Education Minister to hear of preschool siting concerns

Community concerns about the location of the Umina Beach Public School Public Preschool will be raised with the State Education Minister Ms Prue Car.

Member for Gosford Ms Liesl Tesch said she had written to the Minister last week requesting "an urgent meeting with the associated decision-makers".

Ms Tesch wrote to the Minister after an online petition was started on Friday, April 11, calling for the proposed siting of the preschool to be rejected.

"This plan includes uprooting our infant's playground and oval, significantly affecting their outdoor play area," the petition stated.

"Safety is a prime concern.

"With the introduction of a car park, the risk of accidents involving our little ones could escalate.

"We don't want our school to be a risk zone for our children.

"The significance of outdoor play for children cannot be overstated, with countless studies showing its importance in promoting healthy physical and emotional development.

"The school has requested community feedback on this matter.

"This petition is our resounding 'no'.

"There are other areas within the school grounds that can be used for the new preschool without impinging on the current infant oval and playground.

"We intend to ensure that our children's safety and play areas

are not compromised by this proposed construction."

In a letter to Peninsula News "as a supporter of early childhood education", P/C Association committee member Ms Sarah Lambkin said: "I express both my support for the addition of a new preschool in our community and my concern regarding the proposed location for its construction.

"While I welcome the investment in expanding educational infrastructure, the current proposed site will significantly impact an important green space and outdoor playground that is critical for students K-2 years.

"These outdoor areas play a vital role in children's development and wellbeing, offering a safe place for physical activity, social interaction, and a connection to nature—especially in an increasingly urbanised environment."

She said a satisfactory alternative site had been identified within the school grounds.

Ms Tesch said: "It is essential that any proposed public preschool does not negatively impact the education and development outcomes of the current and future students at Umina Beach Public School.

"I have written to Minister for Education and Early Learning, Prue Car sharing our community's concerns about the proposed location for the project and have also requested an urgent meeting with the associated decision makers.

"The proposed new NSW

Government funded public preschool at Umina Beach Public School will provide dozens of new critically needed, free preschool places for young children and their families in our local community.

"I have heard from too many families who are unable to access early education spaces on the southern end of the Central Coast and this public preschool is an important step to delivering critical additional early education spaces in our community."

Ms Tesch encouraged anyone with concerns to email my office at gosford@parliament.nsw.gov.au.

"These emails will be shared directly with the Minister."

Federal Member for Robertson Dr Gordon Reid also wrote to the State Education Minister.

"It has been brought to my attention that our community does not believe that proper consultation has taken place concerning the final site for this new public preschool on the school grounds."

He said that concerns raised with him included the loss of greenspace for Year K-3 students, the placement of carparking, the impact on local fauna and flora, and the management of construction activity.

"Our community would appreciate that you review the current plans for the preschool's placement and consider further consultation with parents and stakeholders to identify the most suitable site."

Editorial policy and guidelines

At its heart, Peninsula News is a community effort.

It welcomes and relies on the contributions provided voluntarily and at no cost by local organisations, groups and residents.

The newspaper aims to be accessible to the community - both through making its columns accessible to community groups and by having copies available in accessible locations, including through its website.

The following policies and guidelines are designed to support the aims and standards of the newspaper.

Locality

The newspaper's editorial policy reflects a desire to reinforce the Peninsula's sense of community.

To qualify for publication, articles must have specific relevance to the Peninsula. For example, they must be about activities or events happening on the Peninsula or be organised by or involving Peninsula people.

The newspaper is not regional or national in nature, so regional or national issues will not be canvassed except as they affect the Peninsula.

Regional sports will only be covered from the perspective of Peninsula clubs. Regional plans will only be aired in the context of their ramifications for the Peninsula.

Peninsula News aims to be inclusive of as much of the Peninsula community as possible.

Readability

To ensure that the newspaper serves its purpose, it must be readable and represent the interests and activities of the community in its content.

Contributions to the paper are edited to consistent standards of readability. Guidelines are available for intending contributors.

All items will be dated. They must contain the name of the author to whom the contribution may be attributed, with their first name spelt out, along with their suburb or organisation. Anonymous contributions will not be accepted.

