Creek concerns cause a rethink

Gosford councillors have decided against spraying herbicides as part of a maintenance program for the Kahibah Creek System, which runs through southern Umina.

The maintenance is needed to remove weeds and sediment from the €reek to allow efficient flood flows.

Councillors decided to take the more labour intensive and expensive option of "cut and paint" rather than the cheaper and possibly environmentally destructive, spraying option.

The cost, according to council officer estimates, is approximately 10 times as much with the cut and paint method at about \$5 per square metre.

The cut and paint method involves cutting of individual reeds and then painting the stump with a herbicide.

Other parts of the creek will be cleared by excavation.

Local environmentalist, Mr Bryan Ellis, said the last excavation had turtles dragged out of the

He said he was concerned about any spraying method because of its possible environmental impact.

"The herbicide council was going to use has only ever been tested on the tadpoles of the North American leopard frog, not on any other wildlife.

"There is anecdotal evidence that the last local spraying killed eels." Mr Ellis said spraying was indiscriminate and killed native vegetation that posed no potential flooding problems.

He said spraying also kills the endemic species of Phragmites reeds, which are thin stemmed and sparse and therefore flatten in any flood flow.

Cr Lynne Bockholt said the last excavation was a disaster with excavated material left on the sides of the creek and that she wants to see any excavated material removed this time.

"If we excavate a path, the stuff must be removed." Cr Bockholt said the creeks' maintenance had been sorely mlsslng.

"There has been a severe lack of maintenance and we have never got to the stage of a management plan," she said. "The creek system was destroyed by development in the late and mid-80s, which has resulted in flooding of the area.

"One of the main reasons I ran for council in 1991 was because of this and still not much has been done." In reply to the extra cost of a cut and paint method, Cr Bockholt said: "Not a penny has been spent on those creeks in years.

"The creeks need to be cleared quickly, with no spraying and regular maintenance." Council's director of development and the environment, Mr John Murray, said the work should be carried out before the historically wet period early next year.

"The concern is that should rainfall return to the earlier pattern, flooding could become a serious problem and council could be considered negligent and may be liable for resulting damages," he said

Cr Bockholt was in favour of quick action.

"I have had so many complaints recently about the neglect and lack of maintenance in the creek system and I am delighted that council has agreed that work to clean out the creeks get under way immediately," she said.

Council officers had favoured the spraying approach, which would be in accordance with Environmental Protection Agency guidelines, but community groups disagreed.

The Kahibah Landcare group and the Umina Progress Association agreed to excavation but were concerned about council's desire to spray certain upstream sections

Cr Bockholt said she was happy with the councillors decision not to spray.

"I am very pleased that council agreed that no sprays would be used because as well as destroying all the vegetation it touches, it also kills frogs, tadpoles, toads and other important fauna which inhabit the creek system.

"The creek system has suffered over the years through urban expansion and council neglect.

"There must be no more excuses for council officers to do nothing in regards to maintenance while blaming community groups for the lack of progress," she said.

Ettalong to Palm Beach ferry starts

A new ferry service for Peninsula residents and commuters travelling from Ettalong Beach to Palm Beach is up and running.

The owners, who have operated t/1e Palm Beach Ferry Service between Patonga and Palm Beach since 1982, will run the new service seven days a week.

The owners bought an 80-seat aluminium catamaran, Spirit, for the Ettalong Beach run.

The catamaran, built in 1981, has been operating at Forster for 18 years and has a maximum speed of 15 knots, The owners say the trip to Palm Beach should take about 40 minutes of which 10 minutes will be setting down and picking up passengers.

Managing director Peter Verrills said the decision to run the new service was prompted by public demand and if all goes well another catamaran will be ordered to increase runs.

A one-way ticket will cost \$6 for adults and \$3 for children and Ferry-10 passes entitling passengers 10 trips whenever they want to take them cost \$50.

The ferry will leave Ettalong every 80 minutes from 6am to 12.40pm, 4.10pm and 5.30pm, Monday to Friday, and less frequently on Saturday, Sunday and public holidays.

Community members can volunteer to be part of the program in varying capacities from being a safety household to administrative duties as a committee member.

