## Both sitting Members retain their seats

Both local Members of Parliament have retained their seats in Saturday's State election.

Liberal Member for Terrigal Mr Adam Crouch won an outright majority with almost 53 per cent of the primary vote, with more than half of the votes counted.

Labor Member for Gosford Ms Liesl Tesch was showing 58 per cent of the two-candidate preferred vote, with one third of the preferences distributed.

Ms Tesch had achieved 44.54 per cent of the primary vote by 9am Sunday morning, after the initial count which had tallied 46 per cent of the vote.

Liberal candidate Ms Sue Dengate received 35.23 per cent of the vote, or 42 per cent after distribution of preferences.

Greens candidate Ms Hillary Morris was next with 9.5 per cent.

Shooters, Fishers and Farmers candidate Mr Larry Freeman polled 4.87 per cent.

Next came Animal Justice Party's Mr Patrick Murphy with 3.58 percent of the vote.

The Sustainable Australia Party's Ms Judy Singer received 2.58 per cent of the primary vote.

In Terrigal, Mr Crouch retained his seat with 52.93 per cent of the primary vote, and was showing 62.69 per cent of the two-candidate preferred vote, based on 48 per cent of the preferences distributed, as of 8.30am Sunday.

Labor's Cr Jeff Sundstrom polled 25.54 per cent of the primary vote, and 37.31 per cent on a two-candidate preferred basis.

The Greens' candidate for Terrigal Mr Bob Doyle received 10.38 per cent of the vote.

The other four candidates each received less than four per cent of the vote, with independent candidate Mr Gary Chestnut leading these with 3.56 per cent.

#### Half yearly rainfall total recorded in just five days


Five days of consistent, heavy rainfall has provided half of the Peninsula's yearly rainfall total to date, according to data compiled by Umina's Mr Jim Morrison.

From March 14-18 162mm of rain was recorded across the Peninsula including the highest single rainfall event of the year so far which saw 53mm fall on March

Two other rainfall events also saw more than 30mm fall in a single day with 42mm recorded on the 17th and 30.6mm on the 18th.

This result makes March the wettest month of the year so far with nine days still left until April at the time of writing.

It also sees March take out the top number of days with rainfall events for the year so far with 13 events recorded across 22 days at



the time of writing.

Several smaller showers were also recorded from March 19-22, bringing the monthly total figure for March up to 177.7mm as of March

This result sees the Peninsula's yearly total rainfall bumped up to 346.2mm.

## Dredged sand to replenish Ocean and Umina Beaches

Dredging of the Ettalong Channel is planned to start again in April, with dredged sand to be deposited on Ocean and Umina beaches, according to Peninsula Chamber of Commerce

Chamber president Mr Matthew Wales said that Crown Lands had recently confirmed with the Chamber that arrangements had been made.

"This decision came about following meetings between Crown Lands, the dredging contractor and Central Coast Council in late February which established the logistics around the dredging and sand placement along the beachfront.

"Crowns Lands has advised that an expanded compound area is required to accommodate additional equipment, pipes and dredging/pump machinery.

"The dredging contractor is currently organising the additional equipment and will undertake a pre-dredging bed level survey of the channel in late March ahead of the main dredging works".

"The Chamber is particularly

pleased that both the NSW State Government and Central Coast Council have acted quickly on this next phase of the dredging works which form part of the long-term solution to the regular maintenance of the Ettalong Channel.

"I think everyone will welcome the proposed renourishment works along Ocean Beach which has been severely impacted by storm events and erosion over the last 12 months to the point where some parts of the beach were almost unusable".

Mr Wales said the chamber would now push council to restore the beach access points both outside the Ocean Beach Surf Club and east along The Esplanade opposite Norman St which have been closed for months due to unstable dune conditions.

"The Ocean Beach foreshore is an extremely important piece of our coastal infrastructure that contributes to our local tourist industry.

"Therefore, it was vitally important that both the NSW State Government and the Council take the renourishment and beach restoration works seriously.

"Finally we will be seeing some positive action which will be widely welcomed across the local community", he said.

Peninsula Waterways Committee agreed.

"It is about time that action was seen to be taken, rather than just talked about," committee chair Mr Mike Allsop said.