Forum letters

The Forum section provides the opportunity for readers to express their views on any aspect of Peninsula community life, with the aim of reflecting the community's diversity of opinion.

Nevertheless, letters may be edited for readability, including for length, spelling and grammar, and to avoid legal liability on the part of the newspaper, or they may be declined altogether.

Contributors are asked to keep their contributions to the matter at hand, and to

focus on the issues and not abuse or insult others.

Other than in the case of holding public figures to account, criticism of others (as opposed to criticism of particular opinions) is unlikely to be published in the interests of facilitating the expression of a diversity of views.

All letter writers need to supply name, address and contact details. Only name and suburb will be published.

Contributors who do not wish the wording of their letter to be changed at all should make a note to this effect when submitting their letter. In some cases, this may result in the letter not being published.

Corrections

We try to be as accurate as possible. However, mistakes can still slip through.

If you believe we have got something wrong, whether an error of fact or interpretation, we ask that you write to us by email with details for publication. These corrections may appear as Forum letters or as news items and should conform to our requirements for news and Forum contributions.

Source lines

Peninsula News includes "source lines" at the end of each article which aim to provide readers with information about where and how we came across the information, so that they might judge for themselves the veracity of what they are reading.

It should not be assumed that the article is a verbatim reproduction of the source. Similarly, it should not be assumed that any reporter listed is necessarily responsible for writing the whole news item. Source lines are not by-lines.

Often articles come from a number of sources. They are edited for readability and reader interest and given different headings, and consequently can be expressed quite differently from the source material.

Peninsula News usually receives its information in three ways: It is sent to us by someone wanting to promote their activities; it is sent to us in response to our inquiries; or it comes from a newsletter or other document to which we have access.

Sometimes we may interview a person or report what they said at a meeting.

The following descriptions are used:

Media Release - unsolicited contributions.

Media Statement - sent in response to our questions. **Website** or **Social Media** - information published online. **Newsletter** or **Report** - published in print or online.

Interview or **Meeting** - statements recorded by a reporter.

Forum contributions may be: **Email** if sent electronically and **Letter** if written on paper.

Dry start to April sees just 21mm of rain

A dry start to April has seen less than one seventh of the month's average rainfall recorded on the Peninsula in the first two thirds of the month.

A total of 20.9mm was recorded by Friday morning, just 13.4 per cent of the April average of 156mm, according to Mr Jim Morrison of Umina.

Rain fell on just five days, with falls of 7.0mm and 7.5mm recorded on April 7 and April 15.

Falls of less than five millimetres were recorded on April 16, 17 and 18.

The rainfall total for the year stands at 410.4mm which is about one third (32.2 per cent) below the average at the end of April of 605mm.

However, in seven of the last 21 years, the total for the year at



the end of April was less than this figure.

Peninsula will have 12 polling places

Robertson electors will find 12 polling places open on the Peninsula from 8am to 6pm on Federal election day, Saturday, May 3.

Two will be in Pearl Beach and Patonga, and two in Ettalong and Booker Bay.

Umina and Woy Woy will each have four polling places.

In Patonga, polling will take place at the Patonga Progress Association hall in Bay St.

In Pearl Beach, it will take place at the Pearl Beach Community Memorial Hall in Diamond Rd.

The Ettalong Beach Primary School in Uligandi St and the Booker Bay Pre School at 32 Telopea St will both be polling places.

The four polling stations in Umina will be at Umina Beach Primary School in Sydney Ave, at Umina Beach Library on the corner of Bullion and West Sts, at the Umina Uniting Church Community Centre in Neptune St, and at Umina campus of Brisbane Water Secondary College in Veron Rd.

The four polling stations around Woy Woy will be at the Woy Woy campus of Brisbane Water Secondary College in Edward St,

at the Woy Woy South Primary School at The School Mall, at the old South Woy Woy Progress Association hall on the corner of Woy Woy Rd and Pier St, and at The Bays Community Hall at 19 Woy Woy Bay Rd, Woy Woy Bay.

