Development action groups to consider joining forces

Three resident actions groups concerned about development standards are likely to come together to oppose non-compliant development.

A meeting is planned of the Residents for Responsible Ettalong Development, Save Woy Woy Waterfront and Save Our Woy Woy groups.

This will "allow members to come together and create a strong group to oppose all non-compliant developments on the Peninsula", according to Save Our Woy Woy founder Mr Harvey McDougall.

Mr McDougall said the community had the right to expect that developments complied with planning controls.

"Unfortunately, there are too many which are going through that are non compliant," he said.

Mr McDougall said the council had put itself in a difficult position.

With so many non-compliant developments, it made it difficult to refuse others.

"The precedent has been set. "What is Council going to do?" Mr McDougall said "allowable variances" should not exist in the planning controls.

Designers should be able to create properties that both fit within the planning controls and meet a high standard of design, he said.

"It used to happen before when we only had two levels of height as

"Surely in this age of technology, designs of the highest standard can be achieved without going outside the parameters.'

Mr McDougall said the community needed to be fully consulted about planning provisions being applied to the Peninsula.

He said the Council was currently not helping and the State Government was ignoring the problem.

"It is time to bring all people to the table and work together for the benefit of the Peninsula."

He said State parliamentarians, councillors and planning staff should be involved and listen to the community, and not just "the everpresent developers".

Palm Beach ferry runs aground

The Palm Beach Ferry ran aground in the Ettalong Channel on March 9.

The ferry ran aground at Half Tide Rocks just before 5:30pm with three Marine Rescue NSW vessels and a team from NSW Police's Marine Area Command attending.

"Thirty-one ferry passengers were safely transferred off the vessel before NSW Police vessel WP 42 and Marine Rescue vessel

Cottage Point 31 relocated the vessel," said Marine Rescue volunteer Mr Roger Palmer.

"Cottage Point 31 was able to secure a tow line to the ferry's bow and, with all passengers removed and a solid three knot current, towed the large vessel to deeper water," Mr Palmer said.

The crews were able to get the ferry afloat again and on its way just after 6:30pm.

He announced: "The ferry that earlier ran aground at Half Tide Rocks at the entrance to Brisbane Water is now safely on an emergency mooring and all Marine Rescue NSW vessels have been stood down."

Mehrtens questions generator pollution at Woy Woy tip

Local ward councillor Richard **Mehrtens** has received a response from Central Coast Council to questions he asked about air pollution at Woy Woy tip.

Cr Mehrtens said a constituent had raised concerns about air quality after reading a report that described the air pollution as medium

Cr Mehrtens asked if council staff were concerned about the pollution generated by the "gas abatement" facility operated by AGL at the Nagari Rd tip.

Central Coast Council staff provided the report to the March 25 council meeting in answer to Cr Mehrtens' questions.

Cr Mehrten said the AGL plant was the only registered industrial facility listed in the 2256 postcode area on the Australian Government's National Pollutant Inventory.

He said it was listed as emitting a total of 102,180kg pollutants.

inventory included 61,000kg of carbon monoxide, 28,000kg of nitrogen oxides and 12,000kg of sulphur dioxide. and listed 11 other pollutants including arsenic, cadmium, chromium, lead, mercury, polychlorinated dioxins and polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons, as well as particulate matter.

Council staff reported that the AGL facility at Woy Woy tip was the one megawatt generator

a renewable energy generation plant, operated under a long-term contract.

Gas generated from within the landfill at the Woy Woy tip was captured and converted to energy.

The report stated that the conversion of the methane enriched gas into electricity at this site was not considered to impact on local air quality.

It said the landfill gas predominately comprised methane and was converted to electricity through the use of a generator.

The resulting electricity was then sold into the grid.

From the year to August 2018,

produced 7437.12 megawatts of electricity which was equivalent to meeting electricity needs for about 1191 average Central Coast homes.

report estimated the methane destroyed by the facility was equivalent to 38,197 tonnes of carbon dioxide.

This would be equivalent to removing 11,234 cars from the road for one year, the report said.

The report stated that the Australian Clean Energy Regulator recognised the greenhouse gas abatement and renewable energy activities undertaken at the tip and the site qualified for Australian Carbon Credit Units and Largescale Generation Certificates.