"In particular, it should be welcome news for those interested in the beachfront.

"I would hope that the location and method of sand distribution aligns with engineering recommendations developed for the Department of Lands.

"To date we have not heard any specifics regarding additional channel works, but these are welcome in principle.

"We look forward to seeing the plans for these works and getting more insight into the anticipated results for the performance of the channel," Mr Allsop said.

#### Ethan organises student strike for climate action

A Year 8 student at Brisbane Water Secondary College at Umina was the driving force behind the March 15 student strike in Gosford for climate action.

Ethan Hill said he saw the first school strike for climate action in 2015 and wanted to do something so he decided this time he would organise it.

About 350 students and supporting adults turned up for the strike at the Anglican Church in Mann St, Gosford, including students from Woy Woy South Public School and 30 other regional schools.

They came to protest against the Federal and State Government's lack of action on climate change.

"There were over 350 people in attendance from babies through to grandparents," Ethan said.

"All of them are fearful of what the future holds if we don't take urgent action."

A total of 75 stories written by students were delivered to the office of the Federal Member for Roberston Ms Lucy Wicks.

Ethan said the letters included the following quotes:

"This is the world our generation is growing up in and it's dying" (13 year old)

"There is no Planet B and I want to have a good future" (11 year old)

"Save the Earth - we notice" (6 year old).

"If we continue like this, we will have no future" (10 year old).

"The Government doesn't listen" (13 year old).

"Important grown-ups just don't care enough" (6 year old).

"I don't know if I'll be alive to see my grandchildren grow up" (13 year old).

The rally was addressed by three students, including Ethan.

An eight-year-old spoke about turtles and the impact on gender from increasing water temperatures.

Ethan spoke about waste management.

"Did you know we throw out one tonne of plastic every single minute. This is terrible!" he said.

"This means we will throw out 120 tonnes of plastic just while we're here today.

"But plastic isn't the most thrown-out item, can anyone guess what it might be?

"It's actually food.

"One third of our red bins are edible food waste.

"You're probably thinking: food is biodegradable, what's the big deal?

"Well, when biodegradable waste enters landfill, it releases a green house gas called methane

which is 23 times more harmful to the environment than carbon dioxide, contributing to global warming

"So how do we stop Australia's massive waste problems?

"Well it's all in three simple steps: reduce, reuse, recycle.

"Reducing is an easy way to help the environment.

"Reducing includes not buying excessive packaged products, fixing any broken items instead of putting it out for council for pick up and planning your meals to reduce food waste.

"But if we're not going to use single use plastics what are we going to use?

"Well, we reuse.

"Hands up if mum or dad brings a reusable shopping bag when they go to the shops?

"Hands up who brings their own coffee cup to their favourite cafe?

"Hands up who takes their own water bottle to school or work each day?

"Hands up who takes their own cup and straw to Maccas when you get a thick shake?

"Reusing is a great way to help the environment but, it doesn't always work, so we go to our last resort: Recycling.

"Here on the Central Coast,

we can recycle paper, cardboard, plastic bottles and containers, steel, aluminium and aerosol cans, and glass bottles and jars.

"But not everything fits in to those categories, such as plastic bags and wrappers.

"These items can be taken back to your local Coles where they will get made into useful items such as outdoor furniture for schools.

"I'd like everyone just to have a little think about some little things we can do to reduce our waste."

#### Ettalong to get recycling bins

Ettalong is expected to get recycling bins in its main street in the next round of council's bin renewal program, scheduled before the end of June.

Umina recently saw the introduction of recycling bins in West St, as part of the initial rollout

of 200 waste and recycling stations for 2018/19 financial year.

Council's quarterly report tabled at the February 25 meeting showed that 2200 public places litter and recycle bins dot the coast.

Each one is on a scheduled service with high impact areas and tourist hotspot bins emptied


multiple times per week.

#### Strata subdivision is approved

subdivision of an existing and commercial building at 261 Ocean View Rd, Ettalong, has been approved by Central Coast Council.

The applicant Mr Steven Wheat of Harrington Properties has permission to subdivide the property in to eight strata allotments.

It is on the corner of Pacific Ave and has a two-storey building zoned B2 local centre.

The retail premises fronts onto both Pacific Ave and Ocean View Rd.