A "Special Hospital Team" from the Australian Electoral Office will also visit the Boronia Court Aged Care Facility in Kathleen St, Woy Woy.

Early voting is available from today, Tuesday, April 22, at the Peninsula Community Centre in McMasters Rd, Woy Woy, opening each day until Thursday from 8:30am to 5:30pm.

From next Saturday, April 26, both the Peninsula Community Centre and the Broken Bay Scout Hall in Carawa St, Umina, will be open for early voting.

On Saturday, April 26, they will open from 9am to 4pm.

From Monday to Thursday, April 28 to May 1, they will open from 8:30am to 5:30pm.

On Friday, May 2, they will open from 8:30am to 6pm.

Petition urges Council to address 'urban heat crisis'

The Peninsula's Grow Urban Shade Trees group has started a petition urging Central Coast Council to take action in 19 suburbs across the Coast "to address the urgent Urban Heat Crisis".

"Suburbs of the Central Coast have amongst the lowest canopy cover in NSW," said petition organiser Ms Miriam McInnes.

"In 2021, Central Coast Council published the Greener Places Strategy, where 19 local suburbs were recognised as Urban Heat Islands with less than 10 per cent canopy cover, significantly impacting on livability.

"Yet to date the Council has not allocated any additional funds toward essential tree planting across the Coast to tackle this urgent issue.

"We need Central Coast Council to allocate funds towards an Urban Forest budget, like so many nearby councils already do.

"Such a budget would cover tree planting, tree maintenance, community engagement and education.

"It would be actively used towards reaching a defined canopy cover target, which is more closely aligned to the 40 per cent coverage recommended by the State Government in its 2021

Greener Neighbourhoods Guide, "Walking through the hot streets of our suburbs becomes unbearable, unsafe and unattractive due to the urban heat impact.

"Heatwaves have a greater impact on population health in Australia than any other natural hazard, and are associated with a significant increase in mortality and morbidity rates.

"Children are spending more time inside than ever, leading to a physical and mental health catastrophe.

"We need shady areas for young people to walk, ride and play as it is more important than ever to encourage them to be outside.

"Leafier suburbs are proven to create healthier, happier, safer and wealthier residents.

"We are calling on Central Coast Council to meet their obligation to protect community health and provide liveable and resilient suburbs by allocating funds for an Urban Forest Budget.

"Council currently spends less than 10c per resident on urban greening."

The Central Coast urgently needs to catch up to other councils on their urban greening activities to ensure our suburbs are liveable for residents young and old now and in the future.

"Other local councils are implementing region-wide tree planting programs and creating healthier, more desirable suburbs and streetscapes for their residents.

"It is unrealistic and unsustainable for Central Coast Council to expect tree planting to be carried out by a tiny volunteer group.

"We need them to establish their own tree planting program like other councils have across Australia.

"Central Coast Council has a current annual tree planting budget of about \$35,000.

"For comparison, many councils have urban forest budgets of around \$1million annually to support this essential green infrastructure."

Ms McInnes said many NSW councils planted hundreds and thousands of trees each year, many being no larger than the Peninsula.

She said the group was expecting strong support for the petition, which she hoped would influence Central Coast Council's Operational Plan and beyond.

Townhouses to have less drive area than ‘gun barrel’

An application has been lodged with Central Coast Council to construct seven three-bedroom townhouses at 6-8 Berith St, Umina.

Three of the proposed townhouses would have vehicular access from Berith St and the remaining four from Alexander Lane at the rear of the property.

A total of 12 car parking spaces are included in the plans, comprising both garaged and outdoor spaces.

The site has a total area of 1579 square metres, consolidating two adjacent lots, and is zoned R1 General Residential.

Existing houses of each lot would be demolished.

The proposal claims to have no variations to setbacks and provides full size private open spaces at ground floor level, substantial extra private open space at first floor level.

It is claimed that all units will receive the required amount of solar access both to internal living areas and to private open spaces and that overshadowing



to neighbouring properties will be “negligible”.

The total area of on site concrete driveway is 173 square metres with the two rear on-site car parks located on a permeable surface.

This compares with 200 square metres of concrete driveway commonly found with three-unit “gun barrel” developments.

