



Heavy rain causes widespread flooding

The heaviest rain in at least 21 years caused widespread flooding around the Peninsula, brought trees down, caused beach erosion and stopped train travel between Hornsby and Gosford on Saturday, January 17.

Mr Jim Morrison of Umina recorded 288.2mm in the 24 hours to 9am on Sunday, January 18.

The rainfall rate at 2:10pm was recorded at 154mm/hour.

It was the wettest day in the 21 years that Mr Morrison has been recording Peninsula rainfall, with the next highest daily rainfall being 165mm recorded in January 2015.

A limited rail replacement bus

service was put in place on Sunday morning.

Trains were out of action until Sunday afternoon, when they resumed at a reduced speed due to flooding on the tracks between Hawkesbury River and Wondabyne.

Member for Gosford Ms Liesl Tesch advised residents to avoid non-essential travel and not to drive in floodwater.

Both Fire and Rescue NSW and the Rural Fire Service reported clearing fallen trees and storm damage.

Peninsula is one quarter of region's visitor economy

The Peninsula sub-region represents almost a quarter of the region's "visitor economy", according to a draft Central Coast Council document currently "on exhibition".

The Peninsula has annual visitor spending of \$309 million (24 per cent) with 931,000 visitors annually, it says.

This is the highest spending of any of the six visitor "sub-regions" identified in the Draft Destination Management Plan on exhibition as part of the Council's consultation on "Strengthening the Regional Economy".

The Entrance and Northern Lakes receives the next highest with \$268M (21 per cent) with 1.2 million visitors.

Gosford and Surrounds receive \$234M (18 per cent) with 1.3 million visitors.

Terrigal is fourth with \$233M (18 per cent) with 863,000 visitors.

The Peninsula sub-region, which includes the Bouddi Peninsula, has the highest spend per visitor of \$332.

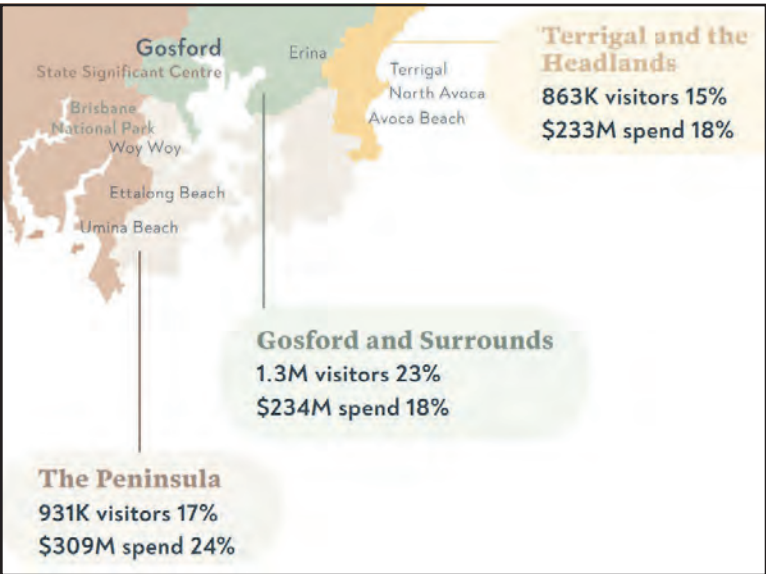
This outstrips Terrigal at \$270, The Entrance at \$233, and the Central Coast Hinterland at \$194.

Gosford, at \$180, receives less than Wyong at \$185.

The draft plan comments: "The Peninsula subregion generated the highest overall visitor expenditure, despite receiving comparatively low visitation.

"It is the only subregion to follow this pattern, suggesting visitors to the Peninsula spend more per visit.

"This is likely attributed to the high proportion of overnight stays, which is driven by the variety of visitor accommodation options available and the presences of



products and experiences that encourage and enable longer stays."