It has rear lane access off Pacific Parade Lane along the northern boundary.

The existing retail-commercial building is occupied by: Plus Fitness Ettalong Beach on the upper level; residential tenancy on the upper level fronting Ocean View Rd; Disability Employment Services fronting Pacific Ave; Pacific Hair fronting Pacific Ave; Serenitas Beauty fronting Pacific Ave; Goddess by the Sea fronting Pacific Ave; and The Scarlett Table Cafe fronting Ocean View Rd.

The eight new strata lot sizes range in size from 32 square metres to 96 square metres with



#### Shepard St flooding expected to improve in 18 months

"A dramatic improvement to the flooding" in Shepard St, Umina, is expected over the next 18 months, according to Flood action group Woy Woy Peninsula Floods.

Group member Ms Sally Bell said Central Coast Council had advised the group that it was undertaking works on Mackenzie Ave and Onslow Ave.

"Council has engaged Barker Ryan and Stewart to undertake design for a new drainage pipeline on Mackenzie Ave and renewal works for the pipes between Carpenter and Glenn Sts has also commenced.

"Other works we've been told are scheduled to take place sometime during the 2019-20 Financial Year will be renewal works for the pipe system between Glenn St and Shepard St.

"Council believes that once this stage of the works is completed there will be dramatic improvement to the flooding on Shepard St," Ms Bell said.

The Woy Woy Peninsula Floods group operate through their Facebook page of the same name and Ms Bell urges all residents concerned about flooding in their neighbourhoods to get in touch with the group.

"We will continue to post updates to our page as we receive them from Council, but in the meantime we rely on all of you to continue to keep us updated about further flooding issues as they occur," Ms Bell said.

## Responsible development group forms with 80 people

The inaugural public meeting of Residents for Responsible Ettalong Development was held on March 19 with about 80 people attending.

The room divider panels had to be pushed further out into the auditorium at Ettalong Bowling Club to cater for the number of people who turned up.

They heard about the number of non-complying issues relating to a proposed development at 227-231 Ocean View Rd, Ettalong, the catalyst for the new action group to form.

The already-approved proposal for the Centrelink site just up the road also got an airing as did the Atlantis building fronting the Esplanade.

As one participant said: "It's the strip along Ocean View Rd from the Diggers to the markets."

The group's spokesman Mr Peter Gillis showed zoning maps and said the village was under attack from developers wanting to remove their summer breezes and sightlines to the beach.

But Mr Gillis said the group was not about attacking developers.

It was about working with council to keep the feel of their small tourist village.

The group would meet with and lobby both council and State

Government representatives to object to the height, the bulk, and the scale of proposed developments which were not suitable for the nature of the area and would detract from its natural beauty.

"It is not in keeping with how we would like Ettalong to progress," Mr Gillis said.

"Two to three storeys is what

we'd like to see. We are already the highest density suburb on the Central Coast."

Nearby resident Mr Peter Brell spoke about a wall of development cutting residents off from the ocean and destroying views to Blackwall Mountain

"Somehow we need to stop council passing non-complying developments.

"There is power in a group of people," he said, to applause

The meeting heard stories from two other community groups formed to object to other developments proposed for the Peninsula – the Save Woy Woy Waterfront group and Save Our Woy Woy.

Mr Harvey McDougall from Save Our Woy Woy spoke about his experiences living in Farnell Rd, Woy Woy, and finding out a 27 unit and five villa development was proposed for his street.

He outlined the strategies the new group would need to take.

"We're here tonight to work with you and you work with us and let's see what we can achieve," he said.

He explained his dealings with the three ward councillors: Liberal Cr Troy Marquart, Labor Cr Richard Mehrtens and independent Cr Chris Holstein.

"Troy doesn't appear at any meetings. The mayor (Cr Jane Smith) and the other two councillors come but you get no commitment from them," he said.

He told the new group members that they needed to be prepared.

His comments were echoed by Mr Ross Cochrane from the Save Woy Woy Waterfront group, formed to object to an over-sized proposal for the Sporties at Woy Woy registered club.

The proposal was refused by the Joint Regional Planning Panel late last year.

The council sent a report to the Panel rejecting the proposal.

