The Bays Art Show attracted a steady flow of visitors last weekend to view to works of 60 Central Coast artists in the Bays Community Hall at Woy Woy Bay.

The show, which ran from Friday to Sunday, July 5 to 7, included paintings, drawings, photography, mixed media, sculptures, and prints.

Art show co-ordinator, artist Ms Naomi Veitch, said: "This year we cast the net wide, welcoming 60 artists from all over the Central Coast to display more than 100 artworks.

"This was an opportunity for Central Coast artists to showcase their talent and sell their artwork."

Council cuts \$1.44 million from Peninsula capital works

Just over \$1.44 million in capital works has been cut from Central Coast Council's budget for the Peninsula when it adopted its 2024-25 Operational Plan on Tuesday, June 25.

Total cuts across the region amounted to \$3.77 million from what had been proposed in its draft budget.

The Peninsula's contribution to these cuts represents 38 per cent, with a population of about 12 per cent of the Local Government Area.

The scheduled car park upgrade at James Brown Oval has been reduced from \$920,000

to \$50,000 with the "multi-year project rephrased".

The \$500,000 roads and drainage upgrade to Patonga camping ground has been reduced to zero, being "deferred by one year".

A budget of \$340,000 for a "district playspace upgrade" at Lions Park has been reduced from \$340,000 to \$29,000.

Explanatory notes simply state: "Decreased budget."

The budget previously included unspecified funds for Davistown as well as for Lions Park, Woy Woy.

Reference to Davistown has been removed.

Cuts in the three projects total almost \$1.7 million.

The only project for the Peninsula increased in the budget is the renewal of Sewer Pump Station WW13C at Woy Woy Rd, which has increased by \$240,702 from \$382,450 to \$623,152.

This is an "increased budget" for a "continuing project from 2023-24".

A new \$875,000 project is listed for "change room renewals" at "various leisure centres", the capital works program does not specify whether this includes the Peninsula Leisure Centre or not.

The money will come from general revenue, which includes rates revenue.

Mary Mac's seeks donations for meals

and outreach services like housing and health support.

"Without community support and generosity, we would need to turn many people away," said Ms Baker.

Editorial policy and guidelines

At its heart, Peninsula News is a community effort.

It welcomes and relies on the contributions provided voluntarily and at no cost by local organisations, groups and residents.

The newspaper aims to be accessible to the community - both through making its columns accessible to community groups and by having copies available in accessible locations, including through its website.

The following policies and guidelines are designed to support the aims and standards of the newspaper.

Locality

The newspaper's editorial policy reflects a desire to reinforce the Peninsula's sense of community.

To qualify for publication, articles must have specific relevance to the Peninsula. For example, they must be about activities or events happening on the Peninsula or be organised by or involving Peninsula people.

The newspaper is not regional or national in nature, so regional or national issues will not be canvassed except as they affect the Peninsula.

Regional sports will only be covered from the perspective of Peninsula clubs. Regional plans will only be aired in the context of their ramifications for the Peninsula.

Peninsula News aims to be inclusive of as much of the Peninsula community as possible.

Readability

To ensure that the newspaper serves its purpose, it must be readable and represent the interests and activities of the community in its content.

Contributions to the paper are edited to consistent standards of readability. Guidelines are available for intending contributors.

All items will be dated. They must contain the name of the author to whom the contribution may be attributed, with their first name spelt out, along with their suburb or organisation. Anonymous contributions will not be accepted.

Forum letters

The Forum section provides the opportunity for readers to express their views on any aspect of Peninsula community life, with the aim of reflecting the community's diversity of opinion.

Nevertheless, letters may be edited for readability, including for length, spelling and grammar, and to avoid legal liability on the part of the newspaper, or they may be declined altogether.

Contributors are asked to keep their contributions to the matter at hand, and to

focus on the issues and not abuse or insult others.

Other than in the case of holding public figures to account, criticism of others (as opposed to criticism of particular opinions) is unlikely to be published in the interests of facilitating the expression of a diversity of views.

All letter writers need to supply name, address and contact details. Only name and suburb will be published.

Contributors who do not wish the wording of their letter to be changed at all should make a note to this effect when submitting their letter. In some cases, this may result in the letter not being published.