A Traffic Impact Assessment, prepared by Genesis Traffic, concludes that the traffic generation of the proposed development “will not present any adverse traffic implications” and that the proposed

parking provision complies with the planning provisions.

The application states that the proposed development has a maximum height of 7.20 metres, which complies with the 8.5-metre maximum building height for the site.

The proposed gross floor area is claimed to be 786 square metres which would result in a floor space ratio of 0.5:1 complying with the development standard for residential development.

The application also indicates that 30 per cent of the site area

is proposed as soft landscaping, which meets the minimum requirement of 25 per cent.

The application acknowledges that the site has been substantially cleared of most of its original vegetation with “several small exotic trees and domestic plantings remaining on the site”.

“These will be removed as part of the development process.”

A landscape plan, prepared by Contour Landscape Architecture, is designed to offset the vegetation removal, including the planting of native trees, shrubs, and ground

covers.

The landscape plan includes, on site, four bungalow palms, three tuckeroos and a frangipani all with a 75 litre pot size.

There are several smaller trees and shrubs.

According to the site plan, there is an existing small-medium sized street tree out-side 8 Berith St, which appears to be close to Unit 1’s proposed driveway.

However, this is not mentioned in the application or the landscaping plan.

No arborist report is included in the public exhibition documents.

The landscaping plan proposes the planting of three street trees, comprising coastal banksias with a 75 ltr pot size.

The application claims the development will provide a high-quality residential facility that will offer substantial benefits to the local community.

The closing date for written submissions is May 14.

Two-storey dual occupancy proposed for Rickard St

An application for a two-storey dual occupancy containing three bedrooms in each unit has been submitted for 17 Rickard St, Umina.

The application, submitted by Clarke Dowdle and Associates, states: “The proposed dual occupancy development is two storeys in height with a contemporary twin gable roof design that has been accepted with the built form in the locale.

“The area includes an eclectic mix of older post-World War II

single dwelling houses, 1970s red brick austere villas and large contemporary dwelling houses located along the esplanade.”

The application states that the “proposed use as a ‘dual occupancy’ is permitted” on the site with an area of 607 square metres, in the R1 Low Density Residential zone.

However, a variation to the planning standards relating to earthworks is acknowledged.

The proposal includes 1.05 metres of fill at the rear of the lot to ensure sufficient gradient for stormwater to discharge to the

street system.


This exceeds the one metre limit above existing ground level stipulated in the planning provisions.

The application argues that this level of fill is commensurate with other developments in the area, particularly on lots with swales, and is necessary for proper stormwater management.

The Flood Information Certificate included in the documentation indicates that the property is a “flood control lot” with a minimum habitable floor level set at 5.20 metres AHD.

An arborist report recommends the removal of five trees, three street trees and two trees within the site.

It states the trees would be significantly impacted by the proposed development, rendering



them unviable in the future.

The report notes that the street trees, a Western Australian peppermint, a weeping bottlebrush and a broadleaf paperbark, have previously been subject to pollarding due to over-head powerlines, resulting in poor

pruning and epicormic growth.

The development application is currently on exhibition, with the closing date for submissions being May 7.

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Coastal Twist Festival applies for Fair Day

The Coastal Twist Festival has applied to Central Coast Council to hold its Coastie Carnie Fair Day at the Peninsula Recreation Precinct on Sunday, October 5.

The market is planned to include up to 120 stalls offering a variety of goods and services, alongside live entertainment featuring music and a dog show.

The application states the aim of the Coastie Carnie Fair Day is to foster community spirit, celebrate diversity, and boost tourism in the Central Coast region.

Set up will start from 5am, with the market running from 10am to 5pm.

Dismantling is expected to be completed by 8pm.

To manage waste, the event organiser will arrange for additional bins through Central Coast Council.

Stallholders will have the responsibility for managing their own waste.

The event will rely on parking in surrounding streets and existing car parks to cater for its requirements.

The application, prepared by

Funhaus Factory, states that the day aligns with the objectives of the RE1 Public Recreation zone and will not compromise future development of the land or have detrimental environmental effects.