Mr Cochrane noted the work of resident Ms June Mitchell who he said was about "181 years old" and had been out there handing out pamphlets and letterboxing residents.

"It is all about noise.

"You'll never hear from the Liberals because they've been told to pass them."

He was referring to the State Government's 2036 regional plan that dictated that council needed to make room for an extra 75000 residents on the Central Coast by 2036.

The meeting ended with organisers vowing to continue the push against the developments.

### Action group founders step aside

It took over two years of lobbying for the Central Coast Council and the NSW Government to join to fund the complete upgrade of Greenfield Rd, Empire Bay.

The upgrade will include two new paths, one dual purpose, kerbing, guttering, on-street parking and resurfacing of the widened road.

Now that the campaign of the Empire Bay and Districts Roads Action Group has been successful, its founders Leeanne and Greg Olsen have decided to step aside.

They are hoping that other community members will now take up the cudgels and lobby for the upgrade of Rickard Rd, the next major concern for residents.

"Leeanne and I would like to thank the president of the Empire Bay Progress Association, Carolen Barripp, who has supported the Group from day one.

We hope that Empire Bay residents, families and friends, will appreciate the safer pedestrian and bicycle access, as well as the pothole-free road surface, once work has been completed later this year," Mr Olsen concluded.

We're just pleased that something is finally being done to improve the amenity of Empire Bay", Mr Olsen added.

Mr Olsen said, having moved to

this waterside suburb in December 2015, they soon discovered that the area had been overlooked for many years for road and drainage upgrades.

They formed the Empire Bay and Districts Roads Action Group and facilitated two public meetings, with the assistance of the Empire Bay Progress Association,

The two big issues identified were the terrible state of the only vehicular access into Empire Bay, Greenfield Rd, and the constant flooding of the Sher Close-Shelly Beach Rd area.

Last year, the blocked drains in were finally opened and Mr Olsen said reports from residents indicate a dramatic improvement.

Constant monitoring would be needed to make sure the problem did not re-emerge in the future, he said.

"It's been a hard slog to get the ball rolling on Greenfield Rd", Mr Olsen said.


"We've been in regular communication for a very long time with Council and our NSW Government representative, Mr Adam Crouch, both of whom have been very supportive.

"However, without our lobbying, nothing would have been done, that's for sure."

Grants will be made up to \$5000 and will be in the fields of music,


performing arts, literature and the visual arts.


The Foundation will also offer grants of up to \$2500 for original song-writing.

# Channel needs State planning, says committee chair

The Peninsula Waterways Committee has contacted local candidates for the major parties about maintenance of the Ettalong Channel, committee chair Mr Mike Allsop has said.

"There is a growing sense that the State Government needs to realise the importance of this waterway to tourism, public transport, commercial users and recreational users, and include this waterway in State planning where currently no mention is made," he said

"Our sense is that there is still concern in the waterways user fraternity, especially among yachties, although the ferry operator is satisfied at present."

Mr Allsop said: "The dredge is idle, waiting on a program of work to distribute the sand already re-moved to a spot further down towards Umina Beach.

"That piece of the puzzle needs sorting as soon as possible so that future resilience can be built into the waterway interface to Broken Bay.

Writing in the latest edition of the Wagstaffe to Killcare Community

Association newsletter, Mr Allsop said: "As you may know the Peninsula Waterways Committee was set up in October to keep focus on channel dredging, future works, responsibilities and funding.

"I chair this group with members from both sides of the waterway.

"The group has been very focussed on meeting with local Members and council representatives to get their perspective on the issues surrounding waterways' maintenance and maintaining both a program of work and ongoing funding

"We have also met with various technical experts as well as marina operators and deep keel users.

"What are they saying about the

"It's a bit mixed, but much better than it was nine months ago," Mr Allsop said.

"They all say that a longterm program of work is needed, informed by proper analysis.

"Fair enough, but we still have the issue of 'I'll pay if you pay' between council and the State which needs to be settled," he said.

## Specific dredging plans still needed, says committee

The Peninsula Waterways Committee is calling on the major political parties to forward "specific plans of action" for the Ettalong Channel, after having received responses from local political candidates.

Committee chair Mr Mike Allsop said no obvious plan of action had actually been raised by either side.

