Shade trees group looks for homes for saplings

The Grow Urban Shade Trees group is looking for homes for eight tree saplings in Peninsula nature strips or front yards.

"We have two lemon scented gums already 1.5m tall," said group member Ms Deb Sunartha.

"These can get tall so space is needed without powerlines.

"Their leaves smell incredible and the trunk will be a beautiful pale colour."

The group also has three water gums (*Tristaniopsis laurina* "Luscious") of various heights, which grows to a small tree for under powerlines.

It also has three two-metre tall West Australian peppermints (*Agonis flexuosa*), a small-medium



sized tree that does not have a dense canopy.

McWaide vote change sees Umina Beach toilets rebuilt

A change of vote by Gosford West ward's Cr Trent McWaide has resulted in a decision to rebuild the toilets next to the Umina Beach Surf Club.

Central Coast Council's Gosford West ward covers the Peninsula.

The rare departure from block voting in the Council sees \$650,000 allocated for replacement of the toilets including the provision of change rooms for people with a disability.

Design development, consultation and approvals will be undertaken in the 2026–27 financial year, and construction will be programmed for the 2027–28 financial year.

"The toilets are 52 years old and were previously recommended for demolition in 2031 but need to be replaced earlier," said Gosford West's Cr Belinda Neal, who moved the motion.

She said the current toilets were of a poor standard and inadequate for the present needs of the community.

"The present block does not provide suitable change rooms for the disabled surfer group that uses the facilities on a regular basis.

"It does not provide showers or appropriate change rooms for the people with a disability who have been forced to provide their own portable facilities."

Gosford West's Cr Jane Smith seconded the motion.

She said it "came to light in 2025 ... that this facility was highly utilised by the Disabled Surfers Association and that facilities are

inadequate for that sector and that purpose".

Cr Smith said the Disabled Surfers Association was "a truly amazing organisation".

"Its mission is to put 'Smiles on Dials' by taking people of all disabilities surfing in a fun, friendly and safe environment.

"Being able to do that involves vast numbers of volunteers, policies, procedures and logistics."

She said: "There was a strong case to bring forward the plans to improve the facilities."

Cr Smith said it had taken three attempts at three different Council meetings to get the motion supported.

"Although Cr McWaide previously opposed this initiative, I am pleased that at the meeting on January 27, he changed his vote and supported the motion."

Disabled Surfers Association Central Coast branch secretary Ms Rae Fiechter thanked Cr McWaide "for coming on board and delivering a great speech".

She acknowledged the Umina Community Group for "strong advocacy and advice".

Umina Community Group director Mr Tony Winch said the new facility was a welcome improvement to the area.

"Today the area is enjoyed every day by people with a disability," he said.

The area is also used for a number of regional activities including disabled surfers events, Umina markets, Umina Skate Jam and the Coastal Twist Festival, all of which are attended by visitors

with disability needs.

"The disabled surfers' events are held four times each summer at Umina Beach, with 50-60 surfers and their carers attending each event, along with up to 200 volunteers."

He said the new facility would be built as a regional facility with disabled toilets and change rooms.

Mr Winch said the group had been working with the Disabled Surfers Association and Cr Neal to lobby for and gain approval for the project.

He said that, over the last 10 years, the group had been working with Council staff to improve the shared paths coming into the area making the area more mobility friendly and increasing disabled access parking.

"There is now, in each of the four directions leading to Umina Beach, over 800 metres of mobility-friendly shared pathways," he said.

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Please note: Peninsula News has no paid employees, and it may take a little time for us to get back to you. Our volunteers usually have other jobs and commitments, which compete for their time.

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Editorial policy and guidelines

At its heart, Peninsula News is a community effort.

It welcomes and relies on the contributions provided voluntarily and at no cost by local organisations, groups and residents.

The newspaper aims to be accessible to the community - both through making its columns accessible to community groups and by having copies available in accessible locations, including through its website.

The following policies and guidelines are designed to support the aims and standards of the newspaper.

Locality

The newspaper's editorial policy reflects a desire to reinforce the Peninsula's sense of community.

To qualify for publication, articles must have specific relevance to the Peninsula. For example, they must be about activities or events happening on the Peninsula or be organised by or involving Peninsula people.

The newspaper is not regional or national in nature, so regional or national issues will not be canvassed except as they affect the Peninsula.