Corrections

We try to be as accurate as possible. However, mistakes can still slip through.

If you believe we have got something wrong, whether an error of fact or interpretation, we ask that you write to us by email with details for publication. These corrections may appear as Forum letters or as news items and should conform to our requirements for news and Forum contributions.

Source lines

Peninsula News includes "source lines" at the end of each article which aim to provide readers with information about where and how we came across the information, so that they might judge for themselves the veracity of what they are reading.

It should not be assumed that the article is a verbatim reproduction of the source. Similarly, it should not be assumed that any reporter listed is necessarily responsible for writing the whole news item. Source lines are not by-lines.

Often articles come from a number of sources. They are edited for readability and reader interest and given different headings, and consequently can be expressed quite differently from the source material.

Peninsula News usually receives its information in three ways: It is sent to us by someone wanting to promote their activities; it is sent to us in response to our inquiries; or it comes from a newsletter or other document to which we have access.

Sometimes we may interview a person or report what they said at a meeting.

The following descriptions are used:

Media Release - unsolicited contributions.

Media Statement - sent in response to our questions. **Website** or **Social Media** - information published online. **Newsletter** or **Report** - published in print or online. **Interview** or **Meeting** - statements recorded by a reporter.

Forum contributions may be: **Email** if sent electronically and **Letter** if written on paper.

June rainfall 40 per cent above average

Almost 200mm of rain fell on the Peninsula during June, more than 40 per cent above the average of 141mm.

In the first five days of July, 52.5mm has fallen, about two thirds of the July average of 79mm, according to figures supplied by Mr Jim Morrison of Umina.

The total for the first six months of the year was just shy of 1000mm, at 999.5mm.

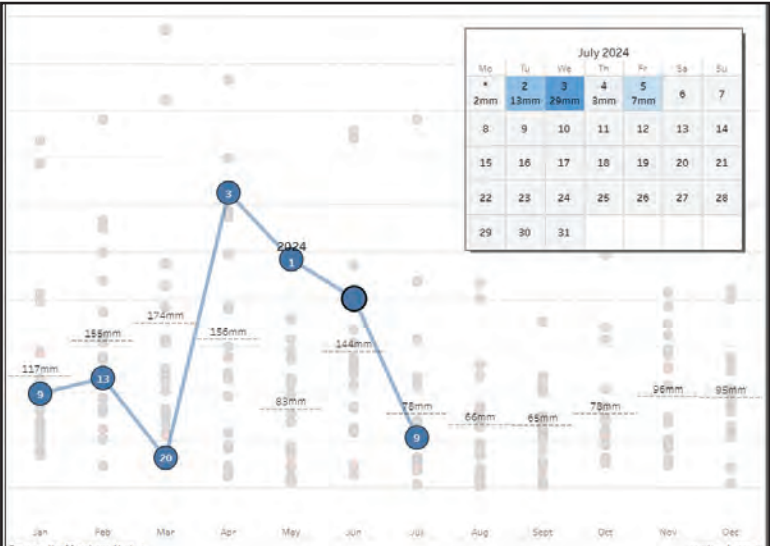
Including the July rainfall, the total of 1052mm is more than the annual rainfall in five of the last 20 years.

Total rainfall for the April-June quarter was 753mm, more than twice the average for this period of 363mm.

Most common days for rain during this period were Saturdays

and Sundays, with eight of 13 Saturdays and seven of 13 Sundays recording rain.

These were followed by six Wednesdays with rain, five



Thursdays, four Fridays, three Mondays and two Tuesdays.

Rainfall figures reflected this pattern, although the Saturday total of 210mm and the Sunday figure of 217mm were inflated by two of the wettest days in 20 years.

Saturday, April 6, had the fourth

heaviest rain in 20 years with 152mm, and Sunday, June 2, was the 13th heaviest rainfall day with 101mm.

Seven complying developments approved

Seven "complying development" applications have been approved for the Peninsula since June 1.

Three were in Ettalong: at 102 Barrenjoey Rd, 84 Uligandi St and at 123 Broken Bay Rd.

Two were in Umina: at 77 Osborne Ave, and at 9 Nelson St.