"We have seen a promise from the Labor Party to assume full responsibility for the upkeep of the channel, which would be a positive development, but this needs to be accompanied by specific plans of action put in place very soon.

"We know the position of the Liberal Party on shared responsibility with Council, and recognise the sums set aside for these works.

"Again, there is no obvious plan of action to actually get work done.

"We call on both parties to commit to immediate action on the channel and surrounding waters if elected to govern the state," Mr Allsop said.

The Committee received responses from Member for Gosford Ms Liesl Tesch (Labor), Member for Terrigal Mr Adam Crouch (Liberal) and Liberal candidate for Gosford Ms Sue Dengate.



Ms Dengate told the committee: "The NSW Government has granted \$1.225 million (with council matching dollar-for-dollar) for the next stage of channel dredging and this was on top of the \$660,000 that the government gave for emergency dredging.

"It is my understanding that Central Coast Council has the funds and that planning is underway for the next phase.

"At my next meeting with Councilm I want to find out exactly where we are up to with this plan, what is proposed for the next step and when that is likely to occur.

"Also please be aware that this funding grant of \$1.225 million is available from the State Government every year.

"If I am fortunate enough to be elected to represent the seat of Gosford I will fight in Parliament for a permanent solution so that the channel always remains open."

Ms Tesch said: "A NSW Labor Government will deliver a \$10 million Central Coast Cleaner Waterways Fund.

"This will provide \$5 million for a long-term dredging plan to maintain the safe navigability of the Ettalong Channel.

"The other \$5 million will go towards pollution management across Central Coast beaches and maintenance of Tuggerah Lakes.

"This money won't require matched funding from Council.

"This is just about getting the job done.

"Labor will sit down with Central Coast Council to work towards a long-term plan for the Ettalong Channel and put an end to the buck-passing and blame game that had characterised the issue over the last eight years.

"We guarantee that the Ettalong Channel will be kept open for boating and public transport.

"The community just want council and the State Government to get it sorted, and with this funding from NSW Labor, it will be."

Mr Crouch said: "Ettalong

Channel is defined as a local waterway and is therefore the responsibility of the local council.

"For more than a decade, governments of both persuasions, Liberal and Labor, have co-funded dredging in Ettalong Channel.

The NSW Liberal Government has introduced the Rescuing Our Waterways funding program, which co-funds all maintenance dredging work.


"Last year I announced \$1.225 million for Central Coast Council to implement a long-term plan for Ettalong Channel.

"We also provided emergency dredging funding around \$1 million on three occasions in 2018.

"I am 100 per cent committed to ensuring this local waterway remains safe and accessible to all, but it is also important that Council continue to work collaboratively with the NSW Government.

"We never want to see a repeat of the past 18 months."

#### Vehicleactivated speed signs to be trialled in Hillview St

Vehicle-activated speed signs will be trialled at Hillview St and Dunban Rd in Woy Woy as part of Central Coast Council's strategy to reduce speeding.

The solar powered digital signs are designed to calm traffic by alerting approaching motorists to their current speed in real time, according to council director Mr Boris Bolgoff.

He said: "Early analysis of speed data captured by this technology shows the signs are reducing speeding in the higher brackets, which is exactly the impact we wanted.

"We use a range of measures to calm traffic across the Central Coast and vehicle-activated signs could become an important part of the mix.

"The signs will alert passing motorists to their speed through a flashing red light if they are exceeding the speed limit."

The signs have the 50km per hour speed limit permanently displayed above the LED display and have been placed on roads that are predominately straight and in a semi-rural location.



## Another fire at community garden

Parking fines will be reduced from \$112 to \$80, yielding \$425,360 less revenue for Central Coast Council, as a result of a decision by on March 11.

In debate, Cr Troy Marquart said he didn't like to hear the talk around fines and revenue, or losing revenue.

"A fine is implemented to try and curb someone's behaviour and I don't think we should be looking at it in the scope of a budget or that we get so much revenue every year," he said.

Cr Chris Holstein took the opportunity to ask about the progress of the short-term parking strategy which was brought to Council many months ago.

Executive manager Mr Shane Sullivan said it was progressing but did not disclose further details.