In its "sub-regional analysis" of the Peninsula, the draft Plan says: "Known for its laid-back coastal charm, this subregion offers a blend of natural beauty, local culture and convenient access to Sydney.

"The subregion is appealing as a destination for weekend getaways and short breaks.

"Woy Woy serves as a key gateway to the Central Coast, with its scenic waterfront.

"Umina Beach and Ettalong Beach are favoured for their pristine beaches, calm waters and family-friendly atmosphere, ideal for swimming and picnicking.

"The subregion also boasts a vibrant local food scene, with weekly markets, fresh seafood and waterfront dining.

"The Bouddi National Park Coastal Walk is also a major driver of visitation." It lists the "challenges" of the Peninsula.

These include "accessibility ...

difficult due to the geography of the Peninsula and road network".

It says its small villages have "limited development potential given the environmental constraints".

It lists opportunities as commercial boat tours, ferries, wildlife tours commencing in and from Brisbane Water (Woy Woy).

Investment in wellness tourism is listed as an opportunity for "accommodation, yoga, forest bathing etc".

Ecotourism development is also listed.

The plan lists one of seven "high impact tourism opportunities" as establishing a ferry which services Brisbane Water towns.

Council would "undertake a feasibility study for a large and regular ferry service operating from Gosford to Woy Woy, linking towns of the Brisbane Water".

The comment period closes on Wednesday, March 4

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Editorial policy and guidelines

At its heart, Peninsula News is a community effort.

It welcomes and relies on the contributions provided voluntarily and at no cost by local organisations, groups and residents.

The newspaper aims to be accessible to the community - both through making its columns accessible to community groups and by having copies available in accessible locations, including through its website.

The following policies and guidelines are designed to support the aims and standards of the newspaper.

Locality

The newspaper's editorial policy reflects a desire to reinforce the Peninsula's sense of community.

To qualify for publication, articles must have specific relevance to the Peninsula. For example, they must be about activities or events happening on the Peninsula or be organised by or involving Peninsula people.

The newspaper is not regional or national in nature, so regional or national issues will not be canvassed except as they affect the Peninsula.

Regional sports will only be covered from the perspective of Peninsula clubs. Regional plans will only be aired in the context of their ramifications for the Peninsula.

Peninsula News aims to be inclusive of as much of the Peninsula community as possible.

Readability

To ensure that the newspaper serves its purpose, it must be readable and represent the interests and activities of the community in its content.

Contributions to the paper are edited to consistent standards of readability. Guidelines are available for intending contributors.

All items will be dated. They must contain the name of the author to whom the contribution may be attributed, with their first name spelt out, along with their suburb or organisation. Anonymous contributions will not be accepted.

Forum letters

The Forum section provides the opportunity for readers to express their views on any aspect of Peninsula community life, with the aim of reflecting the community's diversity of opinion.

Nevertheless, letters may be edited for readability, including for length, spelling and grammar, and to avoid legal liability on the part of the newspaper, or they may be declined altogether.

Contributors are asked to keep their contributions to the matter at hand, and to

focus on the issues and not abuse or insult others.

Other than in the case of holding public figures to account, criticism of others (as opposed to criticism of particular opinions) is unlikely to be published in the interests of facilitating the expression of a diversity of views.

All letter writers need to supply name, address and contact details. Only name and suburb will be published.

Contributors who do not wish the wording of their letter to be changed at all should make a note to this effect when submitting their letter. In some cases, this may result in the letter not being published.

Corrections

We try to be as accurate as possible. However, mistakes can still slip through.

If you believe we have got something wrong, whether an error of fact or interpretation, we ask that you write to us by email with details for publication. These corrections may appear as Forum letters or as news items and should conform to our requirements for news and Forum contributions.

Source lines

Peninsula News includes "source lines" at the end of each article which aim to provide readers with information about where and how we came across the information, so that they might judge for themselves the veracity of what they are reading.