One was approved at 52 Railway St, Woy Woy, and another at 5 Cornelian Rd.

At the end of last week, one application was "awaiting information" for 357 Ocean Beach Rd, Umina.

Eight were "under assessment".

Of these, four were in Umina: at 2 Gross Ave, 27 Osborne Ave, 78 Lone Pine Ave and 150 Albany Rd.

Two were in Ettalong: at 11 Myall St, and at 30 Beach St.

One was at 38 Everglades Cr, Woy Woy, and another at 61 Cornelian Rd, Pearl Beach.

The NSW Department of Planning states: "Complying development is a combined planning and construction approval for straightforward development that can be determined through a fast-track assessment by a council or an accredited certifier.

"Complying development applies to homes, businesses and industry and allows for a range of things like the construction of a new dwelling house, alterations and additions to a house, new industrial buildings, demolition

of a building, and changes to a business use.

"Homeowners and developers can use the Guide to Complying Development to understand the legislative requirements for developing small scale residential projects, for example, building a new one or two storey home or home renovation."

Where neighbours are required to be advised of development applications, allowing public submissions to be made, this requirement does not apply to complying development applications.

Stage two work starts at aged care home

Stage two of reconstruction work at a Woy Woy aged care home with demolition and cutting up concrete occurring over the past fortnight.

Blue Wave Living chief executive Mr Matt Downie said the workers had been asked to take breaks during residents' mealtimes to minimise disruption.

However, the noise was "unfortunately a necessary part of the process".

He said the central link between Palm Sails and Coastal House would be closed depending on building requirements.

"The central link will be open in the evenings and on weekends as a minimum and may open up at other times depending on building requirements.

"We have established an

alternative path from Palm Sails through to Coastal House, for when the central link is not available.

"We have also established alternative entry points for access into The Shores building at the rear, via two courtyards.

"This alternative entry is open Monday to Friday during business hours, 9am to 4:30pm.

"There is visitor parking at the rear."

Mr Downie said: "As part of this stage of works, we will be rebuilding the reception to the rear of The Shores.

"This will then operate during business hours Monday to Friday on completion nex March.

"This will provide alternative entry during the next stage of works, during which the central link will then become permanently closed due to construction through

that area.

"Stage Two works will see the completion of the Coastal House wing by internally rebuilding the now vacant old rooms and creating a new entry point to this wing.

"In addition, the core central old dining area for The Shores will be completely rebuilt and expanded, removing the existing servery, office and clinic room, and rebuilt with more of a club feel to accommodate large functions and activities.

"It will feature a dedicated cinema space, a lounge area with a fireplace, a niche sitting area, and a bar and servery to support large functions.

"There will also be a permanent built-in barbecue area in the eastern courtyard.

Application for \$2.6M beachfront house at Pearl Beach

Central Coast Council has received a development application for the construction of "a new dwelling house and swimming pool" on the beachfront at 36 Coral Cres, Pearl Beach.

The application, prepared by Doug Sneddon Planning Pty Ltd for Mr Niall Conlon, runs to 101 pages and states that "the proposed development has a construction cost of \$2,626,800".

It "replaces a previously demolished dwelling house on the subject land and a new dwelling previously approved under Development Consent 60416/2020."

The application is for a five-bedroom dwelling with two storeys and a basement.

The basement will contain garaging for two cars with a turntable to enable forward access when entering or leaving, also plant rooms, storage and wine cellar.

The ground floor will contain the main entry, kitchen, dining-living and family rooms, outdoor terraces, guest bedroom and swimming pool.

The first floor will comprise four bedrooms, bathrooms, storage and study, both the master bedroom and study will be provided with ocean view terraces.

An internal lift will provide access to all three levels.

The land has an area of 670.2 square metres and is zoned R2 Low density residential.

According to the application, the gross floor area will be 333.418 square metres for a floor space ratio of 0.497:1.

Site coverage will be 304.458 square metres (30.51 per cent) and private open space 314.917 square metres (46.9 per cent).

"The proposed development has a rear setback (to the beach) of 17.923 metres, which exceeds the requirement for a foreshore setback of 10 metres and generally aligns with the beachfront setback on neighbouring residences.

