Council election special

This is the last issue of Peninsula News before the Central Coast Council elections to be held on Saturday, September 14, and is an "election special".

The council elections are the first in seven years and follow just on four years of operation under Government-appointed State Administrators.

Peninsula residents will be voting to elect three councillors from six groups of three candidates and two ungrouped candidates in the Gosford West Ward.

The Peninsula represents more than half the population of the ward, which largely coincides with the State electorate of Gosford.

Peninsula News invited the candidates to submit a short summary of their policies for publication in this issue.

Four of the groups responded: Group B New Independents led by Ms Jane Smith, Group C Ratepayers' Choice led by Mr Kevin Brooks, Group E Labor Party led by Ms Belinda Neal and Group F Coasties who Care led by Ms Lisa Bellamy.

Ungrouped candidate Mr Julian Richards also submitted a summary.

Group A Team Central Coast led by Mr Daniel Abou-Chedid and Group D Liberal Party led by Mr Trent McWaide did not respond. SOURCE:

Open space strategy on exhibition for comment

Central draft Open Space Strategy is now on public exhibition for community feedback until Friday, September 20.

Council director Ms Melanie Smith said the strategy was "developed to support and promote active and healthy lifestyles, and increase participation in outdoor recreation and sport, with greater diversity in offerings".

"With the anticipated population growth expected for the Central Coast, this framework will provide for the supply and development of adequate open spaces, such as parks, reserves and sportsgrounds, and ensure they are well-designed, inclusive, and accessible," Ms Smith said. She said it would also ensure culture, heritage and environmental significance was considered in the planning and design of public open space "The strategy identifies sport and recreation action plans that need to be reviewed or developed to ensure that sport, recreation and physical activity opportunities on the Central Coast will be well planned and actioned in a timely manner.'

Coast Council's Hart said the draft Open Space Strategy had been developed with input from the public and key groups.

> "Extensive community consultation was undertaken in 2021, when the project was known as the Active Lifestyles Strategy, with 438 people participating in a survey

> "The Central Coast is blessed with an abundance of beautiful open space areas, and I encourage everyone to jump online to check out the draft Strategy and tell us what you think."

Results of the Active Lifestyle Survey in 2021 showed that of the 438 respondents, more than 75 per cent were long-term residents of the Central Coast (10plus years), predominantly in the 35-59 age group, and the three most popular sporting categories were: mountain biking (57 per cent), swimming (49 per cent) and walking (49 per cent).

parks, reserves and trails, were bike and walking tracks, access to amenities and parking, and a good quality activity surface.

"With an ageing population there will be an increase in selfdirected exercise and recreation such as walking and cycling.

"This places a greater focus on use of parks and beaches, and active transport links with, and connectivity to residential areas," Ms Smith continued.

"The strategy has been drafted to reflect these needs and ensure adequate and quality sports and recreation facilities and supporting infrastructure to encourage active lifestyles in open spaces. Future planning for natural areas, aquatic and leisure centres. community halls, individual sport and mountain biking in natural areas and land not managed by Council, was excluded from the scope of this strategy, she said. Members of the public are invited to view the draft Open Space Strategy and provide their feedback via the online submission form at yourvoiceourcoast.com by 5pm, Friday 20 September.

Editorial policy and guidelines

At its heart, Peninsula News is a community effort. It welcomes and relies on the

contributions provided voluntarily and at no cost by local organisations, groups and residents.

The newspaper aims to be accessible to the community - both through making its columns accessible to community groups and by having copies available in accessible locations, including through its website.

The following policies and guidelines are designed to support the aims and standards of the newspaper.

Locality

The newspaper's editorial policy reflects a desire to reinforce the Peninsula's sense of community.

To qualify for publication, articles must have specific relevance to the Peninsula. For example, they must be about activities or events happening on the Peninsula or be organised by or involving Peninsula people

The newspaper is not regional or national in nature, so regional or national issues will not be canvassed except as they affect the Peninsula.

Regional sports will only be covered from the perspective of Peninsula clubs. Regional plans will only be aired in the context of their ramifications for the Peninsula

Peninsula News aims to be inclusive of as much of the Peninsula community as possible

Readability

To ensure that the newspaper serves its purpose, it must be readable and represent the interests and activities of the community in its content.

