Coastal Twist Festival Fair Day in doubt

The Coastal Twist Festival's Fair Day planned for the Umina Recreation Precinct on Sunday, October 5, is in doubt unless a planning stalement is resolved.

Central Coast Council has issued a letter stating "the proposed festival cannot be supported on the long weekend".

The Council's media unit has told Peninsula News that this was not a refusal but a request for more information about the application, which was lodged on February 10.

It was not until six months after the application was lodged, earlier this month on July 2, when "senior Council staff and senior representatives of NSW Police met with the applicant to provide advice and guidance on the information required".

Festival organiser Mr Juan locco said the advice included requirements which "total to a \$35,000 bill in reports, including two separate traffic reports and two bushfire reports".

He said: "No community or local event would be able to cover this."

Mr locco said the letter stated: "The proposed date of the festival, Sunday, October 5, will clash with the long weekend and NRL grand final.

He said the festival was intentionally aligned with a long weekend as a tourism event and, as with many Sydney events on the same day, had no impact on the NRL grand final.

The Council media statement issued on Saturday claimed: "Council is keen for the event to proceed and is very supportive of it, having provided funding for it."

Responding to a question to West Ward councillors of whether this support would extend to paying for the reports, Cr Belinda Neal said: "The Coastal Twist Festival Fair Day is a much-anticipated event for the Peninsula.

"It would be a great disappointment to the residents if the festival did not take place.

"I have been urging the Mayor and CEO and Director for Environment and Planning to resolve outstanding issues so this community event can proceed."

According to Mr locco, the Council letter stated: "Upon assessment of the application, the proposed festival cannot be supported on the long weekend due to the likely impacts the festival may have on the locality."

"In this regard, parking in Councils carparks and surrounding streets will already be at capacity with long weekend visitors.

"The festival will result in unacceptable traffic and parking impacts; therefore, the date of the festival is not supported."

The council media statement said the growth of the Fair Day meant the application needed "to reflect how these larger numbers will be managed to ensure the event is a success for the operator and the attendees".

"The applicant must be able

to provide necessary information on how the operator will manage potential impacts for the safe operation of the event, including traffic, parking, waste, toilets and amenities, and the like.

"The NSW Police must also be satisfied that in particular traffic and crowds are able to be managed.

"Council staff are currently awaiting the receipt of information from the applicant in relation to those matters."

It is not clear whether this, and the need for consultant reports, was explained in the "pre-lodgement meeting" normally held between an applicant and council planning staff before a development application is submitted.

The basis of the council assessment is also unclear, and whether it included the need to deploy Brisbane Water police to Sydney for the grand final.

Because the application has not been refused, no information is yet provided of the assessment on the council planning portal.

Minutes of pre-lodgement meetings are also not published on the portal.

Mr locco said: "We are persevering. We will give our all."

He said he was hopeful of a pro bono offer to prepare the necessary reports.

Editorial policy and guidelines

At its heart, Peninsula News is a community effort.

It welcomes and relies on the contributions provided voluntarily and at no cost by local organisations, groups and residents.

The newspaper aims to be accessible to the community - both through making its columns accessible to community groups and by having copies available in accessible locations, including through its website

The following policies and guidelines are designed to support the aims and standards of the newspaper.

Locality

The newspaper's editorial policy reflects a desire to reinforce the Peninsula's sense of community.

To qualify for publication, articles must have specific relevance to the Peninsula. For example, they must be about activities or events happening on the Peninsula or be organised by or involving Peninsula people.

The newspaper is not regional or national in nature, so regional or national issues will not be canvassed except as they affect the Peninsula.

Regional sports will only be covered from the perspective of Peninsula clubs. Regional plans will only be aired in the context of their ramifications for the Peninsula

Peninsula News aims to be inclusive of as much of the Peninsula community as possible.

Readability

To ensure that the newspaper serves its purpose, it must be readable and represent the interests and activities of the community in its content.

Contributions to the paper are edited to consistent standards of readability. Guidelines are available for intending contributors.

All items will be dated. They must contain the name of the author to whom the contribution may be attributed, with their first name spelt out, along with their suburb or organisation. Anonymous contributions will not be accepted.

Forum letters

The Forum section provides the opportunity for readers to express their views on any aspect of Peninsula community life, with the aim of reflecting the community's diversity of opinion.

Nevertheless, letters may be edited for readability, including for length, spelling and grammar, and to avoid legal liability on the part of the newspaper, or they may be declined altogether.

Contributors are asked to keep their contributions to the matter at hand, and to

focus on the issues and not abuse or insult others.

Other than in the case of holding public figures to account, criticism of others (as opposed to criticism of particular opinions) is unlikely to be published in the interests of facilitating the expression of a diversity of views.