"The proposed front building setback of 4.172 metres is considered appropriate having regard to the setback of neighbouring dwellings and the

current development consent for the subject land."

Regarding a possible loss of views, it states: "The potential loss of a partial lateral view by neighbours over the subject land resulting from the proposed development is minor as the lateral views predominantly remain available and their primary coastal outlook is maintained."

It is explained that "Pearl Beach is identified as having a special character, with its distinctive element being its natural environment and the unifying element of the tree canopy.

"Pearl Beach is the only village within the former Gosford City area classified by the National Trust of Australia as the Broken Bay Entrance Landscape Conservation Area and the unique character of Pearl Beach should therefore be protected."

It is claimed: "The accompanying Landscape Plans provide both dune stabilisation with the retention of existing groundcover plants and appropriate streetscape plantings.

"Coastal hazard assessment and structural engineering provide for protection of the proposed dwelling from potential storm surges and shoreline erosion."

The DA proposes the retention of one existing street tree and the replacement of a second one which has died and been removed by council.

The Landscape Plan proposes a tuckeroo which, it is claimed, is "more suitable underneath wires".

The only other trees mentioned are melaleuca paperbarks on the adjoining property which are to be retained.

In conclusion the application claims: "The proposed

development is a single-family home which is compatible with the surrounding low density residential environment, although it is noted that beachfront residential development along Coral Cres comprises a mix of older style one to two storey dwelling houses and larger contemporary dwelling houses of up to three levels."

It is currently on public exhibition and is open for submissions.

A closing date has not been published by the council.

What would Peninsula Council do?

"It will be 20 years before these new plantings reach maturity.

"But we're very grateful that new trees have been planted."

She said: "If you want to see more trees planted across the Peninsula, we encourage you to write to Council directly and request this.

"The more support and pressure from the broader community, the greater the impact."

She said the group continued to plant street trees at the request of



residents.

Ms Wilder said these were small steps in the direction of greening our urban heat island here on the Peninsula.

team to clear the Shed either to the new location or to the various other disposal avenues, and to leave the premises in a tidy condition.

"Mr John Powell undertook the management, set-up and acceptance of equipment, tools and supplies at the Osborne Ave location.

"Members undertook the loading and shifting of the items and generously assisted with their vehicles and trailers in the transportation of the items."

Mr Brown said: "It's been a very tough and challenging few weeks."

Reasons why Blackwall Reserve should be saved

Here are a few reasons why Blackwall Reserve should be saved and reclassified from operational to community land.

In the wider scheme of things, Blackwall Reserve is insignificant. Vast forests are still being logged, overfishing is rampant, industrial farming is sucking the joy out of everything, and polar bears will soon be extinct.

So why should we care about the fate of this tiny piece of woodland, no bigger than two suburban blocks?

There are many answers to this question, the first one being that this reserve is a microcosm of wilderness.

It's got the lot, from tall and ancient trees to a Noah's Ark of animals co-existing together, and doing a much better job of it than humans would.

From the micro bats in the treetops to the ringtail possums sheltering in tree hollows to the elusive boobook owl, they live their lives and rear their children and search for food without need of us.

Sometimes the human neighbours catch glimpses of them.

Coming face to face with a tawny frogmouth is something to boast about, as is hearing the boobook hooting.

Blackwall Reserve is a refuge for its inhabitants.

So many surrounding trees have been razed to the ground and replaced by human dwellings.

So many cars don't stop when possums venture onto the road.

The reserve is a citadel whose walls are made of paperbark and bangalay, and a place where animals can feel safe.

The trees are a remnant of Umina Coastal Sandplain Woodland, which once covered the Peninsula but now only exists in a few spots in Umina and in this reserve.

The second most important answer is the link to the past.

The reserve contains an extensive midden that has been registered with the National Parks and Wildlife Service by indigenous elder Tracie Howie.

What is now our reserve was once a sheltered and welcoming meeting place for the original people living on and around the amazing Blackwall Mountain.

Following on from its sheltered aspect is answer number three.

It is very low-lying and flood prone.

