umina, Ettalong, Pearl Beach and Patonga for another four years.

The proposal is on exhibition for public comment until Wednesday, July 3.

"The aim of an alcohol-free zone is to reduce alcohol-related crime, violence and anti-social behaviour in identified locations in order to help create a safer environment for the whole community," according

to the council's consultation web

"An alcohol-free zone is only established in areas where there is sufficient evidence of irresponsible behaviour as a result of drinking.

"If warranted, new locations may be considered and proposed for implementation."

Anyone wanting to extend or establish an alcohol-free zone is advised to contact council's project officer Ms Madalaine Anderson in the first instance by email to infrastructureprojects@

centralcoast.nsw.gov.au or by telephoning Council on 4306 7900.

The zones proposed by council staff consist of public roads, car parks and footpaths,

"These zones will not restrict outdoor dining licences where Council approval has been granted."

Editorial policy and guidelines

At its heart, Peninsula News is a community effort.

It welcomes and relies on the contributions provided voluntarily and at no cost by local organisations, groups and residents.

The newspaper aims to be accessible to the community - both through making its columns accessible to community groups and by having copies available in accessible locations, including through its website.

The following policies and guidelines are designed to support the aims and standards of the newspaper.

Locality

The newspaper's editorial policy reflects a desire to reinforce the Peninsula's sense of community.

To qualify for publication, articles must have specific relevance to the Peninsula. For example, they must be about activities or events happening on the Peninsula or be organised by or involving Peninsula people.

The newspaper is not regional or national in nature, so regional or national issues will not be canvassed except as they affect the Peninsula.

Regional sports will only be covered from the perspective of Peninsula clubs. Regional plans will only be aired in the context of their ramifications for the Peninsula

Peninsula News aims to be inclusive of as much of the Peninsula community as possible

Readability

To ensure that the newspaper serves its purpose, it must be readable and represent the interests and activities of the community in its content.

Contributions to the paper are edited to consistent standards of readability. Guidelines are available for intending contributors.

All items will be dated. They must contain the name of the author to whom the contribution may be attributed, with their first name spelt out, along with their suburb or organisation. Anonymous contributions will not be accepted.

Forum letters

The Forum section provides the opportunity for readers to express their views on any aspect of Peninsula community life, with the aim of reflecting the community's diversity of opinion.

Nevertheless, letters may be edited for readability, including for length, spelling and grammar, and to avoid legal liability on the part of the newspaper, or they may be declined altogether.

Contributors are asked to keep their contributions to the matter at hand, and to

focus on the issues and not abuse or insult others.

Other than in the case of holding public figures to account, criticism of others (as opposed to criticism of particular opinions) is unlikely to be published in the interests of facilitating the expression of a diversity of views.

All letter writers need to supply name, address and contact details. Only name and suburb will be published.

Contributors who do not wish the wording of their letter to be changed at all should make a note to this effect when submitting their letter. In some cases, this may result in the letter not being published.

Corrections

We try to be as accurate as possible. However, mistakes can still slip through.

If you believe we have got something wrong, whether an error of fact or interpretation, we ask that you write to us by email with details for publication. These corrections may appear as Forum letters or as news items and should conform to our requirements for news and Forum contributions.

Source lines

Peninsula News includes "source lines" at the end of each article which aim to provide readers with information about where and how we came across the information, so that they might judge for themselves the veracity of what they are reading.

It should not be assumed that the article is a verbatim reproduction of the source. Similarly, it should not be assumed that any reporter listed is necessarily responsible for writing the whole news item. Source lines are not by-lines.

Often articles come from a number of sources. They are edited for readability and reader interest and given different headings, and consequently can be expressed quite differently from the source material

Peninsula News usually receives its information in three ways: It is sent to us by someone wanting to promote their activities; it is sent to us in response to our inquiries; or it comes from a newsletter or other document to which we have access.

Sometimes we may interview a person or report what they said at a meeting.