Cr Jillian Hogan said there had been parking fine blitzes at places including Woy Woy, where residents had parked on the verges because the roads were so narrow that to park on the edge of the road would be a safety hazard.

Cr Greg Best said staff should be encouraged to use their common sense instead of "ridiculous infringements for parking as they've done for 20 years".

He was the only councillor to vote against the reduction.

#### **Woy Woy residents** targeted for heritage walk

Woy Woy residents who attend the Kincumber Rotary Club's Shipbuilders Heritage Walk on May 5 may get a halfprice ferry trip to Davistown.

Those who buy a "four villages passport" from the club will be able to travel the return leg of the ferry trip free of charge.

Co-ordinator Mr Peter Rea said the history of the area shows that for tens of thousands of years the waterways extending north from Broken Bay to Brisbane Water, supported human existence.

The area has thousands of aboriginal middens, testimony to a life centred around the waterways and to the seafood diet the people enjoyed.

Between the 1820s to the end of World War II, the forests supplied a huge shipbuilding industry, he said.

"On Brisbane Water over 500 registered vessels were constructed, plus an un-calculable number of smaller craft.

"The Shipbuilders Memorial Project started a decade ago as a dedication to the extraordinary shipbuilding heritage of the Brisbane Water," he said.

"At this stage the Shipbuilders Memorial consist of a number of

plinths by sculptor John Woulfe of stainless steel and the finest Gosford sandstone.

"Each plinth is dedicated to one the shipbuilders of the area.

"The astronomer superintendent of the Government Observatory at Parramatta, James Dunlop (1793 - 1848) is also remembered by a plinth adjacent to the historic house, Bora-Bora.

"The current Memorial extends along a cycle/walkway on the waterfront reserves adjacent to the suburbs of Kincumber, Yattalunga, Saratoga to Davistown.

"The Memorial also extends for a short distance each way on the Davistown waterfront."

Mr Rea said there were plans to extend the memorials to the Palermo Shipvard site at Dalevs Point, being in memory of HMAS Patrica Cam built there and sunk in action during World War II.

Information plaques smart-phone apps would provide information about shipbuilding and general history, indigenous culture as well as the water and waterfront environment along the way

#### Planning controls were result of exhaustive consultation

I write in response to your article "New group calls for development" compliant (Peninsula News edition 465) and the concerns Mr Gillis raises over what the group calls unsuitable and noncomplying development in the Ettalong area.

It is timely to remind Mr Gillis that the current planning guidelines and development controls that give direction to residential and commercial development on the Peninsula came about from an exhaustive consultation process that started with the highly successful Peninsula Urban Direction Strategy in 2005.

PUDS, as it was commonly known, was a detailed assessment of the needs of the Peninsula which included extensive community consultation to which the Peninsula Chamber of Commerce and the wider community all contributed.

This strategy was adopted by the former Gosford City Council and informed the current Gosford Local Environmental Plan 2014 and the Gosford Development Control Plan 2013.

These planning controls, which appear to bear the criticism of this new group, set the out the uses, heights and floor space ratios for each of our Peninsula town centres including Ettalong.

I have no idea whether the members of this new group were around at that time, but I certainly was in my capacity as president of the Business Chamber.

It was a credit to the former Gosford Council at the time that the community consultation was so successful and set a fundamental platform for current urban development.

This group seems to infer that Council is somehow responsible

"The attendance was a record and it was a great event made even better by catching up with so many colleagues having spent so many years in our formative years studying together."



A Woy Woy aged care wing was added, creating another organisation celebrated its 30th anniversary on March

BlueWave Living marketing manager Ms Kylie Scott said the Woy Woy facility first opened in 1989 as a 40-bed nursing home with the majority of beds being in four bed wards.

"In surgery, we don't remember days, we remember moments and there is nothing more heartwarming to see the smile on a patient's face when they have taken breast cancer head on and won," said Dr Ling.

"What's even more inspiring about these women, who have been prodded with more needles and endured more surgeries and scans than most people have had in a lifetime, is their courage and humour at a time when breast cancer has intruded into their lives."

Peninsula residents who shared their stories in the Compendium included Member for Gosford Ms Liesl Tesch and Empire Bay mother and daughter Ms Janis and Ms Sarah Livingstone.