When the surrounding blocks were sold off to a local developer 60 years ago, the reserve remained in Gosford Council possession to act as flood mitigation.

During heavy rain any cars parked on the edge of the reserve are at risk of water damage.

Chopping down the trees and covering the ground with concrete would inevitably lead to the laneway and surrounding houses being flooded.

The fourth answer is quality of life for the neighbouring humans.

The only access to this reserve is along a narrow laneway which is inadequate for the mid-density housing already constructed.

On the Ettalong side of the reserve is a townhouse complex, and on the Woy Woy side are three blocks of privately-owned land awaiting development.

The reserve is our breathing space, and will be even more so when the land next to it is built on.

Finally, although this part of Blackwall is quite densely populated, it has few amenities.

If you walk down to Springwood St, you can get a bus to Woy Woy but not to Umina Beach.

There are no food shops or cafes or restaurants; no schools, tennis courts or community centres.

To build on the reserve would mean shoehorning more people and their cars into a treeless purgatory, which does not sound like good town planning.

Blackwall Reserve is classified as operational land by Central Coast Council.

This means that it has no value except its sale price.

Council should change the classification to community land in order to respect its inherent qualities and value, and to prevent it from being sold off to the highest bidder.

It will then truly belong to the community, as well as to its community of animals.

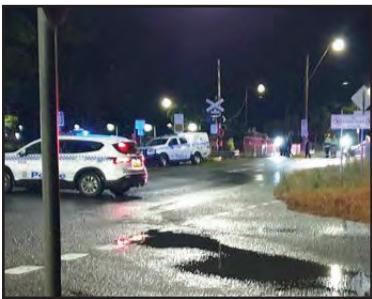
Level crossing incident

Kevin Brooks announces run for council

Bensville resident Mr Kevin Brooks has announced that he will run as a candidate for Gosford West ward, covering the Peninsula, in the September Central Coast Council elections.

Mr Brooks is a regular speaker at the Council's Public Forum, where he made the announcement last Tuesday, June 25.

As in previous speeches, he opposed "excessive rate hikes".

He said the Council's Operational Plan incorporated a 4.8 per cent increase in general rates and 11.9 per cent increase in water rates from July 1.

He said that Council rates (general and water) had now risen 39 per cent in just four years, "yet services continue to go backwards in priority areas".

"Three years ago, Council told the community it must choose between higher rates or worse services.

"We have ended up with both.

"Despite increasing revenue from rates by 39 per cent in four years, priority services continue to decline.

"The average time for determining development applications has more than doubled.

"Water and sewer unplanned service interruptions, mains breaks, and leaks are all increasing.

"Seventeen per cent of our roads get the lowest possible one star AusRAP rating.

"Over 30 per cent of customers surveyed did not think the Council's response was empathetic - a terrible indictment on customer culture and one I can certainly relate to.

"This was not even mentioned last meeting when Council incorrectly claimed it had met an 80 per cent satisfaction target despite averaging less than 80 per cent across all survey questions - one of 28 targets misreported as achieved or on track when in reality they were missed or behind, another illustration of how spin and propaganda has replaced authentic communication.

"Ratepayers are paying more for less because Council has



still not addressed underlying problems within the organisation, in management, efficiency, productivity, prioritisation and above all culture.

"Instead, during four years of taxation without representation, an unaccountable bureaucracy has put its own interests above those of the community.

"For too long we, the humble and blameless residents of the Central Coast, have been paying the price for poor leadership, mismanagement, and dysfunction in Central Coast, Gosford, and Wyong Councils.

"A fresh approach is needed.

"But if we want change, it is up to all of us in the community to be the change we want to see.

"That is why tonight, I am announcing my intention to run as a candidate in the September elections.

"And I say to the community, if you are tired of paying too much for too little and want change - then you too can be the change you want to see."

Mr Brooks said that, before emigrating to Australia in 2008, he had spent 11 years in the UK banking industry.

He said he had been an elected member of two UK Councils, one with 55 councillors.

The second time, Mr Brooks was the elected Leader of a 33-member council in Essex (Harlow) and inherited a financial crisis from the previous administration.

Mr Brooks claimed that by the time he stepped down to emigrate to Australia, he had achieved a turnaround in the Council's

finances and performance.

