Police and council to act on Patonga Dr burnouts

NSW Police will open a "Pearl Beach - Patonga" case file and Central Coast Council will investigate road and traffic measures to deter drivers from doing burn-outs and doughnuts on Patonga Dr, near the Pearl Beach turnoff.

The use of road safety cameras will also be investigated.

The action follows a meeting in Pearl Beach on December 19, convened by Member for Gosford Ms Liesl Tesch, with police and council staff.

About 60 Pearl Beach and Patonga residents attended the meeting with Police Commander Darryl Jobson, highway patrol Inspector Martin Searle, council director Mr Boris Bolgoff and council roads manager Ms Jeanette Williams.

"Pearl Beach residents have continually been disturbed by loud and extreme erratic vehicle burn outs at the intersection, spinning their vehicles in all directions, leaving tyre road markings as visible evidence, from as early as 7pm until late at night," said Pearl Beach Progress Association publicity officer Ms Lynne Lillico.

Ms Lillico said it became evident at the meeting that police records did not reflect the numbers of reports made by residents to the police.

Commander Jobson said he would brief his staff on recording calls.

"He requested that residents collect as much evidence, photos of number plates, videos - and only do this if it was safe to do so," said Ms Lillico.

"Currently 131 444 which is a central number will be directed to Woy Woy police at 4379 7311."

Residents should request a "job number" when making a report to the police.

Ms Lillico said Inspector Searle told the meeting that the response of the highway patrol "depends on activities in different areas and the hierarchy of responses".

Mr Bolgoff told the meeting that the council would look at "road surface deterrents" and "options such as line marking, traffic tubes and rumble bars", Ms Lillico said.

The progress association asked that residents email the association at burnouts@pearlbeachprogress. org.au when reporting incidents to police to help it monitor the situation.

"Please make sure you know the rules for a safe ride.



Readability

To ensure that the newspaper serves its purpose, it must be readable and represent the interests and activities of the community in its content.

Contributions to the paper are edited to consistent standards of readability. Guidelines are available for intending contributors.

focus on the issues and not abuse or insult others

Other than in the case of holding public figures to account, criticism of others (as opposed to criticism of particular opinions) is unlikely to be published in the interests of facilitating the expression of a diversity of views

All letter writers need to supply name, address and contact details. Only name and suburb will be published.

Contributors who do not wish the wording of their letter to be changed at all should make a note to this effect when submitting their letter. In some cases, this may result in the letter not being published.

We try to be as accurate as possible. However, mistakes can still slip through

If you believe we have got something wrong, whether an error of fact or interpretation, we ask that you write to us by email with details for publication. These corrections may appear as Forum letters or as news items and should conform to our requirements for news and Forum contributions.

Peninsula News includes "source lines" at the end of each article which aim to provide readers with information about where and how we came across the information, so that they might judge for themselves the veracity of what they are reading.

Average year after two extreme years

Last year had close to average rainfall throughout the year after two years of rainfall extremes.

A total of 1352.6mm of rain was recorded in 2024, only slightly (4.2 per cent) above the 20-year average of 1298mm.

The 2023 total of 876mm was the lowest in 20 years, while 2119mm in 2022 made it the wettest year in that period.

Above average rainfall in the second quarter of the year saw the half year figure of 999.5mm at 22 per cent above the average of 819mm.

However, below average rainfall in the second half of the year brought the figure back close to



Pearl Beach restaurant gutted by fire

A restaurant in Pearl Beach was gutted by fire overnight on Saturday, December 28.

The Amalfi restaurant will operate temporarily from Ettalong so that it can keep its staff until it can return to Pearl Beach.

The Pearl Beach Brigade responded to a report of a structure fire at 1 Tourmaline Ave at around 11:30pm on December 28.

Crews quickly arrived to find the restaurant on the ground floor fully involved in fire, with LPG tanks at the rear affected by fire with large flares of flaming gas as their emergency pressure release valves opened to prevent explosion.

Crews rapidly started work ensuring the second storey accommodation was evacuated.

They then contained the fire to the affected structure stopping it spreading to the nearby bushland as well as trying to limit the extension of the fire into the second story.

Additional crews were rapidly on scene from Fire and Rescue NSW Station 340 Umina, Fire and Rescue NSW Station 341 Kariong and a Fire and Rescue NSW Hazmat crew.

Further Rural Fire Service crews from The Bays Rural Fire Brigade and Empire Bay Rural Fire Brigade provided additional crews capable of entering the affected structure to complete suppression and overhaul.

In addition to these firefighting resources, Brisbane Water Police District and NSW Ambulance crews attended to protect the scene and to be immediately available should the firefighters entering the structure need medical attention. The fire was extinguished and overhaul completed around 3:30am.