It should not be assumed that the article is a verbatim reproduction of the source. Similarly, it should not be assumed that any reporter listed is necessarily responsible for writing the whole news item. Source lines are not by-lines.

Often articles come from a number of sources. They are edited for readability and reader interest and given different headings, and consequently can be expressed quite differently from the source material.

Peninsula News usually receives its information in three ways: It is sent to us by someone wanting to promote their activities; it is sent to us in response to our inquiries; or it comes from a newsletter or other document to which we have access.

Sometimes we may interview a person or report what they said at a meeting.

The following descriptions are used:

Media Release - unsolicited contributions.

Media Statement - sent in response to our questions. **Website** or **Social Media** - information published online. **Newsletter** or **Report** - published in print or online. **Interview** or **Meeting** - statements recorded by a reporter.

Highest daily rainfall in 21 years

Rainfall of 364.6mm has been recorded the Peninsula for January as of last Friday, January 23.

The total included 288.2mm recorded for the 24 hours to 9am on January 18, the wettest day in the 21 years that Mr Jim Morrison of Umina has been recording Peninsula rainfall.

At 2:10pm on January 17, the rainfall rate was recorded at 154mm per hour.

The following day, another 37mm was recorded.

The record daily rainfall was 75 per cent more than the next wettest day, January 19, 2015, when 165mm was recorded.

The month's total already makes this month the second wettest January in 21 years, with the next wettest January being in 2015 when just 2.4mm more, 367mm, was recorded.

This month's total exceeds the combined average rainfall of

120mm for January and 151mm for February.

It is less than 20 per cent short of the average rainfall for the first three months of the year, 443mm.

Several months in the past 21 years have recorded more than 365mm of rain with the wettest

being March 2022 when 486mm was recorded.

Council plan to simplify approval of ‘key events’

Central Coast Council’s approvals processes for key events will be “simplified” under a draft Events Strategy Action Plan.

The plan is currently on exhibition for public comment as part of the Council’s “Strengthening the Regional Economy” consultation.

Under the plan, the Events and Placemaking staff of the council would “obtain blanket development applications for key event sites”.

They would “prepare key plans that allow for events to operate”, including traffic management plans in conjunction with NSW Police and Transport for NSW.

The draft action plan says this “can be delivered under existing budget and resources”.

The planned action appears to address obstacles experienced by festival organisers, where one section of Council has appeared to encourage and financially-support festivals, while the planning section of the Council has appeared to stand in the way of the same festivals.

The Coastal Twist Festival’s Coastie Carnie Fair Day in Umina

was almost cancelled last October due to the conflict within the council, with approval only being issued at the last minute after delays and a dispute about planning processes and traffic management approval.

In another action under the plan, Events and Placemaking staff would work with Community Facilities staff to “explore the establishment of an event concierge or similar function to streamline approvals and support event organisers through Council processes”.

In other actions, Facilities and Asset Management staff would audit key event sites to inform future capital expenditure and “to ensure sites are fit for purpose and growth”.

Events and Placemaking staff would also develop and implement environmental sustainability guidelines for events, encouraging practices that reduce waste, protect public spaces, and minimise environmental impact, with clear expectations embedded in event planning resources.

Woy Woy Rd to receive \$1.6 million

Woy Woy Rd has received \$1.6 million through the Federal Labor Government’s 2025-26 Black Spot Program funding.

Member for Robertson Dr Gordon Reid said: “I welcome the announcement that Woy Woy Rd will receive \$1.6 million in federal funding for the implementation of safety improvements.

“As many people in our community know, Woy Woy Rd has seen many serious crashes over the years.

“I launched a petition last year calling on all levels of government to work together towards a solution.

“The Federal Labor Government has listened and will provide \$1.6 million for safety improvements through the 2025-26 Black Spot Program.

“This funding will be provided to the NSW Government and Transport for NSW, who are the responsible authorities that will undertake the work, and will need to complete the work over the next three years.”