Committee member for the past six years, Dianne Gaston said: "We are only asking for two hours of volunteer's time every three months"

"We urge the community to help keep alive ,this worthy program.

"We all enjoy the lifestyle we lead here on the Peninsula and part of that can be attributed to the wonderful community spirit we share

Not so fast with the ferry

I write in reference to your article, "Final Ettalong Ferry reports submitted to governments" (9 November p.1).

Your article quotes Cr Sansom: "A public meeting held to protest about the ferry had people tum up to speak in favour of the project and they were not allowed to speak." Apart from this statement proven false by your reporter who was actually at the meeting, it needed to be pointed out that this meeting was organised by the Fast Ferry Reaction committee to give further information about the damages to the fore shores the ferries cause and was in fact a "meeting held to protest about the ferry" and the organisers were not there to have the meeting time deliberately wasted by people speaking the Fast Ship line.

The local newspapers (Peninsula News included), radio and NBN TV are doing little other than mouthing the Fast Ship line with no real investigation of what is actually proposed.

For example in the document exhibited by Fast Ship recently, it is stated that because they will

have to refuel in Sydney, ticket prices will have to be increased by \$6.48 per trip, which will effectively double the current cost to train commuters.

So the only commuters that will be able to afford to use the service are on higher income and probably live in the Killcare, McMasters Beach, Terrigal strip.

Yet in Gosford Council's business paper of October 26 under the heading, "Terrigal Foreshore Boardwalk & Feasibility Study for Terrigal Haven Jetty", it is stated: "There is no need to clarify that the jetty is not designed for fast ferry use, to reassure residents who were opposed to an earlier proposal to service the Haven".

So for Gosford Council a few objectors at Terrigal outweigh the 248 objectors on the Peninsuia.

Why aren't I surprised at that?

So the likely outcome of this is that we will have a fast ferry at Ettalong tMt only the rich at T errigal can afford and in the open water port of Terrigal that is perfect for a Fast Ferry wharf and service we will have an ornamental wharf that is useless.

While the councillors who are convinced that a Fast Ferry is what the people of the Peninsula want are not even democratic enough to grant us a public "open meeting" unless the councillors "deemed it necessary".

We should be calling for a public meeting so that the councillors can explain this arrogance and scom that they have for residents of the Peninsula, it seems it knows no bounds.

Previously, the speed limit was 10 knots within 30 metres of the shoreline.


Corridors of power

Patonga plans shelved

The draft development control plan (OCP) for Patonga is in danger of not going ahead, according to a member of the committee that drew up the draft.

This would leave Patonga without any cohesive development controls, according to Patonga village planning committee member, Mr Robert Osborne.

He said council has advised that it will not recommend the DCP be placed on public exhibit nor that they intend to take it further.

"This is due to the Progress Association's resolution to omit the section dealing with building materials and colours," he said in the publication Patonga Viillage Voice.

"It would seem absolutely pointless and indeed contrary to the wishes of the members to create a situation after three months of Progress meetings, where the

village is left with 90 per cent of nothing." Council said they support the concept of creating appropriate guidelines for Patonga but that guidelines on building materials and colours were important and needed to be addressed.

Mr Osborne said the omission of the secti9n dealing with building materials and colours by the Progress Association, was contrary to the decision of the greater community in the village and left Patonga in a precarious position of having little or no development controls.

Mr Vic Jefferies, a long-time resident of Patonga disagreed.

"I'm not decrying what the planning committee had done.

They are to be complimented on their hard work, but not this plan," he said.

"A DCP is needed, but the draft plan is not right for the area.

"The intentions are the best but the results are not what the area needs

"A public meeting showed the community was overwhelmingly in agreement to reject the plan after it was considered at length." Mr Jefferies said the guidelines on building materials and colours were too intrusive.

"Every regulation imposed diminishes personal liberty," he said

Mr Jefferies said the feeling in the community was that they needed a DCP but said the lack of one would not mean Patonga was in danger of rampant development.

"There are still guidelines that we must follow, like everyone else." Mr Jefferies, a committee member of the Patonga Progress Association, said he was not speaking in an official capacity.

"This is purely my personal opinion," he said.