Contributions to the paper are edited to consistent standards of readability. Guidelines are available for intending contributors.

focus on the issues and not abuse or insult others

Other than in the case of holding public figures to account, criticism of others (as opposed to criticism of particular opinions) is unlikely to be published in the interests of facilitating the expression of a diversity of views

All letter writers need to supply name, address and contact details. Only name and suburb will be published.

Contributors who do not wish the wording of their letter to be changed at all should make a note to this effect when submitting their letter. In some cases, this may result in the letter not being published.

Corrections

We try to be as accurate as possible. However, mistakes can still slip through

If you believe we have got something wrong, whether an error of fact or interpretation, we ask that you write to us by email with details for publication. These corrections may appear as Forum letters or as news items and should conform to our requirements for news and Forum contributions.

Source lines

Peninsula News includes "source lines" at the end of each article which aim to provide readers with information about where and how we came across the information, so that they might judge for themselves the veracity of what they are reading.

It should not be assumed that the article is a verbatim reproduction of the source. Similarly, it should not be assumed that any reporter listed is necessarily responsible for writing the whole news item. Source lines are not by-lines.

Just one millimetre of rain in two weeks

Only one millimetre of rain has fallen on the Peninsula in the last two weeks of August.

It was recorded on Saturday, August 24, according to figures supplied by Mr Jim Morrison of Umina.

A total of 37mm was recorded for the month, which was just 56 per cent of the month's average of 66mm.

The cumulative total for the year stands at 1122.9mm.

This is 16.5 per cent above the average figure at the end of August of 964mm.

Painted bus shelter slated for demolition

of The Bays area's famous painted bus shelters has been slated for demolition by Central Coast Council.

The Bays Community Group has been told that the bus shelter in Banyo Close, near the intersection of Woy Woy Rd, "isn't actually a bus stop".

Council staff have told the committee that the old timber bus shelter is "in a state of disrepair" and also "in the wrong location".

The actual bus stop is just around the corner in Woy Woy Rd. The committee has been told

the old bus shelter cannot be relocated due to its condition. The Council plan is to erect a new bus shelter at the existing bus stop in Woy Woy Rd.

The committee has been told discussions will take place with residents near the bus stop about the erection of a new bus shelter.

Tickets issued 'where owners not known', says Council

Central Coast Council "affixed an orange derelict motor vehicle sticker" to boats "in an effort to establish which watercraft stored at Patonga were actually abandoned vessels".

Council rangers used the stickers where ownership could not be established, the Council said in a media statement.

"Council received complaints regarding alleged abandoned watercraft at Patonga," it said.

"Approximately five watercraft had this sticker attached.

"This action provides а mechanism for owners to contact Council so that a determination can be made as to whether the watercraft have in fact been abandoned or not.

"Council also had a meeting with local fishermen who are pro-actively assisting Council in determining which watercraft are abandoned, so Council can progress action to tidy up the foreshore area.

"Council will not be removing any vessels that are owned by local residents and where the current Watercraft Storage on Public Land Policy is being complied with."

Council drafts new **Engagement Strategy**

Central Coast Council is planning to replace its current **Engagement Framework and** Community **Participation** Plan, consolidating them into a single document.

The Community new Engagement Strategy outlines how the Council plans to involve the community in decisions about plans, projects and initiatives that affect the future of the region, according to acting general manager Ms Marissa Racomelara.

"This will provide residents with a clearer understanding of how Council engages with them and how their voices are incorporated into the decision-making process."

"Engaging with our community is essential if we are to make informed decisions that reflect community priorities," Ms Racomelara said.

"This strategy will provide a clear framework for how we involve residents in decision making, ensuring their voices are heard and valued "

Council director Ms Melanie Smith said: "We want to ensure that the way we engage with the community reflects the needs and expectations of our residents."

The new strategy aimed to "create a more effective and inclusive engagement process".

The final strategy is expected to be presented to the newly elected Council for endorsement later this year.

Third application submitted for multi-dwelling development

A third application for a multi-dwelling development has been submitted for 59 Memorial Ave, Blackwall, after two previous applications were unsuccessful.

The current application is for a six two-storey, two-bedroom dwellings.

The previous applications were for eight dwellings and seven dwellings respectively.