After the staff response, Cr Mehrtens said the council response indicated that it didn't consider the facility impacted on local air quality and, until he was provided with evidence to the contrary, he had no reason to doubt council's assessment of the safety.

"At this time, I am satisfied with the response provided and have no intention to pursue this further,"

Wet conditions continue across Peninsula


Consistent throughout March and the first five days of April have provided a much needed boost to the Peninsula's yearly total rainfall figure.

According to data compiled by Umina's Mr Jim Morrison, 213.2mm of rain fell in the month of March with 17 individual rainfall events recorded over 31 days.

This confirms March's ranking as the wettest month of the year so far, as well as, its record for having the greatest number of individual rainfall events.

The figure is also a step up from 2018 rainfall results with March 2018 only recording 79.6mm of rainfall.

April 2019 has also been off to a wetter than average start compared to last year with 17.6mm of rain recorded between April 1-5.



In the first 20 days of April 2018 only 10.9mm of rain was recorded. All up the Peninsula's total yearly rainfall figure sits at 399.2mm, meaning March alone

makes up 53 per cent of the total yearly rainfall to date.

Nursing home approved for sensitive bushland

A 160-bed aged care nursing home will go ahead in sensitive bushland at 45 Hiillview St, Woy Woy, after gaining approval from the Regional Planning Panel on March 28.

The proposal was not compliant with planning provisions.

It had a topmost ceiling height of 10.95metres, exceeding the eight metre maximum building height development standard.

It was three storeys, exceeding the two-storey height limit for the zone and a single-storey development standard limit on the rear boundary for seniors living developments.

The \$28m development owned by Thompson Health Care will site a three-storey nursing home on a cleared space within the property.

A bushland conservation area of 67 per cent of the site will be dedicated to the remnant bushland of Umina Coastal Sandplain Woodland.

The panel's statement of reasons for its decision included being generally in agreement with the environmental assessment outlined in council reports.

The panel was supportive of the nursing home, saying it suited the site and that while a seniors housing development for the site was already approved, this application needed to be assessed on its own merits.

It said the proposal was well below the floor space ratio control and had a smaller footprint with an additional storey on site with high bushland conservation values.

It said the site was unique and was large, well vegetated, removed from residential development and surrounded by roads or reserves which significantly reduced the visual and amenity impacts related to building height and bulk on neighbouring land.

"The large site size and the location of the building envelope relative to the retained bushland provided landscaped setbacks to public land and the streetscape, to help mitigate the visual impacts of the building upon the streetscape," the statement said.

It said there was no significant amenity impacts on surrounding

land.

The site is adjacent to the Everglades Golf Club, located on the eastern side of Hillview St; with Council recreation and drainage reserves adjacent to the southern and western boundaries, the St John The Baptist School located to the west of the drainage reserve, and four detached houses adjacent to the northern site boundary.

Cr Kyle MacGregor disagreed with the majority decision, which the report noted was consistent with his position when the DA was deferred at a January panel

The report said Cr MacGregor had the view the application should have been refused for a number of

These included the impact on the Umina Coastal Sandolain Woodland area, as this was one of only three remaining sites of such land on the Endangered Ecological Communities list

He also questioned the potential impact on the water tables and flooding issues on the Woy Woy peninsula.

He noted former refusals of the former Gosford City Council of the same site in the past.

He said the design and the aesthetics of the development contrasted with the character and nature of nearby developments within the Woy Woy peninsula.

The applicant successfully argued its non-compliance with height restrictions were consistent with aims of the Gosford Local Environmental Plan to provide for flexibility and with the State Environmental Planning Policy to increase the supply and diversity of housing required to meet the

needs of seniors or people with a disability and to achieve efficient use of existing infrastructure and services.

The matter was determined on March 28 with both Central Coast councillors, Chris Burke and Kyle MacGregor, sending their apologies for not attending.

Panel Members Jason Perica, Kara Krason and Michael Leavey were at the meeting.

The approval is subject to a list of conditions including amendments that require a parking management plan to be prepared and submitted to council for approval.

It must ensure adequate allocation of off-street parking is maintained onsite for staff.

And a bushland plan of management must be implemented and progress reports must be submitted to council at intervals, starting at six months after initial works have started, and ending at 10 years.


Restoration areas are to be maintained in perpetuity.

Reports are to be prepared by an ecologist or bush regenerator and submitted to council detailing the progress of the works twice per year with a final report certifying completion of the Bushland Management Zone to be submitted within three years after initial works have started.