Regional sports will only be covered from the perspective of Peninsula clubs. Regional plans will only be aired in the context of their ramifications for the Peninsula.

Peninsula News aims to be inclusive of as much of the Peninsula community as possible.

Readability

To ensure that the newspaper serves its purpose, it must be readable and represent the interests and activities of the community in its content.

Contributions to the paper are edited to consistent standards of readability. Guidelines are available for intending contributors.

All items will be dated. They must contain the name of the author to whom the contribution may be attributed, with their first name spelt out, along with their suburb or organisation. Anonymous contributions will not be accepted.

Forum letters

The Forum section provides the opportunity for readers to express their views on any aspect of Peninsula community life, with the aim of reflecting the community's diversity of opinion.

Nevertheless, letters may be edited for readability, including for length, spelling and grammar, and to avoid legal liability on the part of the newspaper, or they may be declined altogether.

Contributors are asked to keep their contributions to the matter at hand, and to

focus on the issues and not abuse or insult others.

Other than in the case of holding public figures to account, criticism of others (as opposed to criticism of particular opinions) is unlikely to be published in the interests of facilitating the expression of a diversity of views.

All letter writers need to supply name, address and contact details. Only name and suburb will be published.

Contributors who do not wish the wording of their letter to be changed at all should make a note to this effect when submitting their letter. In some cases, this may result in the letter not being published.

Corrections

We try to be as accurate as possible. However, mistakes can still slip through.

If you believe we have got something wrong, whether an error of fact or interpretation, we ask that you write to us by email with details for publication. These corrections may appear as Forum letters or as news items and should conform to our requirements for news and Forum contributions.

Source lines

Peninsula News includes "source lines" at the end of each article which aim to provide readers with information about where and how we came across the information, so that they might judge for themselves the veracity of what they are reading.

It should not be assumed that the article is a verbatim reproduction of the source. Similarly, it should not be assumed that any reporter listed is necessarily responsible for writing the whole news item. Source lines are not by-lines.

Often articles come from a number of sources. They are edited for readability and reader interest and given different headings, and consequently can be expressed quite differently from the source material.

Peninsula News usually receives its information in three ways: It is sent to us by someone wanting to promote their activities; it is sent to us in response to our inquiries; or it comes from a newsletter or other document to which we have access.

Sometimes we may interview a person or report what they said at a meeting.

The following descriptions are used:

Media Release - unsolicited contributions.

Media Statement - sent in response to our questions. **Website** or **Social Media** - information published online. **Newsletter** or **Report** - published in print or online.

Interview or **Meeting** - statements recorded by a reporter.

Final stage of aged care work is 'on track'

The final stage of redevelopment at a Woy Woy aged care home is expected to be completed by May.

Blue Wave Living chief executive Mr Matt Downie said: "Our final stage of works in the original Shores building is continuing well, with demolition works now completed and roughing in of in-ground services well underway.

"Concrete pours will commence soon, along with internal framing and services beginning to be

roughed in over the coming weeks.

"We are still on track to complete this stage of works by around May this year.

"This will see us being able to deliver an additional 10 newly-rebuilt bedrooms and other spaces, completing the Beachside House section of Blue Wave Living.

"We will also be delivering a private lounge-dining area, which will be available for families to book for extended family gatherings in private with loved ones here at

Blue Wave."

Mr Downie said: "On completion of this current stage, we will take a pause before undertaking further building works.

"It does see us complete our aim of not only joining the two buildings together but also delivering four households with 63 newly-built bedrooms and a variety of new and additional spaces inside and outside."

Only 4.6mm rain in last two weeks

The Peninsula has had only 4.6mm of rain in the last two weeks, following the record downpour of 288.2mm recorded on January 18.

The rain was recorded on a single day - Monday, February 2.

The fall is just three per cent of the month's average of 151mm.


However, the total for the year is 369.2mm, which is 36 per cent above the average cumulative rainfall at the end of February.

The total is only 17 per cent less than the average for the first quarter of the year.

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Seminar about home design for climate change

A seminar to explore how homes and landscapes can be designed to better withstand the impacts of climate change will be held at the Pearl Beach Memorial Hall on Saturday, February 28.

Two exponents of sustainable design will take part in a question and answer seminar hosted by the Pearl Beach Environment Group.

They are architect Ms Carol Marra and landscape architect Mr Mathew Taylor.