In the Compendium Ms Tesch shared her experience of dealing with breast cancer from the sidelines after her mother was diagnosed with the disease.

"Dealing with a cancer diagnosis is a life-shattering experience for both patients and their loved ones and every human response is different," Ms Tesch said.

"Some people cry, others remain silent and some people may hear the words but refuse to believe them.

"When my mum was diagnosed with breast cancer my list of questions was endless.

"What stage was it?

"What were her treatment options?

"What were the right words to say to her?

"But through that difficult time, I know the one thing that got mum through her breast cancer diagnosis was having my sister Trudii, a Gosford-hospital trained nurse, guide us every step of the way.

Ms Tesch's mother Pam, lost her battle with breast cancer during Liesl's first day of racing at the Paralympic Games in London 2012.

Liesl went on to win the gold medal as part of the Australian team.

Ms Tesch said breast cancer rates were 18 per cent higher on the Peninsula than the NSW average.

"Preventative health promotion, healthy lifestyle choices and education are important to our regional community.

"And that's what this compendium is all about, improving awareness, supporting the fighters

and celebrating the survivors," Ms Tesch said.

Empire Bay's Ms Janis Livingstone knows first hand the devastation a cancer diagnosis can have on a family.

Breast cancer took her sister Sue at 58.

Her other sister Jenette had a preventative mastectomy after testing positive for the BRCA2 gene and Ms Livingstone herself was diagnosed in 2001.

Her brother Alan developed prostate cancer at 56, related to the BRCA2 gene, and her nephew Morgan was diagnosed with Stage III male breast cancer in 2018.

Her daughter Amy, 35, has tested positive for the BRCA2 gene and faces the heart wrenching decision to have her breasts and ovaries removed and her eldest daughter Sarah, was diagnosed with Stage II breast cancer in 2015.

"My first reaction after being diagnosed with breast cancer was one of pure, raw, abject fear.

"I kept asking myself Am I going to die?" Ms Livingstone said.

"Thankfully I have a good friend who is an orthopaedic surgeon and he sat me down and took all the fear away by rationally discussing all the facts.

"I think expressing my fears verbally helped me to allay them.

"When I was diagnosed, I decided to have bilateral mastectomy and later my ovaries

"It was a challenging decision for me, but given my strong family history, the right one for me," she said.





#### Troubadour president to speak

Troubadour president Mr Michael Fine will be a keynote speaker at the Central Coast Regional Creativity and Wellbeing Seminar being held in Erina on March 27.

Mr Fine of Woy Woy is a sociology professor at Macquarie University and a published author and researcher.

Mr Fine will give a talk entitled Liberating Creative Ageing breaking through the barriers of old age and artistic creation.

"According to the Australian

Bureau of Statistics, 21 per cent, or more than one in five of the 327,723 people who live on the Central Coast, was aged 65 and over in 2016," Mr Fine said.

"This demographic profile is very much like the one predicted for the rest of the country in about 20 years' time and helps make the Central Coast an exciting area in which to live and work.

"With extended years of life, we have the opportunity to become a showcase for new and innovative approaches to growing old, such as creative ageing," he said.

"Creative ageing impacts a person's meaning and quality of life, it builds social capital and reduces isolation.

"Liberating creativity has the potential to make people feel more alive and less reliant on medical

"Those who practice creativity may not just enjoy a richer and more fulfilling life, there may be other health and social benefits, as research is beginning to explore," Mr Fine said.

As part of his presentation Mr Fine will discuss the need for more research on the topic, including a proposal for a new National Centre of Excellence on Creative Ageing in which Macquarie and Newcastle Universities would partner with The University of Melbourne and The University of Queensland.

Mr Fine said that, with the increase of life expectancy, seniors today have new and liberating opportunities for growth and development.

"Often retirement is the first chance many people have had to learn new skills such as to play the ukulele, create films, dance, or to become a poet, sing in a choir, perform with others, paint or draw.

"These are all things that many people explore in their 60s, 70s and 80s that they didn't pursue in their youth," Mr Fine said.

"The Coast has a rich tradition of strings players but the conservatorium has noticed a drop in the number of young players taking up a string instrument.


"Coincidently conservatorium has also witnessed numbers double in programs for woodwind, brass and percussion instruments.