All letter writers need to supply name, address and contact details. Only name and suburb will be published.

Contributors who do not wish the wording of their letter to be changed at all should make a note to this effect when submitting their letter. In some cases, this may result in the letter not being published.

Corrections

We try to be as accurate as possible. However, mistakes can still slip through.

If you believe we have got something wrong, whether an error of fact or interpretation, we ask that you write to us by email with details for publication. These corrections may appear as Forum letters or as news items and should conform to our requirements for news and Forum contributions.

Source lines

Peninsula News includes "source lines" at the end of each article which aim to provide readers with information about where and how we came across the information, so that they might judge for themselves the veracity of what they are reading.

It should not be assumed that the article is a verbatim reproduction of the source. Similarly, it should not be assumed that any reporter listed is necessarily responsible for writing the whole news item. Source lines are not by-lines.

Often articles come from a number of sources. They are edited for readability and reader interest and given different headings, and consequently can be expressed quite differently from the source material.

Peninsula News usually receives its information in three ways: It is sent to us by someone wanting to promote their activities; it is sent to us in response to our inquiries; or it comes from a newsletter or other document to which we have access.

Sometimes we may interview a person or report what they said at a meeting.

It has almost been a Dry July

Only 3.4mm rain has fallen on the Peninsula in the last two weeks, and only 10.3mm in the last three weeks.


If 55.3mm had not fallen in the first three days of the month, it really would have been a Dry July.

The month-to-date total of 65.6mm is 83 per cent of the average monthly rainfall of 79mm, according to figures supplied by Mr Jim Morrison of Umina.

The July average will be reached if another 13.4mm falls before the end of the month.

The cumulative total for the year stands at 993mm, which is 9.0 per cent more than the average at the end of July of 911mm.

Neal urges residents to view Woy Woy foreshore plans

West Ward's Cr Belinda Neal has urged residents to express their views on the Woy Woy Foreshore Masterplan.

Cr Belinda Neal said she moved at last week's council meeting that the draft Woy Woy Foreshore Masterplan be put on public exhibition for 42 days.

"The Woy Woy Foreshore is an important cultural focus for the Peninsula community," she said.

"The design caters to the recreational needs of the community in a beautiful environment.

"This concept design includes the key precincts along the corridor, being Anderson Park; Pelican Park; Woy Woy Baths; Anzac Memorial Park; Wetlands Precinct; and Lions Park.

"A further report will be provided to Council on the outcomes of community consultation following the public exhibition.

"No alteration is to be made to the Memorial Park as part of this masterplan. "Work cannot be undertaken on Memorial Park without an approved Heritage Conservation Management Plan.

"This will ensure that the dignity and cultural value of the park and memorial is protected.

"Pelican Park and the sea swimming enclosure are key to this area and work is planned to be completed.

"The plan proposes to push the seawall out to reclaim some land and create a destination on the foreshore.

"A Slipway Garden provides ramp access down to the water level.

"The council was successful in receiving a \$1 million grant from the NSW Government via the Community Assets Program, to upgrade and repair the swimming enclosure.

"Council has allocated a further \$600,000 as part of the capital works program."

Two firies in fund-raising climb for MND

Two Umina Fire and Rescue firefighters, Ms Mikahli Clune and Ms Hannah Veen, are raising money for motor neurone disease research by taking part in an event in the Blue Mountains.

"Hannah and myself have taken up the challenge to do the Firies Climb for Motor Neurone Disease," said Ms Clune.

Calling themselves the Firecrackers, they will climb the Furber Steps in the Blue Mountains "to support the incredible work done at the MND Research Centre at Macquarie University".

Ms Clune said: "This challenge is hard, but not as hard as MND which is a progressive, terminal neurological disease.

"It affects the nerve cells (neurones) controlling the muscles



that enable us to move, speak, breathe and swallow, causing them to degenerate and die.

"Macquarie University houses Australia's largest MND research facility, as well as the MND Clinic which treats 10 per cent of patients in Australia. "All researchers work together in the one facility, on the one topic, with one aim: To stop MND."

Proposal to add three rooftop terraces

An application has been submitted to add a rooftop terrace to each of the three townhouses currently being built on the corner of The Esplanade and Augusta St, Umina Beach.

A 37 square metre rooftop terrace with a barbecue bench will be added to each of the three dwellings, approved under DA/5940/1999 at 168 Esplanade.

Access will be via new external stairs from the first-floor balconies.

The new additions will remain under the 8.5-metre height limit for

The application, prepared by Zane Solutions, states that the new terraces will be set back 0.898m to 2.020m, from the building edges.