"Architect Carol Marra is a leader in the rapidly evolving field of sustainability, climate resilience and regenerative environments," said Environment Group convenor Ms Mary Knaggs.

"Her work focuses on designing homes, housing, masterplans and community buildings that support both people and nature."

Ms Knaggs said Mr Taylor "brings extensive experience across a diverse range of landscape projects nationally and internationally".

"His specialist expertise includes

heritage landscapes, master planning, residential subdivisions and the adaptive reuse of former heritage-listed industrial sites."

He is also the Landscape Master Planner for the Pearl Beach Arboretum.

The seminar will be moderated by local architect Mr Bruce Swalwell.

It will conclude with a panel discussion led by Mr Swalwell, inviting attendees to share their own bushfire experiences and practical design ideas.

"Residents are encouraged to attend and participate in what promises to be a timely and thought-provoking discussion on creating more resilient homes and environments for the future," said Ms Knaggs.

could look forward to fee-free early learning at the preschool.

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Four-level six-bedroom proposal exhibited a second time

Central Coast Council is exhibiting a proposal for a four-level six-bedroom dwelling in Uralla Lane, Blackwall, for the second time.

The development application for 11 Uralla Lane was first lodged on April 23 last year and placed on exhibition in May.

The application includes construction of a "dwelling, inground swimming pool and demolition of existing dwelling".

It describes the 885.74 square metre site as "mostly comprised of low vegetation" with "a fall towards the east" with a 20 per cent gradient.

The application prepared by NA Hill Designs includes "basement for carparking, services, office, WC" and a ground floor with "entry, bedrooms with adjoining sitting room, bathroom, laundry, living".

The first floor has "bedrooms, bathroom, living room, kitchen and pool".

A fourth L-shaped level is designated as the "Library Level" with its main wall facing east.

One feature of the design is its first floor balcony, which faces Uralla Lane.

It is about 0.65 metre wider at the south end than at the northern end, with its irregular shape resulting in the sloping balcony roof to be higher at the south end than the north.

This is hardly noticeable when looking at the elevation drawing but the "uplift" will be more obvious when seen from the lane.

The application for the site, zoned R2 (Low Density Residential), does not comply with planning provisions for side setback and for height.

The application states a "minor section" of the front face (western elevation) "encroaches outside the upper floor side setback requirement".

It also states that "a minor segment of the roof" exceeds the height limit of 8.5 metres, being 8.895 metres, 4.65 per cent higher.

The application claims compliance in all other aspects including privacy, overshadowing and view sharing, stating: "The proposal is consistent with the scale of development within the residential zone and is commensurate with the character of development within the surrounding area".

However a primary concern for adjoining properties is the sheer bulk and positioning of the proposed building.

Submissions lodged with the first exhibition of the proposal argue that the new dwelling sits "significantly forward" of the established building line, disregarding the "staggered setbacks" that currently allow for equitable view sharing.

Neighbours contend that the design is "seeking to maximise its own northern view at the complete expense of others".

One submission highlights that the development would block

the only northern aspect visible from their north-facing balcony, turning an open view into a solid obstruction.

Residents have commissioned drone photography to demonstrate the impact on solar access.

The images suggest the proposed roof line will cast shadows over neighbouring solar panels during winter, rendering them "useless" and blocking sunlight to north-facing windows and pool areas.

The scale of the home has also led to fears it will function as a short-term rental rather than a family residence.

Neighbours said that the provision of three car spaces is "insufficient for a six-bedroom house" and raised concerns about "fluctuating numbers of occupants and vehicles" associated with potential Airbnb use.

With Uralla Lane being a narrow, single-lane shared access road, residents state there is "no capacity for overflow parking".

Photographic evidence submitted to the Council showed vehicles parked on the nature strip blocking access to driveways, with residents fearing this will become the norm if the development proceeds.

Residents argued that, during construction, there would be "no legal or practical space for truck parking, materials loading, or machinery movement without blocking the lane entirely".

The submission warns that any blockage of the lane could stop emergency access, noting there are "elderly residents at the end of Uralla Lane" who would be left vulnerable.

Additionally, concerns were raised regarding the demolition of the existing older structure.

Neighbours cited a lack of documentation regarding the removal of hazardous materials, fearing environmental health risks in a "tight residential lane with limited ventilation".