Land and Environment Court 'needs a review' - Bockholt

Councillor Lynne Bockholt has welcomed the decision by delegates at the Local Government Conference, held recently at Dubbo, to call for an independent review of the Land and Environment Court.

Delegates supported motions including investigation into the adversarial and legalistic approach of the court, a perceived lack of expertise by Court assessors and the Court's decision-making processes.

Cr Bockholt said she felt the Court sometimes worked against the public interest.

"I am very pleased that delegates overwhelmingly called on the State Government to investigate the Land and Environment Court ," she said.

"These moves echo those of

Gosford Council which over the last few years has written several times to the State Government calling for changes in the way the Court operates.

"I hope that the State Government listens to local councils on this matter because it is vitally important to all local government areas.

"It's good to know that it's not only Gosford which is being asked

to approve developments which are not in the community interest, under threat of the matter being taken to the Land and Environment Court by developers.

"No councillor wants to see scarce ratepayer funds being spent on court costs but the alternative is to allow developments which are not in the community interest.

"At present decisions made at a local level by elected representatives can be overturned by a Court in which nobody has been elected and which many in the community believe has been set up as a developers' court." Cr Bockholt also pointed out that well-known Chief Justice James McLelland resigned from the court in the mid-1980s citing similar reasons.

Clubs and pubs to provide warning signs for gamblers

Peninsula gambling areas will have to provide warning signs about the risks associated with gambling from next year under a State Government harm minimisation program.

The signs will warn gamblers of the real odds of winning top poker machine prizes at "one in 2.8 million", and that excessive gambling can make you lose your home and family.

Other features of the harm minimisation program include A TMs being removed from poker machine areas, limits on cashing of cheques by licensed premises and the banning of "over the top" advertising.

Licensees stand to be fined more than \$5000 for single breaches of the new regulations and could lose their licence for flagrant breaches.

The number of poker machines in NSW has increased 51 per cent or 32,000 on figures four years ago.

Almost 10 per cent of poker machines in the world are in NSW and average losses for the problem gambler are more than \$50,000 before seeking help

Andrews requests closing of pension loophole

State Member for Peats, Ms Marie Andrews, has asked the Federal Government to fix a loophole which denies some Peninsula war widows access to the War Widows Pension.

Under Federal Government law war widows whose husbands died before 1984 and who remarried before then are not eligible for the War Widows Pension.

Ms Andrews said in State Parliament: "A very active War Widows Guild operates within the Woy Woy Peninsula and I have the greatest admiration for these ladies." "They do not ask for much but they have contributed and continue to contribute much to our society working within the community at large." There are currently 4000 widows Australiawide ineligible for the pension under the scheme.

"This has left many struggling to meet vital medical expenses as they enter their 60s and 70s.

"The loophole means that the Federal Government has also cut them off from the Veterans' Affairs gold card, thus denying them the medical treatment that they now desperately need and to extend the pension to all war widows would cost a measly \$18 million.

"This is a heartless and pennypinching exercise and

nothing more," she said.

Ms Andrews also said that some war widows from World War I, now in their 90s, were also being depied

Federal Member for Robertson, Mr Jim Lloyd, agreed that he would prefer the law to be changed.

"The estimated cost of the change would be about \$65 million over four years," he said.

However, Mr Lloyd pointed out that it was the Keating Labor Government that made the changes denying remarried war widows the pension.

"Also, we must remember that many of these widows who remarried have had the opportunity to re-establish their lives financially.

"However, many of the women are getting older and some have become widows again.

"There are some cases of genuine hardship," he said.

Woy Woy town upgrade deferred for Christmas

Many will have noticed that Pelican Park is nearing completion and hopefully will be ready for the holiday period.

The upgrade of the park forms part of the Woy Woy town centre improvements under Gosford City Council's Financial Strategy.

The street upgrading plans have been finalised including improvements to the forecourt area of the Woy Woy Library.

The Chamber has been advised that work will not commence on the street upgrading works until after the Christmas period so as not to disrupt peak holiday trading.

Umina Beach

As has been previously reported, efforts are still being made by the Chamber of Commerce to have the street upgrading plan reviewed.