Mr Brooks said: "We improved business processes and efficiency, for example through smarter targets and better reporting.

"The biggest thing I learned was the importance of prioritisation in local government, where there is such a wide range of functions, much of it discretionary.

"If you're not careful, you can end up trying to do too much and doing none of it well.

"We consulted the community about priorities and sought to allocate resources accordingly.

"This did mean some tough decisions but, in the end, customer satisfaction improved because we focused on what mattered most to the community."

Mr Brooks said he was a member of the UK Labour Party.

He served as district media spokesperson, district party leader, and council leader.

He said he had not been a member of any political party since emigrating to Australia and was proudly non-partisan.

He said he grew disillusioned with partisan politics and the restrictions party dogmas can impose on free thinking.

Mr Brooks said: "My values have always been those of 19th century social liberal thinkers such as John Stuart Mill.

"These values include economic rationalism, freedom of speech, tolerance, equality of opportunity, scientific progress, democracy and meritocracy.

"These values were once mainstream in Western democracies, but I have never seen them under greater threat whether from autocratic regimes abroad or at times from parties of both left and right within western democracies themselves.

"Neither side of politics within Australian democracy fully embraces these values which is why I am now happy to be non-partisan."

He said he hoped other candidates would follow his lead and set out their qualifications and experience.

Aged care visitors asked to wear masks

A Woy Woy aged care home is asking all visitors to test for Covid and to wear a mask due to high levels of the virus in the community.

"We are seeing increases in respiratory illness, including Covid, amongst our residents," said Blue Wave Living chief executive Mr Matt Downie.

"While such illnesses are prevalent in the community, they invariably make their way in via visiting family and friends.

"I would encourage all to obtain up-to-date vaccinations for both influenza and Covid and, if in any way unwell, please defer visiting loved ones."

Mr Downie said Blue Wave residents "are much more susceptible to more severe outcomes from respiratory illness than younger persons".

"While it is easy to be dismissive of mild symptoms such as a scratchy throat or a slight snuffle, it might be the precursor to a more serious respiratory illness including Covid."

Mr Downie said: "All our staff test daily and utilise personal protective equipment to help minimise risk.

"We do have ready access to antivirals, which have proven to be effective in minimising the impact of Covid, coupled with vaccination and solid infection control measures to reduce the risk.

"You will notice changes when visiting Blue Wave Living while we have active cases.

"We are also making changes to our Activities program to further minimise risk, and the Food Focus meeting will be postponed for a few weeks."

Referral program proves successful strategy

An employee referral program has been a successful recruitment strategy for a Umina aged care facility, despite a national shortage of aged care workers.

"For the first time in four years, we have virtually no unfilled positions and are now using referrals to fill holiday and relief positions," said Peninsula Village chief executive Mr Colin Osborne.

In the past 12 months, Peninsula Village has hired 40 personal care assistants, four registered nurses and 13 hotel service staff

members.

"The quality of our referral hires is noticeably better than those from job boards, and our staff turnover is significantly lower than the industry average," Mr Osborne said.

"We've seen a substantial reduction in our recruitment as well as reduced agency spend and have been able to divert funds back to our staff through referral rewards.

"This program has enabled us to identify and retain local frontline and clinical staff quickly and affordably, ensuring our

recruitment is stable and efficient," said Mr Osborne.

The program uses a phone app, Care Friends, "designed for the health care and social assistance sector".

Using the phone app, existing employees can earn up to \$400 and micro rewards by referring others to job vacancies.

"The Care Friends program has been instrumental in maintaining a high standard of care through our consistent staffing levels, directly benefiting our residents and enhancing staff satisfaction," said

Mr Osborne.

He said the reduction in recruitment expenditure had fully covered the costs of the referral program, leading to a significant decrease in overall recruitment costs.

The organisation has reported an average of 30 new staff referrals per month, significantly contributing to its ability to meet the 200 care-minute target and a trajectory towards the 215-minute goal by October.

Tour de Central Coast rides involve Woy Woy

The Central Coast Bicycle User Group is holding three "Tour de Central Coast" events involving Woy Woy in two weeks, to coincide with the Tour de France.