Crews were stood down and returned to their stations with firefighters from Pearl Beach Brigade remaining on site to manage any re-ignition.

At 5:30am, with the fire out and cold, the Pearl Beach crews returned to station.


However, the fire reignited at 8:15am, with fresh Pearl Beach RFS volunteers attending alongside Fire and Rescue colleagues.

The damage was assessed as significant, but contained to part of the structure, with no loss of life or injury.

The cause of the fire is under investigation.

Three-unit proposal for West St

An application has been made for a three-unit multidwelling at 183 West St, Umina Beach. Prepared by Pragma Urban Planning, it states that the site is zoned General Residential (R1), has an area of 730.377 square meters and is oriented northsouth.

The front unit is proposed to be four bedrooms with the other two at three bedrooms.

Unit 2 is proposed to have a single garage with units 1 and 3 to have double garages with a visitor's car parking space to be provided at the northern end of the driveway.

The proposal is claimed to comply with the planning provisions for height and floor space, being less than 8.5 metres in height and having a floor space ratio of 0.4965:1 which results from a gross floor area of 361.05 square metres.

The area of soft landscaping is said to be 210.7 square metres or 28.87 per cent of the site area, which is slightly above the minimum requirement of 25 per cent.

As West St is classified as a regional road at that point, the front setback is 7.5 metres as required and all other setbacks are claimed to comply with planning provisions.

The rear setback is 4.6 metres and accommodates the private behind the boundary fence.

Variations to the planning provisions have been requested for these two open space areas.

As for visual privacy, the application states that the west elevation first floor windows are proposed to have a sill height of 1.5 metres, which it claims will mean "there are not undue opportunities for overlooking adjacent properties".

The east elevation is adjacent to the driveway which according to the application "provides suitable separation from 185 West St".

The rear(north) boundary of 183 West St is shared with 32 Warrah St which contains an existing three-unit multi-dwelling.

Although the balcony on at the rear is proposed to be screened to the east, the northern side of the balcony and the first floor windows will look directly down at the private open space of 32 Warrah St's rear unit and its ground floor living area which incorporates a glasspanelled door and servery window.

The rear setback of 32 Warrah St is only 2.7m according to the approved plans on Central Coast Council's website.

According to the approved drawings for 32 Warrah St, the rear boundary was to be at least partially screened by vegetation including a "major tree canopy species achieving a mature height of eight to 10 metres and be

address the acoustic privacy of having adjoining private open space with the rear property, instead concentrating on minimising traffic noise from West St.

The effect on acoustic and visual privacy of private open space areas and their associated living areas in close proximity has not been discussed in the application.

There is no arborist report included with the drawings and no information about any existing trees and whether or not they are to be retained.

The application states that the front verge would allow the planting of a street tree "if required".

It claims that due to its northsouth orientation the proposal complies with all requirements for solar access and overshadowing.

Shadow diagrams are provided. The application is currently open for written submissions with a closing date of February 10.

Changes requested to 2016 approval

A request has been made for changes to a development application approved in 2016 for a four-unit residential flat building at 209 West St, Umina.

The area of the property is 747.7 square metres and it is zoned general residential (R1).

Its western boundary is on Morris St and southern boundary on West St.

The approved plans show gross floor areas of 95.6 m2, 95.5 m2, 103.8 m2 and 71.2 square metres for units 1 to 4 respectively, for a total of 373.1 square metres and a floor space ratio of 49.89 per cent. A construction certificate for the

development was issued in 2017.

The original council assessment report is not available and it is not clear why the proposal is classified as a residential flat, rather than multi-dwelling an attached development, given there appears to be no vertical juxtaposition of units

Under the new proposal, Units 1. 2 and 3 would have vehicular access with individual driveways from Morris St and unit 4 would be accessed from West St.

The application prepared by AAMO Architects on behalf of the applicant Mr Wali Hakim contains a list of the proposed changes to the approved application.

The main changes are staging of the project, the change of the Unit 3 garage from a single to a double, and to "shift all bedrooms to the first floor".

All four units will now have double garages.

The staging would involve building the entire slab for all four units, then building the West St facing units and commencing construction of the rear Units 1 and 2 once an occupation certificate had been issued for the others.

Other changes include the moving of bin storage from an exterior location to inside the garages for units 1 and 2, and changing the exterior cladding from brickwork to "reliable cladding".

"To reduce the floor space areas the side set backs increased from 900mm to 1000mm."


It is claimed that the conversion of the single garage to a double garage and creation of a new bedroom on the ground level for unit 4 will balance the areas and not increase them.

It is also claimed that the footprint of the building and its shape and form will be the same as the original approval.

No detailed figures or drawings explaining the changes have been included for public exhibition.