Technical failure blamed for ferry grounding



A technical failure has been blamed for the disruption of the Palm Beach Ferry service on March 9 which saw the Ettalong-bound ferry grounded.

In a statement issued by the NRMA which owns and operates Fantasea Cruising, it was confirmed that a major technical failure occurred at around 5pm, forcing the ferry master to ground the vessel just off of Half Tide

"Upon grounding, NSW Police Marine Area Command and Central Coast Marine Rescue were called for assistance with responding Marine Area Command officers confirming the vehicle was unable to continue its voyage," said NRMA media advisor Ms Bridget Ahern.

The police escorted the ferry's

31 passengers to their destination while Marine Rescue volunteers helped re-float the ferry and tow it back to Fantasea Cruising's base of operations.

Ms Ahern said a full report had been provided to Roads and Maritime Services and the ferry had since had several pieces of equipment replaced and been deemed seaworthy.

She said that, despite the disruption, services resumed on March 9, with slight delays.

"This occurred right before the second last service of the day was due to depart so we arranged for another ferry to take over the run.

"Our priority was ensuring that people relying on our service got home safely," Ms Ahern said.

Recreation precinct to have \$8.25M transformation

The Peninsula Recreation Precinct is set to undergo multi-million-dollar transformation after Federal Member for Robertson Ms Lucy Wicks secured \$8.25 million to upgrade sporting facilities.

"This recreational and sport upgrade will be like nothing the Peninsula has ever seen and I am thrilled the Coalition Government has backed and supported the project," Mrs Wicks said.

She made the announcement at Jasmine Greens Cafe in front of the many groups who will benefit from the work.

Among other things, the Umina Recreational Hub Project upgrade will see the redevelopment of the existing Umina skate park, a BMX track, a new football clubhouse for Umina United Football Club and a new integrated community facility for Southern Spirit Cricket Club, the Umina Beach Bunnies Rugby League Club, the Umina Tennis Club and the Umina Men's Shed.

Around \$3.5 million will be spent on redeveloping the skate park, BMX track and basketball courts. "This funding will allow the Peninsula Recreation Precinct to be brought up to the same standard as McEvoy Oval in Woy Woy," Mrs Wicks said.

"This project is one that has been very special to me and one that I have been advocating for in

Canberra and in my community ever since the concept was first outlined to me by the Umina Community Group.

"I could see immediately what the social and economic benefits

"This was really a communityled initiative with over 2000 people signing a petition and it was one of the first issues I raised with the Prime Minister Scott Morrison.

"This project which will benefit hundreds, if not thousands, of residents living at Ettalong Beach, Woy Woy and Umina.

"The new facilities will prove not only a social boost, but an economic boon for the area by attracting regional sporting competitions to the area.

"So many residents and parents have spoken to me about the important need for new and redeveloped recreational facilities, as well as the need for a safe haven where their children can play and participate in their favourite sport.

ACF branch to raise Hillview St objections with Ministers

Central Coast Branch of the Australian Conservation Foundation will raise objections about the way the decision to permit a nursing home in endangered bushland in Hillview St, Woy Woy, was made with State Government ministers.

Branch president Mark Ellis said the site had one of the most significant remaining stands of the endangered ecological community, Umina Coastal Sandplain Woodland.

He said the branch would be writing to new Planning Minister Mr Anthony Roberts and Energy and Environment Minister Mr Matt Kean, as well as to Member for Gosford Ms Liesl Tesch.

Mr Ellis said the approval was based on outdated information.

"The approval suggests protection of the endangered ecological community is based on a bushland management plan established 12 years ago for an entirely different development, under different legislation and scientific understanding and biodiversity management," he said.

"The original approved development application was an up-market retirement village with

37 units to what it is now a three storey nursing home with 160 units.

"This will create more shading, impact on the vegetation by changes to the surface water flow; create cumulative impacts of nutrient run off, increase pedestrian movements; fragment the habitat, along with mowing and slashing and weed invasion."

He said the development did not comply with the Gosford local environment plan.

It ignored and did not explain a recent council assessment of the development's unsuitability for the site

There was the loss of 132 trees with no replacement policy and there was no monitoring of the management of the endangered bushland after 10 years, he said.