The Council formed Umina Beach CBO Building Committee is split on the issue of the plan with the Chamber calling for an independent planning consultant to be engaged to review the future upgrading of the town centre.

The Chamber believes that the town centre can ill afford a further five raised pedestrian crossings and kerb blisters in West Street and side streets with traffic congestion already at an unbearable point.

It is the Chamber's opinion that the latest plan will be a traffic nightmare with roads being narrowed, vehicle access being restricted and pedestrian movements being chaotic.

The Chamber however does support the other elements of the street upgrading including footpath repaving, entry treatments, landscaping, street furniture and improvements to the Bullion Street

A compromise is encouraged to allow these works to proceed whilst the issue of the raised pedestrian thresh holds and kerb blisters is reviewed.

Ettalong Beach

The bulk of the Ettalong Beach upgrading work has been completed.

The new year will bring the landscaping of the Picnic Parade entry into Ettalong Beach with sign posting, flagging and medium strip landscaping.

Further funds are being allocated for works on The Esplanade between Picnic Parade and Memorial Avenue as part of the foreshore upgrade.

The Chamber acknowledges that street parking is at a premium at the moment whilst the i:;ttalong Beach Resort is under construction.

Peter Dean and Husam Mohamed, friends since they were eight years old, have gone into partnership to take over the business.


They found out about the

Video taping of council denied



Council Matters!

Issues this month of direct interest to the residents of the Peninsula are widely varied in their nature.

November 16: Request to video for historical purposes the debate on a development application for outdoor screening of movies at the Avoca Beach Theatre.

Moved: Wales/Doyle that the Council abide by a previous Council Resolution ...

and not permit video recording in the Chamber.

Arguments for:

Once a video is taken Council has no control over the editing.

Videotape could be used by developers to their advantage in the Land and Environment Court.

Arguments against:

The videotape is for historical/heritage purposes.

The previous Resolution of Council can be overridden.

The Vote:

On Leave: Councillors Holstein, Penton, Sansom.

For: Councillors Bell, Bockholt, Doyle, Wales.

Against: Councillors Brooks, Cook, Preece.

It should be noted that in both the State and Commonwealth Parliaments every word that is spoken in debate is recorded in Hansard.

Council records only the motions put and the mover and seconder of each motion.

The vote is only recorded if there is a request by at least two Councillors for a 'division'.

Unless a councillor declares "an interest" (financial or otherwise), they must vote.

A failure to indicate a vote is taken as a No vote.

From time to time on sensitive issues, some councillors prefer to sit on the fence.

This they achieve by being absent or leaving the Chamber before the vote is taken.

October 26: Maintenance - Kahibah Creek System (estimated cost \$150,000)

Kahibah Creek runs approximately SE from Glenhaven Close, crosses Brisbane Ave, Calypta Road and flows into the general area of Albany and Neera Roads and eventually into Ettalong Creek.

Moved: PreecelBockholt that work proceed as recommended by council officers but "where spraying is recommended this be replaced by the cut and paint method" of eradication.

Argument for:

Councillor Bockholt stated that Council had neglected this creek

for years.

She spoke of the danger of flooding and was critical of council's failure to implement a rehabilitation and management plan first resolved in 1994.

Of equal, if not greater importance, would have been the impact on the fauna such as frogs and insects.

\$10 million scheme provides electronic F3 signs for drivers

Peninsula commuters to Sydney now have improved access to traffic information on the F3 with the switching on of the first of eight new electronic Variable Message Signs (VMS).

State member for Peats, Ms Marie Andrews, switched on the sign at Kariong last month and said the signs are part of a \$10 million Driver Aid Scheme between Wahroonga and Kariong.

"The \$1.14 million VMS system has been designed to provide motorists with up to date road information and will be linked to the Road and Traffic Authority's new Transport Management Centre,".

Ms Andrews said.

"This will allow the Transport Management Centre to provide clear, concise and up to date advice to motorists about travel conditions, accidents, expected delays and information on special events.

"Both in Australia and overseas, driver aid schemes have proven extremely effective in reducing the number and severity of accidents, and associated congestion.

'The system has been designed to provide motorists with up to date road information.'

community education campaign will advise motorists on how the signs work and how they have been designed to keep drivers informed on freeway conditions.