Yesterday (Sunday, July 7), the group held a five-hour 95km ride from Woy Woy to Pie in the Sky cafe at Cowan and return.

On Sunday, July 14, the group will hold a three-hour 45km ride from Woy Woy, looping around Brisbane Water, to finish back at Woy Woy.

On Saturday, July 20, the group will hold a two-hour 25km ride from Gosford to Woy Woy and return.

The ride to Cowan last Sunday was described as a moderate-paced ride from Woy Woy to Pie in the Sky cafe and back, through the picturesque Brisbane Water National Park and over the Hawkesbury River.

"Designed for more experienced riders, we mostly utilise the old Pacific Hwy and include five longish climbs (Karing, Mooney-Calga, PiTS, MtWhite and Mooney-Somersby) - nothing too steep, but you certainly know you've been up a few hills by the time you get home," said ride leader Mr Alan Corven.

The Brisbane Water Loop ride

next Sunday, July 14, starts at Fishermen's Wharf at 8am.

It is described as "a relaxed paced ride around Brisbane Water, starting and ending at Woy Woy.

"This ride is perfect for those stepping up from easier rides, like the Woy Woy to Gosford Boomerang ride or other easy and easy-medium graded rides.

"Mostly on road shoulders and shared paths, with some normal traffic roads, so you need to be comfortable cycling on the road with some passing traffic.

"Ride pace will be slower on the shared path sections, picking up on the road sections.

"A few very short hills, but we avoid the steepest and narrowest ones.

"Coffee is at Gosford or somewhere else if a better option is suggested."

Roosters appear vindicated with 20-year ban on fan

Woy Woy Rugby League Football Club appears to have been vindicated with reports that NSW Rugby League has placed a 20-year ban on a fan who racially-abused Roosters captain-coach Andrew Fifita.

NSWRL chief executive Mr David Trodden said yesterday, July 7, the racial vilification received by True Blue and Woy Woy coach Andrew Fifita was disgusting.

"The NSWRL treats such matters very seriously which is reflected in the fact the person responsible has received a 20-year suspension.

"Justin Bayley was suspended from all facets of Rugby League for 20 years after last week being found guilty of code of conduct breaches including racial vilification against Fifita following a Rugby League Central Coast First Grade match between Woy Woy Roosters and Wyong Roos at Woy Woy Oval on Sunday, June 9."

Mr Trodden said: "I have had a number of private conversations with Andrew Fifita and they will remain private.

"Andrew is one of our valued True Blues and he knows where I stand on the matter."

The Roosters' committee described the incident as "the lowest in club history" and said it did not condone "that behaviour".

"We do however support Andrew and our players for sticking up for their rights," the committee said last Wednesday.

The committee claimed there was a "lack of acknowledgement from the governing bodies to address the issues at hand regarding the racial vilification Andrew copped, especially after the game that evening".

"Our issue is everyone has focused on the incident outside the ground and not why it happened and the online vitriol that Andrew

has received which is quite disturbing."

In a public statement, the committee said: "We do apologise for any families or children who may have been caught up in the incident and for that we are particularly sorry.

"We don't believe any club in our competition is racist as, like us, they have many indigenous and players of Pacific Islander heritage at their club."

However, the committee claimed that "certain clubs" had colluded "to boycott playing us" without the opportunity for the Roosters "to defend ourselves".

"Where was our right to reply?"

"Our club was sanctioned after the June 9 incident.

"We were not allowed to have spectators, canteen or bar.

"We copped the punishment as much as we didn't agree with it.

"We, as a club, just want to get back to playing footy, for our club, for our sponsors and supporters and our players families who are suffering also.

"We thank the Dora Creek club for backing their own judgment and playing us on the weekend and seeing that incident at our home ground for what it was, an isolated incident.

"We pride ourselves in welcoming the opposition clubs to our home ground.

"That will never change."

The committee said the "ugly and unfortunate incident" was outside the ground at the end of the day and was not alcohol-related.

Otherwise, the committee said, the day was run well by the club.

"The whole day was a success on and off the field.

"We celebrated Old Boys day.

"We have been in this competition for 95 years.

"We are a very proud footy club."