Mr Ellis said the object of the Environmental Planning and Assessment act to protect the environment, including the conservation of threatened and other species of native animals and plants, ecological communities and their habitats, had been ignored and had not been adequately addressed.

He said a number of issues had to be taken into account in determining whether a proposed development was likely to significantly affect threatened species or ecological communities, or their habitats.

These included risk of extinction and fragmentation or isolation of a habitat.

Mr Ellis said "no real science" was carried out for this application, nor were the risks given detailed consideration.

He said that, if the decision was to be based on 12-year-old information, the decision of the Land and Environment Court at the time should be followed.

It found that the whole of the site could be considered to be Umina Coastal Sandplain Woodland and that the adverse environmental impact of such a substantial proposal on the natural environment outweighed the competing factors weighing in favour of consent, he said.

Mr Ellis said he believed the local community still felt the same way: "Our community feels the protection of the Umina woodlands still far outweighs the competing factors weighing in favour of the grant of this development consent."

More parking 'not a smart solution', says Chamber

The Peninsula Chamber of Commerce has described **Federal Government plans to** provide additional commuter parking in Woy Woy as "not a smart solution".

Smarter strategies would be expansion of the on-demand and other bus services, improving kiss and ride facilities, encouraging car-pooling, according to Chamber president Mr Matthew Wales.

He said the Federal Government should also be doing more to promote employment opportunities on the Central Coast "so that

people don't have to commute into Sydney in the first place".

"We have to examine the basic issue of why 8000 people a day commute from Woy Woy rail station to the Sydney metro area.

"This comes down to the lack of local jobs and job opportunities", said Mr Wales.

He said: "Strategies should include the revitalisation of the Woy Woy commercial centre, improving planning controls to encourage commercial redevelopment and boosting incentives for residential accommodation close to the Woy Woy rail station."

Mr Wales said: "While the

Chamber welcomes the Federal Government's \$35M commitment to additional commuter parking at Woy Woy and Gosford rail stations, it is keen to see smarter options put in place rather than simply adding more levels to the Woy Woy multi-deck car park or using up even more commercial land for at-grade car parking.

"You will never meet the latent demand for car parking at Woy Woy, so we have to look to other strategies to encourage commuters to leave their cars at home rather than simply adding yet more spaces".

"We are very lucky here on

the Peninsula in that we have an efficient grid system of roads, level suburban areas, relatively good public transport links and being only an hour and half from the Sydney CBD.

"But those advantages also mean that people want to live here and commute to the city while enjoying our unique lifestyle.

"And compounding the problem are those who are driving their cars to Woy Woy from as far afield as Kincumber, MacMasters Beach and Copacabana rather than coping with the congestion at Gosford rail station.

"We are a better option which

unfortunately is adding problem locally," he said.

"By using local bus services and On Demand Transport more efficiently, our road system does have the capacity to cope with the demand.

"By all means improve the parking infrastructure but address the fundamental reason why you have the problem in the first place", said Mr Wales.

Chamber calls for 'swift action' on local planning panels

The Peninsula Chamber of Commerce has urged the **NSW** State Government to honour its pre-election commitment to introduce local planning panels.

"Now that the State Election is out of the way and the Berejiklian Government has been returned, the Chamber is looking for swift action on the Government's commitment to introduce the Local Planning Panel system to the Central Coast," said Chamber president Mr Matthew Wales.

"The development industry is continuing to see lengthy delays in the processing of major development applications worth over five million dollars as Council still struggles to deal with the volume of DAs and the mandatory referral of these matters to Council meetings if more than 15 submissions have been received".

"This is continuing to cause major delays for many significant applications and the unnecessary referral of matters to Council which should otherwise be managed by Council's highly qualified professional staff," he said.

"The introduction of local planning panels, with independent members assessing applications, would take considerable pressure off the local Council and allow it to concentrate on running the affairs of the city rather than being sidetracked by complex development

"Local planning panels bring greater expertise, transparency and integrity to the development assessment process at a local level and have proved highly successful in the Sydney Metropolitan Region and Wollongong.

"The last thing the industry wants is a back log of DAs being tied up in Council meeting for months on end only to be refused despite recommendations from staff that the applications should be supported.

"This will also result in an increase in Land and Environment

Court Appeals as applicants seek redress through the Court system which only serves to add costs to the development which is ultimately passed onto the consumer.