Dr Reid said the Black Spot Program funded safety measures such as traffic lights, safety barriers, roundabouts, and pedestrian crossings at locations where a number of serious crashes have

occurred or are at risk of occurring.

“The project was recommended by the Black Spot Consultative Panel in NSW,” he said.

“This panel is comprised of local stakeholders who are best placed to ensure nominations of the highest priority and importance to the local community are recommended for approval.”

Woy Woy resident Mr Paul Walker said: “This funding is a welcome outcome following events that affected my wife and family last year on Woy Woy Rd.”

Three side-by-side units proposed

A new development application has proposed three side-by-side units over two lots at 15-17 Hector St, Umina.

The application is non-compliant with planning provisions for floor space ratio and for parking.

It has a floor space ratio of 0.537:1 where the limit is 0.5:1 and provides only three car spaces, where six are required.

The proposal, prepared by Zsquare Urban Pty Ltd, seeks to amalgamate two existing lots to create a single site of 869 square metres for the construction of the three two-storey dwellings.

The application states that the flat-roof contemporary design by L87 Architects, which differs from surrounding traditional houses, aims to reduce its “mass by using “curved upper-level elements, varied materiality, recessed building planes, and deliberate breaks between the three dwellings”.

The development comprises two four-bedroom units flanking a central unit consisting of three bedrooms and a home theatre, with each dwelling having a single garage.

Each unit will have its own pedestrian access.

One unit will have its own driveway, while the other two will share a driveway.

The application argues that the proposed floor space ratio is justified because it is “solely associated with improving internal amenity and delivering functional, well-proportioned dwellings rather than increasing intensity of use”.

It states that the proposal does not introduce additional dwellings, parking demand, or traffic generation.

It argues that the shortfall in off-street parking is justified: “Given the site area and its close proximity to the local centre and public transport, the provision of one on-site car space per dwelling

is considered reasonable.”

It states that an additional vehicle may also be accommodated on the driveway.

The planning provisions require six parking spaces for this development, including one visitor space, and does allow tandem parking to meet the requirements.

They also require vehicles to enter and leave in a forward direction, which has not been provided.

The application proposes two swamp mahogany street trees, and three cabbage tree palms and two Manzanillo olive trees on site.

The application claims the development exceeds minimum design expectations and achieves design excellence, despite non-compliance with planning provisions.

It will be on public exhibition from January 30 to February 20.

Application for jetty

An application has been lodged for a jetty, ramp, pontoon, and mooring pen at 57 Woy Woy Rd, Woy Woy.

The proposal, prepared by Southern Waterfronts, seeks approval for a 38-metre by 1-metre mesh jetty, a smaller mesh ramp, and a pontoon measuring 3.6 metres by 2.4 metres, alongside four new mooring piles to create a designated pen.

The application notes that the site, located in Woy Woy Bay, is currently devoid of structures but sits within a “high boating precinct” where such infrastructure is common.

The application states the project is designed to “achieve an equitable occupation and use of land for the family to safely berth, embark and disembark from a vessel at all tides”.

The application paid regard to a bed of zostera seagrass spanning the site.

While the installation of 16 piers was estimated to result in the loss of approximately 0.8 square metres of habitat, the accompanying marine report concludes that potential impacts “are expected to be minor”.

To mitigate shading, the design proposes “seagrass friendly” mesh

decking capable of allowing “at least 50% light penetration” to the vegetation below.

Government bodies have provided preliminary feedback, with NSW Maritime confirming the design has “minimal impact on the safety of navigation,” provided that an existing private mooring is relocated at the applicant’s expense.

Additionally, the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (Fisheries) indicated it has “no objections to the lodgement” of the application following their review of the conservation provisions.

The application concludes: “The assessment report has confirmed to Council that the works will not result in adverse impacts on the use of Brisbane Water, by either adjoining residents or the general public.

“The structures do not impact unreasonably on other waterway users. Equally, the works will have minimal impact on the surrounding marine ecology.”