The first was withdrawn after Central Coast Council and Transport for NSW stated that vehicular access must be from Warrigal St, as Memorial Ave was a classified road.

The second was refused for reasons including inadequate front and rear setbacks, "lack of articulation" on units 4/5 and 6/7, a deficit of four on-site car spaces, unsatisfactory fencina. and insufficient solar access.

The new application addresses rear and front boundary setbacks and provides compliant parking.

However, it admits that solar access is not compliant, stating that "three hours solar access to 50 per cent of private open space on June 21 for units 5 and 6 is not obtained."

It states that 20 square metres of additional private open space with sunlight access during the winter months would be provided.



application The states: "Vehicular access is proposed via a shared driveway to separate garages provided for each unit.

"The proposed design provides sufficient areas to store mobile waste collection bins away from the street and clothes drying areas that would be screened from other dwellings and the public domain.

proposal "The includes stormwater system а and landscaping."

"The dwelling construction would utilise reinforced concrete slab footings, timber roof rafters with colorbond roof sheeting. aluminum framed windows, and a

mixture of external cladding. The application argues that the

design should not have to comply with a bungalow-style development mentioned in planning "character" statements for the area.

"The entire Woy Woy Peninsula includes a mix of post-war fibrecemment clad dwelling houses, a mix of larger contemporary dwelling houses, older single storey villas and newer multi-dwelling housing development of various styles."

"If anything, the character is best described as highly diverse.

"The concept of adhering to the bungalow being obsolete given the establishment of multi-dwelling development and single dwelling houses development with a range of styles being established in the street, suburb and entire Woy Woy Peninsula area."

The application is currently open for submissions.

No closing date is specified on the council website.

"The questions were broadon climate change, ranging development and environmental protection.

"We received a good response from across the five wards, with the general consensus of response received including action on climate change policy, removing shark nets, protecting the Coastal Open Space System lands, and retention of the nuclear-free policy. "In relation to the Peninsula, the only group to respond were the Labor candidates."

Forum was a 'huge success', says residents' association

The Peninsula Residents Association has described its Candidates Forum held on Thursday, August 22, as "a huge success".

The residents' association is encouraging Peninsula residents to make an informed choice at the Central Coast Council elections.

It held the forum for Gosford West Ward councillors to describe their policies and to answer questions, according to its moderator, association committee member Mr Peter Gillis.

"The night was a huge success, with 162 residents riveted to their seats for over an hour and a half of talks from the would-be councillors, with questions from the audience after each speech," he said.

He said all six groups of candidates for the ward were represented, but the two ungrouped candidates did not attend.

Mr Gillis said the candidates were asked to include, in their presentation, policies on a range of issues relevant to the local government area, and to the Peninsula in particular.

Among the issues were Council financial management, environment, development, and Council improvement and accountability.

Candidates were also asked to give their views on the referendum to reduce councillor numbers from 15 to nine.

Speakers on the night were

Mr Kevin Brooks (Ratepayers' Choice), Mr Daniel Abou-Chedid (Team Central Coast), Mr Trent McWaide (Liberal Party), Ms Belinda Neal and Mr Mark Ellis (Labor Party), Ms Lisa Bellamy, Ms Sarah Blakeway and Ms Tegan Mulqueeny (Coasties Who Care), and Ms Jane Smith (Central Coast New Independents).

Mr Gillis said audience questions included how community consultation could be improved.

Another question raised the issue of the Peninsula having 11.2 per cent of the population, and "we get four per cent back of the capital works budget".

Mr Gillis said questions about trees on the Peninsula and the heat island effect got rousing applause when a resident stated "Everything is cleared here. They leave nothing behind.", referring to site clearing for new developments.

"The evening showed that the Peninsula has a very engaged community, and that the newlyelected councillors will have an uphill battle to address Council issues that have affected our lifestvle. environment. and wellbeing," said Mr Gillis.

The Association encouraged the residents to vote No to the Referendum, he said.

"We need more representation, not less."

What is our council 'ward'?

Central Coast elections will be held on Saturday, September14.

The council area is divided into five "wards" with three councillors to be elected for each by their residents.

The Peninsula falls within the Gosford West Ward.

The West Ward has a population of about 70,000 with about 34,000 dwellinas.