"Having independent an assessment process that is at arm's length from the Council and will eliminate local politics interfering with the merit-based assessment of development applications.

"Council's current inflexibility with regards to variations to development standards is causing uncertainty in the industry and threatens to undermine investment confidence on the Central Coast.

"It is imperative that the NSW State Government gets on with the job of implementing the planning panel regime to the Central Coast so that the building and development industry has more certainty in the processing of major applications," Mr Wales said.

Environment network to screen seismic testing film

The Community Environment Network and the Save Our Coast group will hold a free screening of the documentary Sonic Sea at the Umina Surf Life Saving Club from 7pm on April 11.

The screening is being held in opposition to a planned approval by the Federal Government of seismic testing for oil and gas off of the Central Coast.

"Join us from 7pm at the surf club for the free screening of Sonic Sea, a documentary explaining the impacts of seismic testing and noise pollution on our oceans," said Community Environment Network chair Mr John Asquith.

"Find out more about PEP11 and the current Federal Government's planned approval of seismic testing for oil and gas pipelines across the Central Coast covering 1000 square kilometres of coastline.

"Please help us stop seismic testing and save our coast before it's too late."

Ettalong resident Mr Hale Adasal of the Save Our Coast group said the film played to a full house of 300 people at Avoca Beach Picture Theatre in February.

"Peninsula residents have requested a local event since then.

"We're very pleased that the Umina Surf Club has a large



enough venue to screen the film," he said.

"With 1000 square kilometres of 3D seismic blasting being planned for our coast, this film about the impact of underwater noise is most relevant.

"3D seismic testing involves multiple airguns firing simultaneous intense and explosive blasts into the ocean floor in the search for the best drilling targets for oil or gas.

"Small scale seismic testing for oil and gas has already occurred close to Norah Head in April last year."

Committee member Mr David Abrahams of Killcare said now 3D seismic testing over a vastly expanded test area of 1000 square kilometres was being planned.

"This is a very real issue for the Peninsula area that values its marine life and coastal life style very highly," he said.

Almost a tonne of waste taken from Empire Bay waters

Students from Brisbane Water Secondary College have removed almost a tonne of waste from waterways around Empire Bay.

The students took part in two cleaning expeditions around Empire Bay.

The first took place on March 8 and focussed on cleaning around Cockle Bay, a small inlet located near Empire Bay Public School.

Clean4Shore facilitator Mr Graeme Johnson said a large double bed mattress and a foam cushion were removed from the mangroves by students.

"The jetty foreshore had oyster trays visible in the water."

Mr Johnson said 12 large trays were removed.

"Oyster mesh was tangled in the adjoining mangroves."

He said this was removed together with small litter items on the tidal marks.

"Many other larger items began to appear in the metre deep water: a large advertising sign, lifting trolley, poly piping, office chair, steel piping buckets and foam items.

"Students faced a tough, muddy task, but it was a good outcome for the local environment.

"During the trip back to Lions Park, the group identified a small craft in the mangroves, which was towed back to the boat ramp."

Mr Johnson said a trailer with 540 kilos of rubbish was taken to Woy Woy tip.

On March 15, students again went with Clean4Shore to collect waste and debris around the Empire Bay wetlands.

Oyster product once again dominated the clean up

With a falling tide, the group first ventured into the Empire Bay wetlands and then cleaned from Merritts Wharf back towards Empire Bay.

"Plenty of small litter items were collected with eight big bags loaded into the barge with plastic pieces dominating the load.

"Boating parts, plastic oyster mesh, small and large plastic oyster trays pulled from the mangroves also made up a large portion of the debris collected," Mr Johnson said.

The group them travelled to the north western end of Riley's Island for a targeted clean up.

"Small litter items, plastic bottles and oyster product again dominated the collection.

"Our final task was on Pelican Island, cleaning the Woy Woy Channel."

Small litter, food wrappings and plastic pieces were collected behind the high tidal mark.

"All up 15 very large bags were loaded into the trailer, underneath the oyster product, with 400 kilos off loaded at Woy Woy tip," Mr Johnson said.

Ettalong commercial zone should have three-storey limit

Ettalong resident's group, Residents for Responsible Ettalong Development, would like to respond to Matthew Wales' (Peninsula letter News edition 466).