"The campaign will also introduce motorists to the RT A's highly visible traffic patrol vans which already patrol the freeway 24 hours a day.

"Their job is to respond quickly to breakdowns and accidents, help road users when needed and ensure the potential for delay is minimised for everyone.

"This overall package is an important part of the State Government's plan to deliver real safety and traffic flow benefits to motorists on the F3, particularly during peak commuter and holiday periods," she said.

Why bless the fleet?

Many people have asked about the reason for including the blessing of the fleet at the recent Oyster's Birthday celebration in a safe haven such as Woy Woy and how big the fishing fleet on the Peninsula is.

According to the Fisheries department and local historians, commercial fishing has been a part of our community for more than 100 years.

During this time, many changes have occurred including area closures, restricted licences and a reduced number of professional fishermen.

There are currently 22 professional fishing vessels operating from the Peninsula bringing in \$750,000 worth of fish annually which adds \$3 million to our region and employs 32 people directly and 110 indirectly.

The blessing of the fishing fleet is a ceremony in which our ancestors have participated in other lands since the 12th century.

The first fishing fleet blessing in Australia took place in Fremantie in WA in 1950.

The ceremony in Woy Woy adds to the Oysters Birthday celebration.

Local major sponsors were the Woy Woy Fisherman's Wharf, the Bay View Hotel, Brisbane Water Oyster Farmers.

Safer Towns meetings start

Gosford Council's newly appointed community safety officer for the Safer Towns and Cities Project, Sally Anderson - Day, has conducted her first meeting with the Peninsula Community Forum in preparation for the launch of the Peninsula Pilot Program.

Cr Wales said that it was important that the wider community participate in the pilot program by putting forward their concerns in relation to crime and safety problems.

She said the program coordinator, Sally Anderson-Day, comes with a wealth of experience and her job is to liaise with all sections of the community so as to fully document the community's concerns.

The program is funded through state confiscation of the proceeds of crime.

I State Member for Peats, Ms Marie Andrews, said: "This program is about achieving justice for the whole community.

"The program turns the proceeds of confiscated criminal activity into positive plans for the community," she said.

Government encourages older Australians to keep on working

The Commonwealth Government through Centrelink is offering the Pension Bonus scheme as an incentive for older Australians to stay in the workforce.

Under the scheme, people of Age Pension age who defer claiming the Age or Service pension and continue working may be able to obtain a tax-free lump sum bonus of up to \$22,393 for a single person and \$37,380 for a couple.

The bonus is paid when an Age

Commonwealth Pension is eventually claimed.

People who wish to participate in the scheme must register with Centrelink.

The amount of the' bonus depends on how long the person has been a member of the scheme, up to a maximum of five years, their rate of Age Pension when claimed and their marital status.

You must be registered with the scheme for at least 12 months to be eligible.

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Councillor queries rate charges

Councillor Lynne Bockholt asked council why community centres have to pay rates.

She cited the South Woy Woy Association Progress Hall's annual bill of around \$1500.

Cr Bockholt said she read in a newspaper that it was an offence to drive an unloaded vehicle weighing more than 4.5 tonnes or a loaded vehicle weighing more than eight tonnes on a level crossing.

This prompted her to ask if that meant there would be no heavy vehicles on Woy Woy Rd and the ramifications for the use of the Woy Woy South underpass.

Mr Dutton said for vehicles exceeding the weight limits, a permit was required to cross level crossings.

He said the permit had to be applied for at least 72 hours in advance to allow adequate time for processing.

services. neighbourhood centres, the RSPCA and WIRES," Ms Andrews said.



Other highlights are:


October 19 - Competition begins with gold, medals in judo, shooting and track cycling;

The final event for the year was again held at the Ourimbah State Forest and all riders needed to take particular care as all points counted double.


As a result, there was a great possibility for many places to change dramatically on the last


There have been some good catches out on the reefs with some nice schnapper, flathead and jewfish being caught.

There was a large jewfish taken at Box Head at night recently.


Leatherjacket are also still around at Bouttons Reef with some small schnapper also being taken there around the 1 to 1 Y2 kg mark.