It has a land area of 792 square kilometres and a population density of 89 people per square kilometre. Its boundaries largely coincide

Council with the State electorate of Gosford, held by Labor Member of Parliament Ms Liesl Tesch, extending as far as Bucketty in the north and Wiseman's Ferry in the west.

The Peninsula has a population of about 40,000 with about 19,000 dwellings, representing about 57 per cent of the ward's population.

It has a land area of 14 square kilometres and a population density of 2900 people per square kilometre.





Candidates forum: Showing their fitness to serve?

Last Thursday evening, August 22, I attended the Gosford West Ward candidates public forum, organised by the Peninsula Residents Association.

The forum enabled the registered candidates to put forward their respective cases for election as councillors in the upcoming council election.

What was of critical importance was for the attendees to be able to consider each candidate for their fitness to serve as representatives of the people of the ward.

We will be asked to vote on the selection of three persons to represent the whole of the ward, as part of a larger team of 15 persons, serving as councillors to the whole of the Central Coast, not just the Woy Woy Peninsula.

I had seven questions, intended to help me assess their fitness to serve.

These included questions about their understanding of the role and responsibilities of councillors, any conflicts of interest, their character traits, business and community experience, their time availability and teamwork. This is what I saw, and got, from the evening, in order of each address.

Ratepayers' Choice: Mr Kevin Brooks and Mr Stephen Sizer attended. Kevin chose to selectively address the organisers' questions.

Kevin seemed to have a calm demeanour and presented his credentials from previous experiences which would seem to serve him well in this endeavour.

Stephen did not choose to address the floor.

Team Central Coast: Mr Daniel Abou-Chedid attended. Daniel chose not to address the organisers' questions, instead following his own line, akin to my own thoughts.

Daniel presented an impressive case of personal characteristics and did acknowledge the concerns of the attendees.

Liberal Party: Mr Trent McWaide attended. Trent initially seemed unprepared but took a similar line to Daniel and focused on his perceived qualification for the role.

As he proceeded, Trent warmed up in his presentation but was at length to tackle questions from the floor, preferring to reinforce his

claim to be a team player.

Labor Party: Ms Belinda Neal, Mr Mark Ellis and Mr Alan McArdie attended.

Belinda is an experienced politician. Her past performance was reaffirmed here, and is a matter of public record.

Belinda led the presentation and was reassuring to the floor that she and her team were tuned in to local issues.

Mark spoke in a mildly animated manner on numerous local community concerns. Alan did not address the floor.

Coasties Who Care: Ms Lisa Bellamy, Ms Sarah Blakeway and Ms Tegan Mulqueeney attended.

Lisa led the response and seemed to try to cover all of the organisers' queries along with her own self-promotion, in the allocated time.

Her resort to the use of bad language at the end of the presentation may have been simply emotional expression but may question her control under pressure.

Sarah introduced herself and Tegan did likewise.

New Independents: Ms Jane Smith, former Mayor, was the sole

representative.

Jane, as a former mayor, in office prior to the crisis, would seem to have her credibility already established.

Jane addressed the floor on a broad range of perceived issues and received strong support from the attendees.

No other grouped or ungrouped candidates presented on the night.

One issue which seemed to have universal support is the matter of agreement that the council needs to hold a councillor team of not less than 15 persons.

As the evening had an audience of 120+ persons in an understood voting population of more than 20,000, the question would seem to remain as to who to vote for and how much real interest is there anyway?





"Our duty of care for our players

has been stretched this season but full credit goes to our players for wanting to do this for our club.

"Our training staff have also done an amazing job to get a lot of these players on the field."

The club stated: "Unfortunately we don't have the luxury of having four grades to call on to help out when needed.

"In multiple games this season, our first grade players have played reserve grade then backed up to play first grade so we don't forfeit.

"Our reserves (have also been) playing full games in reserves then backing up for first grade.

"Our women's team also has struggled with injuries and work commitments and most weeks have only ever had the bare minimum available.

"This was highlighted with a courageous win last week with only nine girls left standing and one of those played on with a broken nose.

"The last thing we wanted to do as a club was to throw our young guys into what would have been a hostile situation at Wyong given the incident that occurred earlier in the season.

"We wish to move on and prepare a team that will be competitive in next Saturday's semi-final clash against The Entrance."