In 2005, Mr Wales' "highly successful Peninsula Urban Design Strategy (PUDS)" consultation process was labelled by one local residents group as "a oneday information session" which attracted "50 people out of 34,000" residents

The major comment on this was "I don't believe the community has had an opportunity to have some discussion on the document". (Peninsula News 17 Oct. 2005, Residents Speak About PUDS, Council Meetings, Gosford reported by Lyle Stone.)

Another resident's spokesman said "his organization was disappointed to read that the Council considered the consultation process a success".

They went on to say "of the 77 submissions received by council ... 61 referred to the consultation process as inadequate".

Mr Wales' response was reported as being: "It's urgent that we do move ahead" ... "urban development should focus on the quality of the design, not necessarily the height, bulk, or amount".

The subsequent LEP2014 produced a P1 zoning for a 17 metre, five-storey high "commercial corridor" in Ettalong Beach, which the majority of Ettalong Beach residents feel is too high.

This P1 height zone exceeds almost all Central Coast centres except Gosford City, Terrigal, and Woy Woy CBD.

The Ettalong waterfront L2 zone of 11.5 metres (three storeys) adjacent to P1, now houses the seven storey, 24-plus metre Atlantis building.

And the latest development application, DA55896,

a total height of approximately 22 metres (including building services structures) in the commercial corridor.

The PUDS 2005 document recommended "that developments maintain the best features of traditional streetscapes and existing housing patterns."

The traditional streetscapes of Ettalong Beach are colonial heritage based, not highrise, highdensity, unit blocks.

The Residents for Responsible Ettalong Development group believes that there should be a three-storey limit for our village's commercial zone, that local traffic would be hugely impacted by highrise development, with no possible road expansion, and that high-rises would destroy the area's amenity.

The Residents for Responsible Ettalong Development group does

not infer that Council is responsible for "inappropriate development", as alleged by Mr. Wales.

We infer that Council is being asked to approve developments by commercial enterprises which have a vested interest in hugely profitable buildings whose scope is massive "height, bulk, or amount".

In the overview to the PUDS 2005 draft, under the heading "Development", it was stated that "new planning policies are necessary to offer commercially competitive opportunities investment whilst ensuring new developments maintained the best features of traditional streetscapes and existing housing patterns, and also provide contemporary standards of accommodation".

In the summary to the draft it was stated "If the Peninsula is to retain the environmental qualities that make it a highly attractive residential setting, both the level of population growth and the location of future development must not compromise current levels of amenity, existing scenic qualities or environmental character".

The Residents for Responsible Ettalong Development group is completely in agreement with these sentiments.

was relieving and completely devastating all at once, she said.

"I now had an answer, but I wasn't supposed to survive." Ms Williams said.

But survive she did.

"After my treatment, I was still

"My immune system was shot.

"I had neuropathy. All my muscles had wasted away and I couldn't walk down my driveway because I'd lost so much muscle condition and could hardly breathe

"As a patient, you and your family just put everything into getting through the cancer treatment and surviving, so we relied on friends. family and support organisations for so much else," she said.

"The Leukaemia Foundation provided me with access to an exercise physiologist who helped get me back on my feet, and relearn pretty much everything."

Williams received support through the Leukaemia Foundation's Young Bloods program, which helps those aged under 25 diagnosed with blood cancer or affected by a blood

The program was financially supported by the Newcastle Permanent Charitable Foundation.

Charitable Foundation acting chair Ms Jennifer Leslie said the Foundation had launched a campaign, Help Rewrite the Future, to raise awareness of the projects the Foundation had supported financially.

"Each case study in this campaign shows how profound the impact can be on the life of people and families who've benefitted from just one of the Charitable Foundation's projects.'

Ms Williams agreed to be one case study.

"We're so grateful that Danica has given her time and been vulnerable in sharing her emotional and inspiring story of how her life has changed.

Williams said Ms participation in the campaign enabled her to help others realise there are people and organisations within the community who are dedicated to helping others overcome adversity, and realise a better future for them and their loved ones.

Ms Leslie said: "The Charitable Foundation supports projects which have a genuine capacity to make the future better for people facing disadvantage, isolation or marginalisation."

forms of communication between parents and school staff regarding attendance are still acceptable."


Ms Buckley said the Sentral Daily Attendance SMS system was introduced "to ensure parents and caregivers are aware of their child's absence".




Schools across the world have also adopted the Pi Day Challenge where students compete to recall as many digits of Pi as they can.