The following descriptions are used:

Media Release - unsolicited contributions.

Media Statement - sent in response to our questions. Website or Social Media - information published online. Newsletter or Report - published in print or online. Interview or Meeting - statements recorded by a reporter.

Average June rain falls in one week


The Peninsula has had 94 per cent of the average June rainfall in the first week of the month.

Falls of 100.9mm on June 2 and 22.8mm on June 7 contributed to a total of 132.9mm, just 8.1 mm short of the June average of 141mm, according to figures supplied by Mr Jim Morrison of Umina.

Last month finished with a total of 241.7mm, more than three times the May average of 74mm.

Rainfall this year totalled 799.6mm at the end of May, 17.9 per cent above the average of 678mm.

After last week's rain, the year's total was 932.5mm, already 13.9 per cent more than the average mid-year figure of 819mm and more than the total for last year.

Council installs cameras to monitor unpatrolled beach

Cameras will be installed at Umina Beach before summer "to monitor unpatrolled areas and beach profiles", according to Central Coast Council.

"We are already preparing for the 2024-25 season," said Council beach safety manager Mr Phil Cantillon.

The cameras would be installed under the NSW Government Smart Beaches program,

"As always, Council remains committed to investing in making our beaches safer for locals and visitors," he said.

The cameras follow the installation of an emergency response beacon at Pearl Beach last year.

Mr Cantillon said the beacon was "a critical addition to beach safety infrastructure and can make

all the difference in an emergency, as they connect callers to Surf Life Saving NSW's State Operations Centre which enables a faster response to potential rescues, particularly in unpatrolled areas".

He said: "Over the winter period, Council will also be updating its beach safety fleet with seven new Can-Am buggies.

"Additionally, lifesaving equipment will be serviced and repaired, including radio networks, two-way radios, oxygen equipment and lifeguard towers."

The 2024-25 beach patrol season will start on Saturday, September 28, with Surf Life Saving Clubs on patrol, and Monday, September 30, with Council Lifeguards.

Attendees enjoyed a morning tea of scones and tea and coffee, with champagne on arrival and music from singer-guitarist Chris Buchanan.

Cancer is a major cause of illness and death in Australia, she said.

"In 2021, it was estimated that about 151,000 Australians would be diagnosed with cancer (413 per day) and 49,000 would die (135 per day).

"One in two Australians will receive a cancer diagnosis by the age of 85. "Thanks to research by bodies such as the Cancer Council, more than 66 per cent of people diagnosed with cancer in Australia will survive more than five years after diagnosis."

The Biggest Morning Tea, held across Australia throughout May and June, is the major fundraiser for the Cancer Council.

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

Researchers find local events are lifeblood

Researchers at the University of South Australia have found that local community events are often the lifeblood of thriving neighbourhoods.

Dr Sunny Son and Dr Chris Krolikowski surveyed almost 400 households in the South Australian coastal area of the City of Holdfast Bay, a local government area of 37,000 people — a similar population to the Peninsula.

According to the pair, who specialise in tourism and event management, their research could have implications for the Peninsula.

They found that people who frequently attended local events or participated as volunteers, organisers or exhibitors, felt connected to their area and that their neighbourhood was important to them.

Those who regularly attended local events - from farmers markets to food festivals, art exhibitions and how-to workshops - were likely to be more satisfied with their neighbourhood and are more willing to live there longer.

While owning a home or living there for a long time were influential factors in a person developing a sense of place, the study found that regularly attending local events had a greater impact on fostering a sense of place than length of residency and home ownership.

Dr Krolikowski said the findings validated the importance of events as crucial components to the social structure of local communities, not just as economic tools.

"These social benefits are particularly important to rebuilding local communities after the pandemic, during which social connections and broader community life were affected by lockdowns and social distancing measures.

"Popular local events can also become attractions for visitors by showcasing the culture of the area.

"By contributing to the uniqueness of places, events are

well positioned to play an essential role in developing the tourism sector of urban and regional destinations."