The application is currently on public exhibition and open for submissions until February 16.

Third attempt for change of use from shop to dwelling house

A third attempt is being made to the change the use of the “Halfway Shop” at 471 Ocean Beach Rd from “commercial” to “dwelling house”.

Central Coast Council is currently exhibiting the development application (DA/1847/2025) for comment.

It describes its purpose as “the conversion of a commercial premises to a dwelling house on Lot 1 in SP 107487 1/471 Ocean Beach Rd, Umina Beach, as illustrated in the plans prepared by Lever Designs”.

This was first proposed in DA/1964/2024 lodged on December 3, 2024, which was “returned” on December 13.

It was subsequently submitted as DA/147/2025 lodged on February 18, 2025, but withdrawn after the public exhibition for unknown reasons.

The current proposal appears



to remain the same as the last application, without explanation.

As well as converting a single-storey rendered brick and weatherboard restaurant into a residential dwelling, it demolishes a detached garage-shed to construct a new garage and covered rear deck.

It is claimed that the external appearance of the building, known colloquially in the 1980s

as the “Halfway Shop”, will remain substantially the same, with only minimal changes.

A large covered deck will replace a service area at the rear, the building will be re-clad and the windows replaced to “complement the streetscape while maintaining its original corner-shop character”, according to the application prepared by Clarke Dowdle and Associates.

The main, and perhaps only, real difference between the previous application and this one lies not within the currently exhibited documentation but in what has been left out.

The public exhibition for the previous application included 11 sheets of drawings and other documentation under the heading “Notification Plans”.

This one has just two, sheets 6 and 7 which contain elevations only.

Amongst the missing sheets is the site plan (a requirement of the Act) and also sheet number 1 which contains a table of “Key Environmental Effects”.

This differs from the application in that it lists two aspects as being non compliant.

One is Site Coverage which is labelled “Does Not Comply” with a requirement of 50 per cent and the proposal being 67 per cent.

The other is Outbuildings with a

requirement of 45 per cent and the proposal being 57 per cent, which is also labelled “Does Not Comply”.

The Final Design Safety Report which is included in this exhibition list several potential hazards associated with demolition included in the project including “dilapidated or unsafe structures”, “asbestos removal or disturbance”, “lead paint or dangerous chemicals” and “possible collapse or temporary instability”.

The missing drawings and other information supplied with the previous application are still available on the Council’s planning portal with the previous application (DA/147/2025).

The current application is on public exhibition and open for written submissions until February 2.

The developer’s dilemma: a fascinating case study

For local residents observing the changing face of Umina Beach, the proposed development at 15-17 Hector St, Umina, offers a fascinating case study in the economics of modern housing.

I asked myself why do developers of high-end developments submit non-compliant applications?

What are the financial considerations?

Can a high-end development succeed with single garages?

The plan involves demolishing two existing cottages to build three high-specification, two-storey residences.

However, a closer look at the planning documents reveals a “developer’s dilemma”: how to balance strict council controls against the demands of luxury buyers.

I resorted to Google’s AI software, Gemini, to get some idea

of the considerations involved. It made the following suggestions.

The driving force behind this proposal is the potential “uplift” in value.

Current estimates place the value of the existing cottages at approximately \$1.07 million to \$1.08 million each.

However, by amalgamating the lots and building three premium dwellings, the developer is targeting a much higher price point.

Google’s analysis suggests that new four-bedroom townhouses in this pocket of Umina Beach can command between \$1.65 million and \$1.85 million each.

To achieve these premium prices, the homes need to offer specific “lifestyle” features.

The proposed design includes modern “coastal” facades with timber-toned cladding, and layouts that feature either four bedrooms or a “home theatre” media room.

The dilemma arises when trying

to fit these luxury features into the site while respecting local planning rules.

The developer is seeking a greater floor space ratio, asking to exceed the allowable limit by about 32.8 square metres.