The proposal includes planter boxes with screen plantings around the edges of the terraces to prevent neighbours from being overlooked.

A 1.86-metre-high privacy screen on the north side of the rear terrace would block views into the backyard of the neighbouring property at 21 Augusta St.

The application describes the terraces as "ancillary" outdoor areas, and suggests they will be used less frequently than the main ground-floor courtyards and balconies.

Their use would be unlikely to create adverse noise impacts on surrounding residents, the application claimed.

It stated that the proposal "generally complies" with the requirements of the relevant planning controls. "

Discrepancies exist in documents

A development application trees is clearly delineated on the has been lodged with Central Coast Council to demolish an existing house and garage at 46 Karingi St, Ettalong, and construct a new two-storey dual occupancy.

The application prepared by Red Apple Design describes the proposal for the 520-square-metre site consisting of two attached, three-bedroom dwellings.

Basix According to the statement, however, both dwellings have four or more bedrooms.

No landscape plans or an arborist report are exhibited, and no mention is made of trees in the application, despite the fact that tree protection for three existing Erosion and Sediment Control

The new building has a hipped roof and an "articulated facade to integrate with the existing streetscape".

Each dwelling will have its own private, north-facing courtyard at ground level, accessible from the internal living areas.

Vehicular access for the double garage of each unit will be provided via the rear laneway so there will be no driveways required on Karingi Street.

The application notes that the site is located in a flood-prone area, and the design has incorporated a minimum finished floor level of 5.2 based on council's flood data.

proposal a variation of 3.9 per cent to maximum allowable floor space ratio, with a formal request submitted to council for

The application states that this is required to provide functional and liveable room sizes within the

The council planning portal claims application was on public exhibition from July 11 to 25, but was not actually displayed until after July 13 which meant Peninsula News could not report on it for the last edition to give readers the opportunity to make submissions.

Application for 4G and 5G antennas at McEvoy oval

An application has submitted for а "communications facility" at 109 McEvoy Ave, Umina.

Submitted by Indara Infrastructure Pty Ltd, it is described as involving "one new Indara monopole; four new 4G panel antennas (less than 2.8m long) mounted to the monopole; eight new 5G active antenna units (less than 1.0m long) mounted to the monopole".

There would also be one new

four-bay outdoor equipment cabinet at ground level, ancillary equipment including remote radio units, antenna mounts, cable trays and fibre and electrical cabling.

"The facility will be located within a fenced compound area."

The application opens for public comment on August 1 and closes on August 29.

Manufactured dwelling proposed for Hobart Ave

manufactured dwelling" may be installed at 24 Hobart Ave, Umina, if an application received by Central Coast Council is approved.

The 743 square metre site is zoned R1 General Residential, with a depth of 60.96m and a street frontage of 12.19 metres.

The new dwelling will be two storeys, manufactured off site at the Parkwood Modular Buildings

The number of bedrooms and bathrooms is not specified.

It will replace a single-storey, two-bedroom dwelling which is proposed for demolition.

The application claims that the height of the completed dwelling will be 7.58 metres and the floor space ratio 0.5:1 which comply with planning provisions.

It is claimed that site coverage, setbacks, view and privacy also

A garage will be constructed on site, attached to the front of the dwelling.

The application claims: "The proposed dwelling is oriented to the north, consistent with the alignment of surrounding properties.

"A well-lit living environment to maximise natural daylight, supporting energy efficiency through passive solar gain, and maintaining established the character of the neighbourhood."

However, the shadow diagrams have been inverted and show an incorrect upside down north point.

The application states: "The streetscape is characterised by varied facades, rooflines, and material palettes, enhancing the character and variety of the established streetscape.

"As a developed coastal locality, the area reflects a blend of modern design elements and established character housing, supporting a cohesive yet varied neighbourhood identity.

"The proposed dwelling is consistent with this evolving streetscape and maintains compatibility with the existing built

It is proposed to remove one tree and one existing tree stump, the locations of which "are clearly identified on the submitted site

The rear of the property contains several existing trees which will be

In keeping with the low site impact of a manufactured dwelling, the new driveway is proposed to be constructed in gravel and link to the existing gravel crossover.

In conclusion the application states that "the proposal is for a new manufactured dwelling which has been designed to complement the appearance and character of the area and surrounding

Residents association calls for more local transport

The Peninsula Residents Association has called for flexible and frequent local bus services in a submission to the draft Strategic Regional Integrated Transport Plan.

This should include "expanding smaller, more frequent buses to underserviced areas, expanded east-west routes with better links to Gosford and centres like Erina and Terrigal".

It said service hours should be extended, by including evenings and weekends across key bus routes and trialling flexible after hours' services such as ondemand transport or community shuttles and improved taxi-ride share coverage.