Residents urged the Central Coast Council to refuse the application in its current form, requesting that the applicant "reduce the building footprint" and produce a construction plan that guarantees the lane remains open.

For the second exhibition, the notification plans have been "revised" but not the application itself.

New documents added to the exhibition consist of a Bushfire Report, Geotechnical Report and a "Construction and Pedestrian Traffic Management Plan".

Three floor plans have been added to the drawing schedule but not exhibited.

A comparison between the "superseded" and "revised" plans indicates that the "revision" is mainly focused on providing extra information in response to a request for further information from the council planner.

There has been some "refinement" of the upper levels,

particularly the "library" level, which affects how shadows are distributed across neighbouring properties.

The revised site plan now features a distinct red setback line running along the eastern side of the proposed dwelling and new boundary and setback measurements have been added.

The newly exhibited "Construction Traffic and Pedestrian Management Plan" issued for the proposed development, outlines protocols for navigating the constraints of the narrow, three metre wide "No Through Road".

Prepared by Barker Ryan Stewart, the plan attempts to address residents' fears regarding access, by banning construction vehicles from parking in the lane.

It states that "parking of vehicles in Uralla Lane during loading and unloading operations will not be permitted due to the narrow pavement width and the need to maintain access at all times for residents and emergency vehicles".

Confusingly the plan is inconsistent and ambiguous.

It also states that loading and unloading activities should be undertaken within the site "whenever possible".

In the event a vehicle does obstruct the lane, the protocol requires it to be "relocated immediately at the request of a resident requiring access" or to allow emergency vehicles through.

The plan confirms that "on-site construction parking will not be provided".

Consequently, construction workers "must not park their vehicles in Uralla Lane" and are directed to park off-site in nearby streets such as Koonora Ave or to use public transport.

Heavy vehicle access is also limited.

Due to the "restricted opportunities for manoeuvring", the largest vehicle permitted to access the site is an "8.8 metre Medium Rigid Vehicle".

Concerns of neighbours who claim the management of hazardous materials poses a "significant environmental health risk" do not appear to have been addressed.

The Waste Management Plan identifies approximately 100kg of hazardous waste roof material to be transported to a "Waste Management Facility".

Residents have argued the details provided are insufficient.

Neighbours noted that the older structure "will almost certainly contain asbestos" and criticised the lack of specific safety protocols.

"No documentation has been provided about how this will be safely removed and managed," the submission states.

The application will be on public exhibition for written submission from February 11 to 25.

A new home office studio has been proposed for 97 Birdwood Ave, Umina.

towards the owner's main dwelling, for seclusion from adjacent properties.

The proposal also promises to maintain the leafy character of the area, with the application confirming that it "does not involve removal of trees or vegetation".

The application states that solar access for neighbours will be preserved, with shadow diagrams indicating that "the proposal does not reduce the solar access to private open space on the adjoining property" to the west or east.

The application notes that "the proposed development will not generate additional traffic".

The existing parking arrangements, one space in the garage and one driveway space off Birdwood Ave, will remain unchanged.

In their submission to the Central Coast Council, the consultants conclude that the addition will have a "positive effect on the streetscape and immediate locality" while allowing the owners to improve the "livability of the dwelling".

The estimated cost of the renovation is listed as "\$50,000 or more," and claims to meet NSW sustainability targets, confirmed by an attached Basix certificate.

The application is currently on exhibition with written submissions accepted until February 17.

Ettalong Bowling Club renovation expected to start in March

Major redevelopment of the Ettalong Bowling Club is expected to start in March.

"This redevelopment represents the most significant investment in our facilities since our beginnings and is designed to deliver lasting benefits for our members and the wider community," said chief executive Mr Tim McGavin

Stage One of the project will build "a vibrant dining precinct featuring a new main bar, lounge, cafe and a range of seating options, including alfresco dining and a dedicated children's play area", he said.

"During Stage One, the main lounge and existing main bar area will be closed.

"Works will also include significant upgrades to the southern side of the car park and a substantial expansion of the club's back-of-house facilities.

"All other areas of the Club, including alfresco restaurant, sports lounge and auditorium will remain operational."

Upon completion of Stage One, renovation will move to the auditorium and other areas of the

Club.

Future stages will include upgraded bowls facilities, refreshed function spaces, and enhanced entertainment and sports lounge areas.