The requested amendment is currently on exhibition for submissions on the Central Coast Council website but no closing date is specified.

The application states that the proposal seeks a 1.5 metre front boundary fence and a 1.8 metre fence for the private open space area which is set back 1.5 metres

According to Google maps none of this appears to have eventuated on the Warrah St side.

However the landscape plan with this application includes planting along the rear boundary of "Aussie compact Lilly Pillys" which should reach a mature height of three metres.

Also proposed on the rear boundary are a blueberry ash and a water gum both of which should reach a mature height of eight metres.

asked for public It has consultation about the Central Coast Council resolution in November to double the number of submissions, from 10 to 20, required to refer development applications to the Panel.

It said the council should comply with a Ministerial Direction issued in May which required councils to

"the subject of 10 or more unique submissions by way of objection". "There doesn't appear to be an

existing Submissions Policy," said Network chair Mr Gary Chestnut. But the Central Coast Council did have an Assessment of Development Applications Policy, which specified the number of submissions at 10, he said.

Any new or amended council policies changing the submission numbers should be publicly exhibited, he said.

Otherwise, the number set by the Ministerial Direction was 10

"That this policy be submitted to the Department of Planning for approval."

This seems to imply request that the Minister issue a new Direction to make special provisions for Central Coast Council.

"We have referred this matter to the Minister for the Central Coast and his parliamentary colleagues," said Mr Chestnut.

National Parks replaces missing post

The National Parks and Wildlife Service has replaced a post protecting a threatened species in Brisbane Water National Park near Warrah Trig that it claimed six months ago was not missing.

A number of yellow roadside posts warn of "threatened species" in the area, but one appears not to have been replaced after track reconstruction and a subsequent hazard reduction burn.

Two rare native plants were slashed to the ground in maintenance work by the Service in August because the post was not in place at the time to warn the maintenance crew.

However, when asked about the missing post, the service told Peninsula News: "NPWS staff checked the posts on August 19 and all were in place."

On this basis, the Service's public affairs officer Mr Laurence Orel said that slashing had only been undertaken outside the "threatened flora zone".

"The 'warning posts' are a visual reminder for persons working on Warrah Trig Rd to obtain approval to undertake works in this zone due to presence of threatened flora.

Service has "The not undertaken slashing works within this threatened flora zone," he said.

Peninsula News provided the Service with pictures showing the post originally in place, but absent at the time of the slashing, as well

as evidence of the plant being protected by the missing post.

In recent maintenance work, the post has been replaced.

The August slashing was the second setback for the plants of the endangered species astrotricha crassifolia, sometimes called the thick-leaf star-hair.

The two plants had been burnt the ground in a hazard reduction burn in July 2023.

The species is believed to exist in just two small patches near Sydney, one being at Warrah Trig. and their numbers were said to be declining.

The plants were just showing signs of regrowing from their roots, when they were slashed.

Mr Orel told Peninsula News in August: "Astrotricha crassifolia has been a priority species under the Saving our Species program since 2016 and a conservation strategy has been developed.

"In Brisbane Water National Park, actions include targeted searches for new individuals

monitoring health status of existing populations, seed collection and the establishment of an ex-situ insurance population.

"The main threat to the population appears to be lack of germination and the risk of a stochastic event such as a large wildfire (one that burns all known populations in one event).

"Save our Species research noticed a continual decline of Astrotricha crassifolia in less frequently burnt areas and scientific research has indicated that it would benefit from reduced canopy competition as a result of burning.

"A proportion of the total population at Brisbane Water National Park were selected to be included in the burn trial in 2023 and monitoring of these stems postfire is ongoing. "Astrotricha crassifolia has resprouted postfire, and monitoring of the post-fire response will continue."

New developments unlikely to be to lifestyle standards

The Council's decision to increase the number of development-application required objections to trigger a referral to the Planning Panel gives a pretty fair indication of where development priorities are going to be headed over the next three years.

The number of referrals made every year is almost insignificant, in comparison to the number of applications long hanging fire in the Council system, so the argument that this change is necessary to speed up the processing of applications is patently fatuous.

The only result of this decision will be to speed up the processing of a certain small number of particular applications, and it isn't necessary to guess which ones these are, because they are obviously the worst ones - the ones that the community finds the least acceptable.

The Council action is, in effect, a move to deprive ratepayers of the opportunity to oppose the developments that they find the most objectionable.

It would be interesting to know how many referrals over, say, the past three years would not have reached the new minimum number and, hence, would have been left in the hands of the Council: it is easy to assume that the new

number hasn't been selected at random but has been designed to eliminate almost all referrals, given how difficult it is to collect even the smaller number now required..