It called for improved bus and active travel links to Gosford's health, education and employment hubs, to enable Peninsula residents to benefit from these regional assets.

Access to Woy Woy Station should be upgraded with safe walkways, shaded access routes and local bus loops connecting surrounding suburbs and bike storage to strengthen Woy Woy's hub role, the submission said.

There should be stronger intermodal coordination, including improved timetabling coordination between modes to support seamless mobility across rail, bus and ferry networks.

It called for "safe and shaded active transport" routes.

This should include building feeder routes from Peninsula suburbs to the Brisbane Water shared cycleway, completion of priority walking and cycling routes, enhancing accessibility with shade, signage and seating and integrating routes with public transport (bus stops and train station).

Strong "climate-adapted design" should be integrated into all infrastructure upgrades, with tree planting and other greening, shade structures and cool surface design across transport corridors.

The submission also called for the use of Brisbane Water to be explored as a transport corridor, with feasibility studies and trials for increased ferry and water taxi services.

May I take issue with Peter ("Roundabout **Shortland** upgrade not likely to relieve congestion", PN623) when he says that, in his view, the Memorial Ave-Gallipoli Ave junction "was never a (traffic) problem".

I use this intersection fairly frequently, and it is a very awkward junction that can well use an upgrade, to improve safety for those turning from Gallipoli Ave right into Memorial Ave.

The present sightline is poor, and the two-way traffic on Memorial Ave leaves few gaps for turning traffic, so a simple adjustment would be welcome.

That said, I can agree with him that it is difficult to see much longterm, large-scale benefit from the footling intersection improvements proposed for the length of Blackwall Rd-Memorial Ave.

The whole scheme is nothing but a band-aid approach to future needs, putting off the hard decisions for somebody else to solve later.

Given that the Council is "planning" for a 60 per cent increase in housing units on the Peninsula over a mere 10 years, one would have thought that such a dramatic transformation would require commensurate consideration for all the subsidiary requirements of the area.

It is, accordingly, bizarre in the extreme to have Cr Wright assuring us that the Council is "not projecting significant population growth in the area" ("Significant population growth not projected, says Cr Wright", PN623).

From the reports of proposed developments, it appears that the general trend is for existing small houses to be replaced by threebedroom and four-bedroom units. so that it would seem far more likely that population will increase by more than 60 per cent and that traffic volumes will increase to match.

The idea that these trivial intersection improvements will make the road "fit for the future", as Liesl Tesch would have us believe ("Road upgrade 'fit for future' increase in population", PN623), flies in the face of all common sense and all traffic-engineering experience.

The Peninsula is one of the worst locations possible for largescale population increase.

It is a low-lying alluvial flat with chronic drainage problems and is probably the area of Central Coast most vulnerable to any sea-level

Many existing streets have narrow, potholed pavements, and there is a dearth of footpaths, so that children already have no choice but to walk on the road. in constant danger from passing traffic which can only get worse.

The tree canopy is disappearing rapidly, and a 60 per cent increase in building coverage can only mean that it will shrink further, creating more heat spots.

Julian Bowker is absolutely correct ("Population increase of 60 per cent lacks planning, say residents", PN623) to criticize the Council's failure to adjust planning provisions and provide detailed guidance for the massive changes that are envisioned.

When even the Local Planning Panel can see how inadequate Council's efforts are and is calling for a review of standards and processes, we must know we are in deep trouble.

The Council can't even get such a relatively simple exercise as the Woy Woy Waterfront Upgrade right ("Woy Woy waterfront cost blows out", PN623), so what can we expect of it, when it has to manage a complex and difficult development exercise over the whole Peninsula.

Magic numbers from Cr Wright are not a useful contribution to the debate that we should be having.

Reid vows to protect penalty rates

Penalty and overtime rates for millions of Australian workers are one step closer to protection enshrined in law, according to Member for Robertson Dr Gordon Reid.

Legislation will be changed to incorporate a high-level principle into the Fair Work Act that operates alongside the modern awards objective, ensuring penalty rates and overtime can't be rolled up into a single rate of pay where it leaves any individual employee worse off, he said.

"The Bill will protect crucial entitlements for around 2.6 million modern award-reliant workers, many who count on penalty rates to make ends meet.

"Employers in the retail, clerical and banking sectors have made applications to the Fair Work Commission to trade away the penalty rates of lower paid workers from awards, leaving some workers worse off.

"The Bill ensures that in applications like these, no worker sees their pay packet reduced."

Dr Reid said he would always protect workers' penalty rates.

"I know how important penalty rates are to Central Coast workers especially frontline healthcare workers."

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