Mr McGavin said the Club was home to one of the finest lawn bowling facilities on the Central Coast.

"Ettalong Bowling Club regularly hosts NSW and Australian bowls events, proudly promoting both the Club and the sport of bowls at the highest level."

He said the redevelopment would "further cement Ettalong Bowling Club's position as a premier community destination on the Central Coast".

"The upcoming redevelopment represents the next milestone in the Club's long-term vision and will be the most significant construction project undertaken since its establishment in 1964."

Dacca Architecture had been engaged as the principal design consultant and Cliffords Constructions as the builder responsible for the construction and fit-out of the project.

"This has been a long and complex journey, but reaching this point marks a defining moment for the Club," he said.

It followed extensive consultation and a lengthy and detailed planning and design process.

He said Dacca Architecture had worked closely with the Club to create a contemporary design that "pushed boundaries while remaining respectful of the Club's proud history".

The redevelopment reflected the Club's ongoing commitment to reinvesting its financial strength into improved amenities, greater operational efficiencies, and a more connected and sustainable club for generations to come, he said.

Mr McGavin said that, while some inconvenience to patrons was unavoidable, the Club has staged the works to minimise disruption and allow the Club to continue trading throughout the redevelopment.

The Ettalong Beach branch of the Bendigo Bank has appointed a new home lending specialist.


Mr Andre Jobson was born in the United States and has been an Australian citizen since 2018.

Remove commercial electricity tariffs for strata residents

Residents in our 10-unit strata complex in Ettalong Beach have discovered that Ausgrid automatically classifies all strata common-area electricity supplies as "non-residential," forcing us onto a commercial tariff, even though our property is zoned R1 General Residential.

Central Coast Council has formally confirmed our residential zoning, yet Ausgrid refuses to recognise it.

As a result, we are being charged commercial rates for

basic residential lighting such as driveway and pathway lights.

This is not just our problem.

Many strata complexes across the Coast are unknowingly paying inflated commercial tariffs, adding unnecessary cost-of-living pressure to households already doing it tough.

I encourage other affected residents to contact their local MP and ask for this policy to be reviewed so that residential strata communities are billed fairly and in line with their zoning.

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

Dementia advocate dies aged 76

Dementia advocate and Brisbane Water Rotary member Ms Bobby Redman has died peacefully at her home at the age of 76.

"A trained psychologist, Ms Redman turned her 2015 diagnosis of frontotemporal dementia into a decade of advocacy that changed lives across Australia," said Rotary Brisbane Water membership director Mr Mitchell Gordon.

"She influenced national policy, strengthened support systems and gave voice to the 433,300 Australians living with dementia," he said.

"Ms Redman joined the Dementia Australia Advocates Program in 2016.

"Within a year, she was appointed to the Dementia Australia Advisory Committee.

"By October 2021, her peers elected her chair, a position she held until March last year."

Mr Gordon said: "She led major initiatives including Strengthening Connections, a regional program connecting advocates in less populous areas, and Consumer Involvement in Research, which ensured people with lived experience shaped research priorities.

"She guided committee meetings in Brisbane, Adelaide, Canberra and Sydney, ensuring people with lived experience remained at the heart of every decision."

Mr Gordon said a letter she co-signed with the chair of the Dementia Australia Board calling for urgent action on dementia care, which ran in more than 150



publications nationwide in 2024.

Dementia Australia recognized her contribution with an award, stating that her unwavering commitment influenced national policy, strengthened community support systems and advanced research engagement.

Ms Redman was a foundation member of Rotary Brisbane Water, established in 2019.

She served as the club's inaugural vocational director.

"In this role, she established the vocational service program from its inception, launching the Pride of Workmanship Awards and coordinating the club's first vocational visit," said Mr Gordon.

"Whether leading at the national level, serving on local committees for disability access, or supporting fellow Rotarians, Bobby embodied Rotary's highest ideal: Service Above Self."

Mr Gordon said Ms Redman lived independently, managing her condition with technology and recorded prompts.

"This wasn't just personal determination. It was proof that dementia doesn't mean the end of independence, purpose or contribution."

He said Ms Redman spoke publicly about the vulnerable, difficult parts of living with dementia.

"She helped others feel less alone. She challenged what society assumed about the condition.

"Her psychology background gave her insight. Her lived experience gave her authority.

"Those who knew her describe warmth, determination and unwavering commitment."