It was hoped the Coastie Carnie Fair Day would be a positive event for the community, offering a day of fun and celebration while ensuring responsible management of the event site.

The application is currently open for public comment, which closes on May 7.

Australasia will explore opportunities to modernise and enhance coastal drone operations and pursue long-range drone technology and emergency response capabilities using "Beyond Visual Line of Sight Remote Pilot Aircraft Systems".

I note the recent grants provided to shopfronts under the Council's Facade Improvement Program.

The primary aim of the program is to enhance visitor experiences of town centres and revitalise town centres.

It might be difficult to track data on how well this aim has been achieved across the Central Coast shopfronts that have received funding under this program.

Two grant recipients were approved for painting and signage in Woy Woy at the end of 2024.

I would like to suggest that a longer term plan for enhancing visitor experience and revitalising town centres lies in more extensive planning and maintenance of public garden areas in Woy Woy.

This would include looking after trees; creating garden spaces that looked cared for and

are maintained by appropriately trained staff on a permanent basis.

Garden staff should be visible in the community tending the gardens; trialling new plantings in front of the oval; improving the library gardens; improved seating options in gardens as they are established.

In short, this is bringing this aspect of planning, maintenance and revitalisation to the forefront.

Green infrastructure can provide shade; create habitat and provide a boost for biodiversity.

It provides an outdoor connection to nature enhancing physical and mental wellbeing and is available to all regardless of age, ability, or language spoken.

It would be so much more than a facade.

Planning appeals should go to tribunal

Frank Wiffen ("Saga illustrates planning system flaws", PN616) has pointed out some of the shortcomings of the development-approval system.

There are several others that deserve the Minister's attention, particularly as they relate to small-scale applications that drag on for months, for no reason at all except the cumbersome process that Council follows for every application.

I have previously suggested that the backlog can easily be dealt with, by a simple alteration in the Act to change "deemed to be refused" to "deemed to be approved" after, say, 60 days without a decision.

Front fences, carports and the like could pass automatically through the approval process, unless the Council had some specific objection that can be brought to the applicant's attention for correction.

Probably, one person in the Planning Office could deal with all these trivial matters expeditiously, sparing applicants months of pointless wait, while the Council's

mills grind exceeding small. Another area that requires attention is the appeals process.

At present, all appeals have to be settled in the Land and Environment Court, through a procedure that is slow and enormously expensive.

In fact, the average person cannot, in any practical sense, appeal against a Council decision, without the risk of bankrupting himself, so justice is effectively denied in a great many cases.

I have suggested to the Minister that, in the case of small applications, an avenue of appeal could be opened to NSW Civil and Administrative Tribunal.

The Minister's response was that planning requirements were too complicated for NCAT and required the expertise of the court for proper adjudication.

It is puzzling that the Australian Administrative Tribunal manages to deal with an enormous variety of complex subjects, including taxation, welfare, unemployment and immigration (all far more complicated than planning) but NCAT is, apparently, too incompetent to be entrusted with

a role in the administrative-appeal process above the kindergarten level.

Every time there is a court appeal, ratepayers have to foot the bill for a legal extravaganza that is both unnecessary and unfair.

I recall that, at one time, the Minister used to appoint a Commissioner (normally, a planning professional) who dealt with matters in an informal hearing and made a recommendation to the Minister who held power over the final decision.

There was no Court palaver, no expensive legal counsel and no delay in getting the decision, so, if the Minister is so concerned about NCAT's lack of planning expertise, it is only necessary to recruit a few "Commissioners" to become members of the Tribunal.

I guarantee that they won't lack for appeals to keep them busy, and the knowledge that an applicant has a means of appeal might introduce some sense of urgency and reality into Council proceedings.

Preschool site concerning

I am writing as a local resident and supporter of early childhood education to express both my support for the addition of a new preschool in our community and my concern regarding the proposed location for its construction.

While I welcome the investment in expanding educational infrastructure, the current proposed site will significantly impact an important green space and outdoor playground that is critical for students K-2 years.



Medicare Mental Health Centres provide free, walk-in mental health support and care for people in