According to Google’s analysis, this extra space is crucial.

Without it, the developer would likely have to reduce the units to three bedrooms and remove the media room, which could drop the potential sale price of each unit by \$100,000 to \$150,000.

Furthermore, the site sits in a flood zone. To ensure the homes are insurable and safe, the build must be raised to a height of RL 5.05m AHD.

This engineering requirement alone adds an estimated \$45,000 to \$70,000 per unit to the construction cost.

This is on top of professional fees and DA costs of \$80,000 to \$120,000, demolition costs of

\$45,000 to \$65,000, construction costs of \$1.4 to \$1.85 million, and \$60,000 to \$90,000 for landscaping and driveways.

To recoup the “flood premium”, the developer is under pressure to maximize the internal living space and finish quality.

The most significant risk in this proposal is the parking situation.

While the project targets the “premium” market, each of the four-bedroom units is provided with only a single car garage.

In the current market, buyers purchasing a family-sized home typically expect side-by-side double garaging.

Real estate data suggests that premium units with only one garage can suffer a “value cap,” potentially selling for significantly less than competitors with double parking.

The developer appears to be betting that the high-end finishes and the inclusion of a “lifestyle

media room” will be enough to entice buyers despite the parking shortfall.

The developer argues that the single-garage layout allows for a better streetscape with more landscaping, rather than a frontage dominated by garage doors.

They are essentially asking the Council—and the community—to accept a slightly larger building footprint in exchange for a “greener” design that meets strict flood safety standards.

Whether this gamble pays off will depend on whether local buyers or cashed up Sydney downsizers value a home theatre more than a second parking spot, and whether the Council views the design quality as a fair trade for the variation in density and the shortfall in off-street parking.

Is this what the Department of Planning means by "conservation"?

Conservation or urban expansion?

Months after the exhibition of the Central Coast Strategic Conservation Plan, it is time for official honesty and transparency about the real purpose of the Plan.

Statements by the Department of Planning, Housing and Infrastructure and by Minister for Planning and Public Spaces Mr Paul Scully avoid the underlying issue - urban expansion on the Central Coast.

Mr Scully has said: "The Plan has been developed with rigorous environmental assessment and consultation."

If so, why is climate change not addressed and only raised in third-party submissions?

The Department's claim that biodiversity will be protected "over the next 30 years and beyond" is unsupported, without the Minister or the Department supplying any evidence of how this will be achieved.

The Plan makes room for "32,550 new dwellings" plus infrastructure and services without any assessment of the probable and potential impacts of climate change.

Discussion and submissions about planning the future of the Central Coast, about the impacts of development and of climate change, have been discouraged and disregarded.

The Department did not allow discussion of these at its strictly-controlled forum at Kariong on October 13.

The forum was limited to matters of biodiversity.

It did not include the Plan's clear agenda for the expansion of urban area and the clearing of bushland for development.

Departmental claims that it will be up to the Council determine the suitability of "risk areas" for development are a shameful pretense.

This Plan is a subterfuge for continued incremental urban expansion and sets an expectation that more will follow. Describing urban expansion as "conservation" is deceitful and lacks transparency.

The Central Coast needs a long-term vision and strategy that looks further than the current vague regional plan and specifies the reality of Government plans for the region's future.

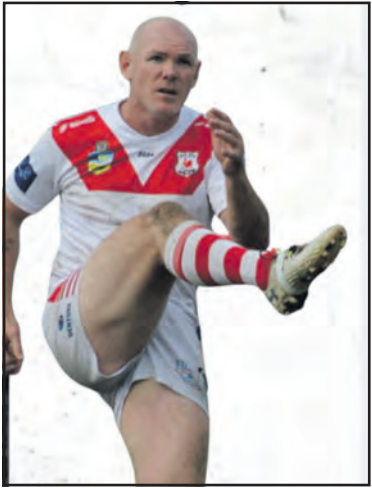