He said: "Local events can assist Woy Woy Peninsula in maintaining and strengthening its local identity, as distinctive to that of other areas.

"Ensuring that residents are able to connect with each other and run events that reflect the distinctive qualities of the place and its community is likely to be of particular value not only to the community, but also to visitors from the surrounding areas and beyond."

Dr Son said: "We still need to further our understanding of the role that events play in social sustainability.

"Understanding how events can help build socially sustainable communities is vital in justifying government investment in local events."

She said: "To maintain the local identity and enhance the sense of place among the residents of the Woy Woy Peninsula, hosting local events would be helpful.

"These events don't need to be large.

"Small but frequent events or gatherings can significantly contribute to building and maintaining a sense of community and place.

"Examples are markets, weekly yoga, book clubs and other small social gatherings.

"The local sense of place is important regardless of regional or urban context, and local community events can contribute to it.

"This research argues that local communities' sense of place is crucial for building strong, socially sustainable and connected communities, as it can lead to better community wellbeing and a better place to live."

Demolition work expected to start

Demolition work at a Woy Woy aged care home is expected to start on Monday, June 17

Barriers have been put up within The Shores building at Blue Wave Living, in preparation for Stage Two works at the home.

"Demolition will involve some noise disruption over a few weeks at various times during the weekdays," said chief executive Mr Matt Downie.

"Also at times there will be disruption to the existing central linkway between the buildings.

"An alternative linkway has been established via the Palm Sails wing and through into Coastal House.

"A revised program from our builder's sees this first part of Stage Two works running through until late January next year.

"We anticipate a break for a few months as we then prepare for the second part of Stage Two works later next year.

"These works we are now undertaking will not increase overall bed numbers.

"It is about rebuilding within our existing buildings to deliver a new standard of environment for our elders in care.

"As outlined previously, Stage Two works will see the completion of Coastal House wing by rebuilding internally throughout the now vacant old rooms and creating a new entry point to this wing.

"In addition, the core central old dining area for The Shores will be completely rebuilt and expanded, removing the existing servery, office and clinic room.

"It will be re-built with more of a club feel to accommodate large functions and activities.

"It will feature a dedicated cinema space, a lounge area with a fireplace, a niche sitting area, and a bar and servery to support large functions.

"There will also be a permanent built in barbecue area in the eastern courtyard.

Council approves 85 applications in six months

Bourke Rd store celebrates 70 years

She said the store was originally built as a house in the 1920s.

Owned by a Mr and Mrs Adams, they named it Plymouth, after Mrs Adams' home town. In the mid-1950s, Mrs Adams

started to purchase some icecream and bottles of drinks. She put a sign up on the front

fence advertising them.
"She later went to the old store
in Woy Woy and purchased 50

pounds of groceries.

"Mr Adams made a shop front at the front of the house and put some groceries on the shelf and people started coming in one by

one.

"And so began the Bourke Rd Store," said Ms Overton.

"The store has had many transformations from the early days selling groceries and deli products to the introduction of NSW Lotteries in 2007."

She said it had now been in the same family for 27 years.

"In 2020 Matt and I expanded the business from a basic general store to offer more."

It now has coffee, boutique sauces and condiments, homemade food, meat from a Saratoga butcher, giftware, deli, cheese and antipasto products.

"It has been completely renovated to become a trendy destination for people to visit," she said.

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

Inconsiderate Council shuts down busy footpath

There are numbers of residents with walkers and wheelchairs around Wov Woy, including Member for Gosford Ms Liesl Tesch.

Therefore, when the council decides to rip up a busy section of footpath on the main street, you would think it would program the work at night to reduce impact on path users or at least provide alternative pedestrian and disabled access with appropriate protection.

Neither occurred at the corner of Blackwall Rd and Oval Ave when the corner was shut down for three days to concrete a one metre square patch of footpath.

Barriers forced pedestrians

onto the roadway into traffic and no access was provided for wheelchairs or walkers.