Since this is the Council that ratepayers just elected, we have to assume that this was the policy that the general run of residents wanted.

However, one wonders how many of them have had the personal experience of seeing a proposed development on an adjoining property that will adversely affect their day-to-day amenity.

I suspect that, in the next three years, some of them will get a rude shock, when they discover what their voting decision means to them individually.

With the Minister expanding the areas of high-density development on the Coast and reducing the control standards for these developments, we can expect to see an increasing number of multi-storey developments in lowdensity residential zones.

The likelihood that these new projects will be compatible with current environmental and lifestyle standards is zero, so anybody in one of these Ministerial target zones had better look to his defences: he won't be able to expect much help from the Council. SOURCE:

Panel approves two proposals and rejects a third

The Local Planning Panel has approved two development applications on the Peninsula, while rejecting a third, at its meeting on Thursday, December 19.

It approved a house in Myola Rd and four units in Trafalgar Ave, but refused alterations to a child care centre in Booker Bay.

The Panel approved construction of a house at 24 Myola Rd, Umina, subject to conditions detailed in the Central Coast Council planners' assessment report with three amendments.

"The Panel considered the application, the written submissions, the submissions made at the public meeting and the Council's assessment report," it stated, in giving its reasons.

"The Panel generally concurs with Council's assessment that the development application be approved.

"The the Panel noted community's concern regarding the loss of trees, but acknowledges that the assessment of Council's ecologist is that these are not part of an Endangered Ecological Community; specific trees will be required to be retained and protected during construction; and additional plantings are proposed, as identified in the approved Arboricultural Impact Assessment Report and shown on the Landscape Plan."

The Panel required that "Evidence is to be provided that compliance has been met with the recommendations in Section 5.2, of the approved Bushfire Report, prior to the issue of the construction certificate".

bushfire "The on-going mitigation measures are to maintained in perpetuity, as required in the recommendations in Section 5.1, 5.3, 5.4 of the approved Bushfire Report."

The Panel also approved an application for construction of a four-unit multi-unit development at 140 Trafalgar Ave, Umina.

"The Panel considered application, written the the submissions, the submissions made at the public meeting and the Council's assessment report.

"The Panel generally concurs with Council's assessment that the development application be approved.

"The Panels notes that the proposal was amended during the assessment to improve the layout of the dwellings and reduce the density."

However, the Panel refused an application for alterations and additions to an existing child care centre at 97-99 Booker Bay Rd and 2 Davis St, Booker Bay, despite a recommendation for conditional approval by council planners.

The Panel gave 18 detailed reasons for refusal.

These included "failure to adequately address cumulative expanded impacts" the of centre, the need to "re-cast" the development application, a considerable shortfall in on-site parking, visual impacts of fencing,

non-compliant side and rear setbacks, an inadequate plan of management, and lack of detail in the landscape plan.

"The Panel supports the provision of additional child care centre places, as it is understood that there is a significant need for the facility in the Booker Bay locality.

"However, the Panel is of the view that the proposal is an overdevelopment of the site, and provides inadequate drawings, supporting information and consideration of the impacts of the intensified centre as a whole, and cannot be supported in its current form.

"This is particularly in light of the impacts on the amenity of the adjoining neighbours."

GUST says council staff recognise need for trees

The Peninsula's voluntary Grow Urban Shade Trees group believes Council's Open Spaces team has recognised the need to increase tree canopy on the Peninsula to address the "urban heat island" effect.

It has agreed to process resident orders for free street trees with the help of the group, which will continue to liaise with residents in the ordering process, said group member Ms Debbie Sunartha.

She said the group was "heartened by the efforts of Council staff" which were hampered by the lack of resources allocated by the council executive.

"Central Coast Council remains an outlier in addressing the urban heat crisis and the time frame for planting is dependent upon availability of staff who are also very busy maintaining parks," said Ms Sunartha.

"This is very frustrating as the need for shade has never been more urgent." says Ms Sunartha."

She said Doctors for the Environment were deeply concerned by the increase in heatrelated illness and death caused by

poor urban design in conjunction with a heating planet.

"Heat is now officially the most fatal of all natural hazards.

"Strategically-placed trees are important heat-mitigating infrastructure.

"The road is where so much heat is retained and is also the human thoroughfare.

"It makes perfect sense to plant appropriate shade-bearing trees on our streets and this is what we see happening in other local government areas," she said.

"The Peninsula has well below the recommended canopy cover and, at less than 10 per cent coverage, it sits below even Sydney's most poorly performing suburbs.'



Brisbane Water Bridge Club member Barry Foster has reached a rank of Grand Master, having earned 1000 masterpoints over 17 years.


Barry thanked his regular partner Hope Tomlinson who earned about 800 of the required points with him and participated in the long journey.
